



PDRA proposes taxrate

A tentative tax rate of 1.08 cents per \$100 of value on property in the Palo Duro River Authority -now Moore and Hansford counties and the City of Stinnett -- will be set Wednesday by the PDRA board of directors.

The proposed rate is on the agenda for the May meeting of the 9-member water authority board. The meeting will be held in the Hansford county courthouse at Spearman, beginning at 11 a.m.

> > Then a document called "Seller, Donor or Trader's Affidavit'' is filled out describing the vehicle (including the identification number), its value and the sales tax to be paid. After the seller signs the affidavit in the presence of a notary, the buyer receives it along with the vehicle title and license plate registration fee receipt.

> > Next the buyer signs the affidavit before a notary and takes it with the title and registration receipt to the county tax collector and pays sales tax and title fee. In addition, the buyer signs an "Application for Original Title". These document transactions must be done within



20 days of the date the seller signed the title.

The tax collector processes the papers and provides the buyer with a temporary title receipt. If all papers are in order, the buyer will receive a new certificate of title.

If there is no lien on the vehicle, the buyer's certificate is labeled "original." If the vehicle is being financed, the buyer's certificate is labeled "duplicate original" and stamped "non-negotiable." The "original" copy goes to the creditor.

When the last payment is made, the creditor signs the release of lien on the "original" and gives it to the buyer. When this document is submitted to the tax collector with a title fee and application, the buyer is issued an "Original Certificate of Title" indicating no further lien.

Failure to transfer ownership of title correctly is a crime and punishable by a \$200 fine.

"The proposed tax rate is the same rate which has been

used by the district since 1977," explains Johnnie Lee, PDRA general manager. "The rate will raise an estimated \$140,000 for operating expenses."

The Palo Duro tax will add another item to the bills Moore county residents will receive on Oct. 1 of this year, when the county tax office mails out its statements.

On a \$60,000 home, if no exemptions are listed, the

PDRA tax will amount to \$6.48.

"One of the PDRA directors told me recently that his taxes last year on a section of improved irrigated farmland with two irrigation wells was only \$28," Lee adds.

Moore county, except for a square mile section, and the City of Stinnett are new members of the river author-

ity and were annexed through a Jan. 19 election.

The square mile area in Moore county not included in the annexation vote is the location of the Diamond Shamrock McKee plants. That section has been part of the PDRA for several years.

In addition to annexation, voters in the two newly annexation areas empowered the PDRA to levy an ad valorem property tax. The rate cannot exceed six cents, a limit set by state law creating the district.

He reports the \$140,000 of tax revenue the 1.08-cent rate will generate will be used for day-to-day operations of the district, for continuing engineering costs, and to begin

survey work in the area where the Palo Duro lake will be located.

The lake site is northwest of Spearman at the junction of the Palo Duro and Horse creeks.

Besides the 60,000-acre foot municipal water reservoir. the project proposed by the PDRA includes a water treatment plant and 90 miles of pipeline to supply drinking water to Dumas, Sunray, Cactus, Stinnett, Gruver and Spearman.

Lee explains that the district is setting a tentative 1985 tax rate now "to give county tax appraisal dis-tricts a figure to work with when valuation hearings are held this summer."

"The final tax rate will be set in August," says the PDRA manager. "I'm certain that the proposed 1.08cent rate will be used for 1985 taxes.'



SPS warns of carelessness around electricity

May is National Electrical Safety Awareness Month and Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) is reminding the public about the dangers of carelessness around electricity.

"With folks starting to work outside more in the warmer weather, it's especially important for them to remember to stay clear of power lines and electrical facilities," said Hermilo Martinez, SPS safety manager.

Nationwide, most electrical aocidents involving the public occur because of carelessness, Martinez said.

"Because people are so used to overhead lines, sometimes they don't notice them or they forget how much power is in them," he said.

People working around the house -- painting, trimming trees or doing other jobs -- must remember to keep themselves and their tools and equipment away from power lines, Martinez said.

"The slightest tough could be enough to seriously injure or kill", he said.

Electricity always seeks the shortest path to the ground. It travels easily through "conductors." Metal, water, trees and the human body are excellent conductors of electricity, Martinez explained.

Handymen and professional painters should make sure ladders don't place them high enough that they could contact a power line.

Aluminum ladders, which are good conductors, should themselves be kept away from lines, Martinez said.

Outdoor TV, radio and CB antennas pose another hazard. They're often unwieldy and tall enough to touch overhead lines. Installation of outdoor antennas should be left to professionals,

Martinez advised.

In rural areas, irrigation pipe should be handled with care, he said.

"Lightweight irrigation pipe is an excellent conductor of electricity," Martinez said. "Many sections are tall enough when lifted to hit overhead lines. Farmers need to be extremely careful when moving pipe. Rabbit hunters who lift irrigation pipe to chase out rabbits need to be just as careful."

SPS linemen who work with power lines are well trained and have a vareity of special clothing and equipment to protect themselves, Martinez said.

"And still they always respect the power in those lines," he said. Children, especially, need to be

taught to respect the power of electricty. "They need to know the dangers

of playing near a substation, climbing, trees that have power lines through them, and flying kites near overhead lines," Martinez said. Storms can cause potentially

dangerous situations by knocking down power lines, he said.

"If you see a line from a utility pole hanging down or on the ground, stay away from it," Martinez said. "Assume it's a live wire. Call SPS or the police department immediately."





IS SUSAN CRAZY?

When Tom and Susan were first married, everything was wonderful. They talked a lot, shared everything and could afford to go out to dinner once or twice a week.

Now Susan is pregnant with their second child and Tom has to work extra hours to pay for the new baby's expenses. Tom is always tired and Susan feels neglected and angry. In one of their many fights, Tom yells at Susan to go get counceling.

Is Susan crazy? Is Tom? No, not crazy, just in need of a little objective help to solve a problem.

Contrary to popular belief, most of a counselor's time is spent helping clients solve problems very similar to Tom & Susan's. Counselors also help parents learn more effective ways to deal with their children, teach better communication skills, even help kids who are having trouble in school.

The fact is, a person doesn't have to be crazy to seek the professional assistance of a counselor. The only real requirement for seeking counseling is a desire to change.

Another popular myth that keeps people from seeking help is the belief that a problem must be terrible, unsolvable, or catastrophic before a person should go

By Paula Sinsie stage, the problem behaviors are set in concrete and only time will help. At that point, a counselor

may be left with no alternative but to help the client live through or with the problem; not a satisfying solution for either client or therapist. The question, then, is, what kind of problem will benefit from counseling? The answer: Any problem, any situation, that is uncomfort-

able, seems stalemated, is upsetting or frustrating, can use an objective to help explore alternatives and possible solutions.

Not only does a counselor funotion as an objective outsider and advice giver, he or she may also serve as a sounding board for a person's plans and ambitions.

Many people will solve their own problems with a good listener in a non-judgemental environment. This is a perfectly legitimate utilization of this professional's skills. Actually, as a helping professional, the counselor is trained to

assist in almost any situation. Anyone, like Susan, can receive these benefits. It is the person's responsibility to request them.

City License will also be available for both dogs and cats. Charge for City tags will be: MALE -- \$2.00; FEMALE -- \$5.00.




