A FRIEND AND SUPPORTER
Bob Bailey was a friend and supporter of Gruver. With his radiant personality, he became the friend of young and old alike. His friendship was especially known by the youth of Gruver. He supported them in all that they did and encouraged them to be their best in sports, scholastic achievement and moral conduct. He knew them personally and even talked with many of them about individual improvement and growth. Examples of this are his encouragement to Jeff Roper and Ray Kelly by using their talent in his business.

Bob did not stop with supporting our youth in their activities; he wanted to see Gruver continue to be a finer place to live as the years come and go. He wanted the best for Gruver. He shared the pride of Gruver to be second to no one and to be a Pilot community rather than a community that always follows. Bob considered the Fortunate and the Unfortunate as he worked daily to fulfill some of his cherished dreams for Gruver. Bob was a real friend to this community and its people.

A PUBLISHER AND EDITOR
It was a good day for Gruver when Bob Bailey came and announced that the next week he would publish the first edition of the Gruver Independent. That first edition was published as he announced on August 22, 1962. This week is the second anniversary of the Gruver Independent, of which we can be especially proud because it compares favorably and even exceeds most papers of its size.

The name Bob gave to the Gruver paper fits Gruver well, but it also matches some of his strong qualities. "Independent" is a word that speaks of his publishing ability. Though Bob was only 31 years of age his last birthday, he had published at least six papers and was founding publisher of five of them.

Bob's newspaper interest dates back to his high school days in Deport, Texas where he was an apprentice at the Deport Times. After graduation from high school, he entered Paris Junior College until he went into the army to serve in the Korean Conflict. Upon returning to the United States, he re-entered Paris College and later transferred to West Texas State University. It was here that Bob renewed his interest in newspaper work by taking a job in the sports division of the Amarillo Globe News. From that time on, Bob became a very much talked-about young newspaperman. He ventured out with such courage and faith that his name became respected as a promising young newspaper editor and publisher.

First, he purchased the Vega Enterprise, brought the paper from near death to become a prize-winning paper in its class. While still publishing the Vega Enterprise, he was founding publisher of the Hartley County Herald. In 1962, Bob was the founding editor and publisher of the Stinnett Star, and on the day of his accident, Bob and his brother, Boyd, had just published the first edition of the North Plains Farmer, which was the fruition of a dream that he had nourished for years, to serve the North Plains with a farm paper. During these busy years, Bob had also been founding editor and publisher of a Negro paper in Amarillo and a weekly paper in Fritch. Bob had recently sold or made arrangements with all of his papers so that he could give full time to the Gruver Independent and the North Plains Farmer. Bob was ambitious, energetic and generous. He made quite a record for a man of 31, and he did it through sheer determination without much encouragement or help from others.

During these days of founding and publishing, two very close associates with Bob and his newspaper business have been Leon Yell, now editor and publisher of the Vega Enterprise and Dottie Jones of the Gruver Independent. Often Bob spoke of the contribution that these friends had made to his business. Just recently, Bob had been joined by his brother, Boyd, who lives at Dumas.

A LOVING FATHER AND HUSBAND
Bob loved his family. Often he spoke of his brothers, his parents and especially his wife, Kathy and his son, Barry. Bob and Kathy were married Dec. 13, 1959. They made their home in Amarillo and later moved to Vega and then to Gruver. Bob was a very busy man, but always in his busy life, he was understanding, considerate and thoughtful to his family.

A LIFE THAT WILL CONTINUE TO LIVE AND GIVE
Bob had a lot to give - and he gave. He contributed to life more in his brief span with us than many of us will contribute even if we are given more time. His high ideals and big dreams for Gruver will continue to live and grow in our hearts. It is surely our responsibility as good citizens and friends to take up where Bob left off and help to make this the finest place upon the face of the earth. He would have us face the future with hope, expectancy and determination. Because of our love and appreciation for Bob, our friend, let us continue to strive to keep ourselves and our community first class.

Robert Edward (Bob) Bailey was born February 13, 1933 in Deport, Texas, and was the son of Mr. and Mrs. Marshall B. Bailey. Bob met death Friday night, August 14, 1964, between the hours of 9 and 10 p.m., in a car-truck accident, enroute home from publishing his most recent publication, "The North Plains Farmer".

Bob is survived by his faithful wife, Kathy and their son Barry, of the home; his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Marshall B. Bailey of Deport; and two brothers, Boyd of Dumas, Texas and Pat of Fontana, California.

Burial was in the Highland Cemetery of Deport, Texas with the Rev. James Barnes, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Deport officiating at the graveside rites.

Death Claims Long Time Gruver Resident

Frank Fleck, an outstanding Gruver resident, died Thursday night, August 13, 1964, at his home, after being ill for the past ten years. Funeral services were held in the Gruver Methodist Church at 3:00 p.m., Saturday, August 15.

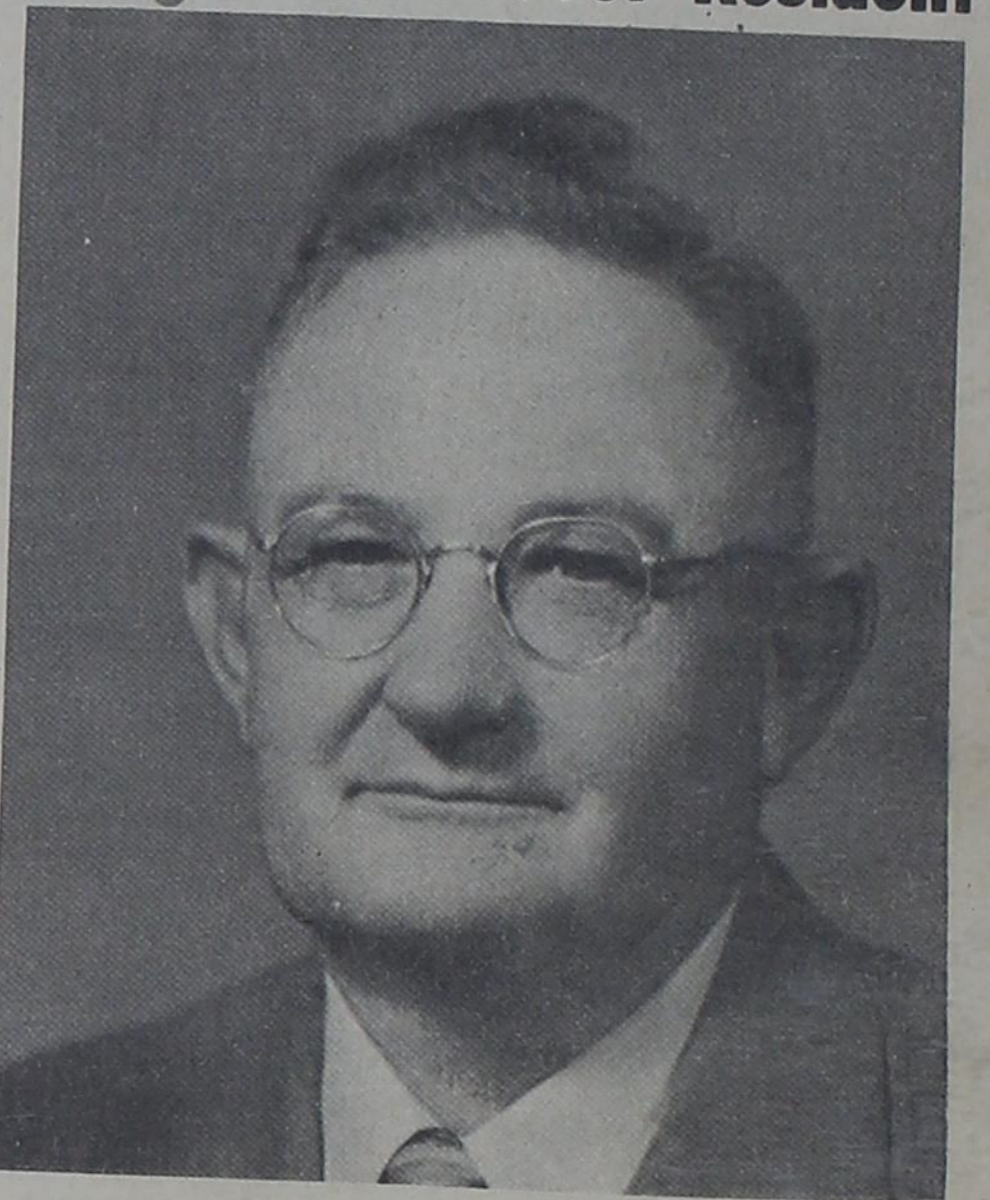
Born February 28, 1888 in Coffee County, Kansas, near the town of Waverly, Frank Fleck was the son of James N. and Rhoda C. Fleck. The Fleck families were early Kansas pioneers for his father had purchased their land from the Indians. In 1901, Mr. Fleck and his parents moved to Grant County, Oklahoma, where Frank grew to manhood. Upon finishing school in Grant County, he attended Northwestern Oklahoma Teachers College at Alva.

In 1912 he married Miss Bonnie Tenney in Alva, Oklahoma. The couple made their home there until 1918 when they moved to Ochiltree County where they farmed. The couple moved back to Oklahoma then back to the Panhandle of Texas and still make another move to Balco, Oklahoma, before Mr. Fleck became settled in the Lumber business.

The family moved to Slaton, Texas in 1926 where the association was made with the Panhandle Lumber Company. Within two years he was transferred by Panhandle Lumber Company to the town of Gruver and became manager of the Lumer Co.

The family moved to Gruver on July 27 of 1928 and soon moved into a new home which was built for the family by the Lumber Company. Active in church and civic circles, Mr. Fleck served as city secretary during the 1930's when the town of Gruver was beginning. He also presided as secretary of the Chamber of Commerce and was one of the members to sign the petition to make Gruver a town.

Retiring from his work in 1952 after a heart attack, Mr. Fleck was faced by the death of his wife just three

years later in 1955. In 1957, Gruver was assisted by Reverend and Bob Lamson, pastor of the First Christian Church officiated with the funeral services.

Organ presentations were presented by Mrs. Grace Bennett. Special Music was provided by a quartet, Rod Barkley, Dale Harris, Buddy Murrell and Leslie Barkley, and a duet of "How Great Thou Art."

Bell Finds Home In Bible Church

The congregation of the Community Bible Church are quite proud of their new church bell which was recently purchased in New Mexico. The congregation has been anxiously awaiting the time they would find a church bell and are making plans for the future to build a tower in the small garden to the west of the church.

A long story lies behind the bell and the truth of the story is not known. It is thought that the bell was once used to call the slaves on a plantation in South Texas. There are also tales that the bell was stolen. No matter how many stories or facts are told about this bell it has found a home in the Community Bible Church and in the not too distant future will serve to let everyone know the time for church.

The bell is believed to have been made in 1819. The manufacturing company is C. S. Bell Company of Hillsboro, Ohio. The bell measures thirty-six inches across the bottom of the bell. It has a loud clear ring and is thought to be heard for a five mile radius. The 880 pound bell is made of steel alloy.
