### Hounds Take Two Against White Deer

Bob Gillispie and Anita States put on sparkling shooting exhibitions as Gruver swept a pair of games from White Deer here Tuesday night. Gillispie pumped in 23 points in leading the boys to a 46-45 victory while States scored 21 as the girls won 37-24. The victory was the third straight for the boys after losing their opening game to Darrouzett. The victory was also the third of the year for the girls against one loss. The Gruver teams will be competing in the Sunray tournament Thursday, Friday and Saturday and travel to Dalhart next Tuesday night. Sam Tipton contributed 11 points and Jim Rice added eight in the boys game while LaNetta Blankenship tossed

in 12 for the Gruver girls. Jon Jarvis and Mack Hoel played outstanding ball for Gruver boys while Wanda Hardesty, Carlita Knight, DeAnn Crawford and Kay Gammill were key factors in the win for the Gruver girls. Two field goals by Gillispie and one each by Tipton and Jarvis moved the Grey-hounds to a quick 8-2 lead over the White Deer boys and Gruver never trailed. The Hounds led 13-9 at the end of the first quarter but White Deer on strong in the second quarter tied the score, 17-17. Gruver pulled away to a 23-19 lead at the half. They led 33-27 going into the final period. Gruver only led the White Deer girls 7-5 at the end of the first quarter but

### Fertilizer Meeting Slated

A Fertilizer educational meeting for all Hansford County farmers will be held Thursday December 5 at 7:30 p.m. in the Spearman Elementary School Cafeteria according to Robert Adamson, Hansford County Agent. This meeting is sponsored by the Texas Extension Service and will be assisted by B & B Grain Company and Best Fertilizer Company. The following subjects will be discussed: Nitrogen; Behavior of Nitrogen in the soil; Nitrogen and Organic Matter; Ammonium and Nitrate Nitrogen Time and Method of Application--Dr. Gaylord Hanes. Phosphorus; Function in plants; Plant Requirements --Dr. Gaylord Hanes. Nitrogen; Function in plants; Deficiency symptoms; Plant requirements; Sources; Method of Manufacturing--Mr. James Valentine. Phosphorus; Phosphorus uptake; Behavior of phosphorus in soil--Mr. James Valentine. Soil Testing--Mr. James Valentine. Following the presentation on fertilizers, the SCS will give a short demonstration on how to set up a level, level it and how to read the rod for running irrigation ditch line, etc. Coffee and donuts will be served during the break and also at the conclusion of the meeting. Adamson concludes that this educational meeting on fertilizers should be of vital interest to irrigation farmers so that they carry on a sound fertilizer program and get the most from their fertilizer dollar. Farmers are urged to attend this very important meeting.

### HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE PAST TO THE PRESENT

As Highlights from the Past to the Present journeys south this week we visit with the Louis Grant Andrews family who are early pioneers moving to Hansford-Hutchinson County Area in 1904.

Bloomington, Indiana is the beginning of our story as Louis Grant Andrews was born here on September 20, 1867. He was the son of Robert Lee Andrews. At a young age he was accompanied by his father, mother and one brother and three sisters to Nebraska where he grew to manhood, helping with his father's farming. After a grown man and on his own he moved to Greer County Oklahoma where he met his bride to be, Hattie Leffel. Hattie Leffel was born on July 25, 1876 in Greer County Oklahoma to the couple of J.D. Sheets. The couple of Louis Grant Andrews and Hattie Leffel were married June 13, 1900.

Mrs. Andrews had one daughter Bessie Leffel upon marriage and three other children were born to Mr. and Mrs. Louis Andrews before they made their move further west. They were Elsie, Loyd and Viola. Mr. Andrews yearned for land further west, therefore he set out with his brother-in-law to Hutchinson and Hansford County. Mr. Andrews bought land and the family made preparations to move. The family made their move in the Spring of 1904 bringing three wagons of their own and one of their uncle's wagons. They brought a few cattle and several teams of horses. Also accompanying them on the journey were their chickens in big coops tied to the side of the wagon. The treacherous Canadian River caused the family to make several trips across with the water running into the wagon boxes once or twice. Upon arriving at their homestead they lived with their relatives until the lumber could be carried from Channing and their home was built. The family bought some of their supplies from Channing but mostly from Hansford, Texhoma and Guymon. Their mail was received at the Old Jeffery Post Office located in the Holt Community where Mr. Archer was Postmaster. The children attended the Lackey school first and later the Holt school. Four other children were born after the family made their move they were Mable, Myrtle, Dora and J.D. Farming and ranching was the occupation for the family. The first year the land was made ready for farming. About one hundred acres were broken with a walking sod plough the first year. The next year some sixty or eighty other acres were broken. The cattle and horses ran on free range. About twice a year the neighbors would round up their cattle, for it was a job which everyone "pitched in" to help with. In 1908 Loyd was rounding up some horses when his horses fell and broke Loyd's leg. Otis Archer was helping at the time and had to ride fifteen miles to Old Hansford where he found Dr. McCoy who came by buggy to see to see after Loyd. The method he used to mend the broken leg was to bind two boards to the leg. The disastrous prairie fires can also be recalled by the Andrews family. One can be recalled as starting near Dumas probably by lightning, burning through into Oklahoma. The fire missed the Andrews home place but burned several ranch houses, a few livestock and a huge amount of feed stacks which had been prepared for the livestock. Entertainment was usually centered at the School and consisted of Literaries, Sunday School and Church

were also held at the school and singings were sometimes enjoyed during Sunday afternoon. There was an occasional all day dinner on the ground after preaching. The Fourth of July was celebrated in Old Hansford where there would usually be a little rodeo and gathering. At Christmas time Santa would visit at the school and the families would gather for a Christmas tree. The snow of 1912-1913 is recalled as being quite bad. Many cattle were killed during the harsh weather. Herds of antelope numbering as many as 300 at one time could be recalled as roaming the praries but this snow and cold winter seemed to kill them all. Rustic, would be the word we would use today for the life of that day and time when the light was provided by coal oil and the heat by cow chips, and the beds were made of extra soft corn shucks or straw mattresses. Mrs. Andrews made all the clothing and did all the cooking, making biscuits, light bread and corn bread for every meal. The older son Loyd helped the family for he freighted the wheat to Texhoma when he was only ten or twelve. He would take two wagons and four horses along with a group of neighbors on the trip which usually took two days to Texhoma and two days home unless snow or rain hindered them. They would sleep in bed rolls and cook by campfire on the trips to and from. The silent movie in Texhoma was always attended by young and old alike. In 1917 Mr. Andrews sold his farm and moved to Colorado where the family took up farming. This move was also made by covered wagon. The same procedure was taken for their land had to be broken. The children attended school at Wentworth. Settling near Springfield where they lived for some four years their final daughter Lola was born. A bad snow hit leaving snow on the ground for eighty or ninety days. The men had to haul cake from Elkhart but their effort to save the cattle's lives was useless, for they all died. This forced the family to move back to Spearman. The family came back to Spearman where Mr. Andrews started the Drayline Transfer which he operated until his death on May 27, 1945. Mr. Andrews was known as "Uncle Lou" to his many friends and associates. His wife followed him in death on March 18 of 1951. The children live in various areas over the tri-state region. Bessie married Charlie Riley and they made their home in Spearman until her death in 1941. They have one son Earl. The next daughter Elsie married Harvey Haney and this couple make their home in LaJuanta Colorado and have three sons Dale, Loyd and Joe. Loyd married Ethel Hart in Colorado and to this union were born three children, Violet Lorene who died at birth, Josiebell and Erlene. His wife died in 1928 and he later married Henreitta Behne and to this couple were born Marvin, Louetta, and Charlene. Loyd lives in Gruver. Viola married Rufus Burleson and they make their home in Pueblo, Colorado and have six children Lyn, Evelyn, Bob, Floyd, Gene and Peggy. Mable married Leonard Jameson and this couple make their home in Spearman having one son Neal. Myrtle also make's her home in Spearman and married Lafe DeArmond and has two sons, Don and Bill. Mr. and Mrs. Roscoe Womble make their home in Morse and have four children Jerry, Jeanie, Bob and Ronnie. Mrs.

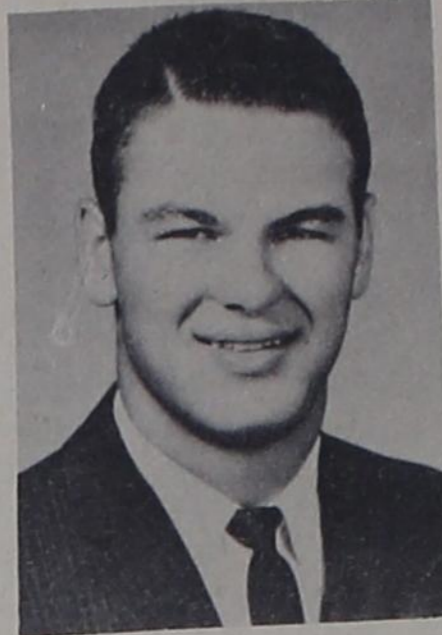

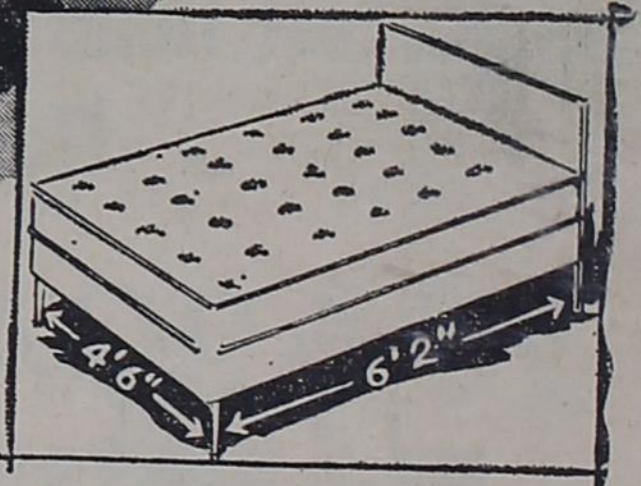

## FARMERS UNION

The 60th Annual Convention of the Texas Farmers Union in Lubbock, November 22'23 was cut short by the tragic death of President Kennedy on Friday. Most convention events were cancelled, including a scheduled appearance by Senator Ralph Yarborough.

Convention delegates, in a business meeting on Saturday approved a 1964 program for the farm organization which:

1. Expressed its grief at the death of the President, saying in part: "His abiding faith in securing ultimate peace for all mankind, his selfless devotion--have secured the highest place for him in the hearts of all men of goodwill forever."

2. Saluted Orville L. Freeman, saying that the Secretary of Agriculture "has amply demonstrated that he is cognizant of the problems of the family farmer...and is dedicating his...talents to their solution; and decrying 'smear tactics...misleading and meaningless slogans used by various opposition elements in a vain effort to discredit (the secretary)."

3. Pointed out that the 1964 wheat carryover or more than one billion bushels will require the Secretary of Agriculture to call another wheat referendum, and promising support for a "yes" vote for the wheat certificate plan if no new wheat program is passed next year. If Congress amends the existing wheat legislation, the convention urged: (1. If bushel quotas are retained); that the support price be increased to 100% of parity or \$2.50 per bushel; that the referendum be held August 1, 1964; that Congress consider ways the program be more acceptable to 15-acre growers. (2. If bushel quotas are not retained); That the program contain a voluntary certificate plan; that cooperators who stay within allotment be eligible for cert-

ficates as they would have been under the 1963 program, if that program had passed; that allotments for small growers be based on the average acreage planted for harvest in 1959, 1960 and 1961.

4. Cotton resolutions expressed objections to two features in the cotton bill presently before the House, (H.R. 6196). One provision in the bill would inject a "choice provision, which is a departure from existing law under which a national minimum acreage allotment is established on the basis of historic plantings. The second objection was to feature which would authorize the reduction of price supports by several cents per pound over a three-year period, thereby reducing producer income.

Delegates supported a program which would permit cotton to be priced in the market place with direct payments to producers, and recognized the need for making U.S. cotton and U.S. textile mills competitive with foreign cotton mills. Delegates called for a program of payments to producers at 90 percent of parity and for more market research which would work toward bringing the price of cotton to 100 percent of parity for family farm producers.

5. In other resolutions, the convention:

\*Supported rural electric cooperatives and urged a congressional investigation of the "activities of power monopolies to destroy REA's and opposed any increase in interest rates for REA loans.

\*Called for expansion of domestic family farm allotments of sugar beets.

\*supported the sale of surplus wheat for cash to the Soviet Union.

\*Reaffirmed the organization's "strong belief in the true free-enterprise system" and pledged efforts to secure bargaining power for family farmers "that will permit them to receive a parity of income equal to all segments of the economy." Condemned were "large corporate farming enterprises" which are "replacing the family farmer."

\*Urged Secretary of Agriculture Orville Freeman to publicize the need for farm programs and the "tre-
