THE ARTESIAN WELLS

The Peces Valley Has the Largest Area of Flowing Wells in World-Belt 10 Miles by 60 Miles.

The Pecos Valley has the largwith the strongest body of pure water under them, of any region in the United States, if not in the world.

This "Artesian Belt" is, so far as is known, about ten miles wide and sixty miles long. No one as yet positively knows whether or not this is the full extent of the artesian area. Geologists agree that this district is fed by many streams and underground rivers. in their turn supplied by the melting snows and mountains. They also describe the peculiar and quite rare uuderground formation that makes flowing wells possible and makes their supply inexhaustible. There is an underground watersheet under all of the valley, and one exists, also, under the plains of the western Panhandle. It is the flowing well that is unusual and is alike valuable and beautiful where ever it exists.

It is seven years since the first flowing well was drilled in the Pecos Valley. There are more than 400 of them, and they are pouring out into what was once a desert more than 280,000 gallons per hour. They are from 240 to 1,000 feet deep, and cost from \$500 to \$3,000. But the deeper the

The average flowing well in the Pecos Valley will water two quart-er section (320 acres) and often with water to spare. Some have a flow that will irrigate twice that many acres.-Lake Arthur Times.

Sow Cow Peas.

Because of the wet and cold the corn planted early has rotted and the ground is too weedy to make it possible for a second planting. It is also too late now to plow and replant. In such it is wuch the best to wait till the ground can be properly plowed and then sowed to peas. They can be planted from six to eight weeks after the latest date for planting corn and still make an abundant and profitable growth.

Cow peas are the most profitable crop to plant on poor land. They make excellent fodder for live E. C. stock and are the best egg produc-ers if fed to poultry that I know of. Thursday. I have also noticed that the price of peas used for seed advances

A few years ago I sold seed for 60 to 75 cents per bushel; last year I could not supply the home demand at \$1.25 a bushel.

I have grown cow peas success fully after wheat has been harvest-

Plow the ground shallow, harrow well, then plant them They will ripen in time to drill in the fall wheat on the ground from which the peas were removed Cow peas are also a good crop to plant between rows of corn at the last plowing. Not only do they improve the soil, but the vines are eaten by the stock when they are turned into the stalks after the corn is gathered.—Jacob Faith -News, Woodward, Okla.

Good Railway Scheme

Roswell talks of giving \$100,000 to the first new railroad that reach es the city. Carlsbad is ready to come down with a handsome bon-There is not a town in the valley that would not give some thing. And over in the Panhand-le there are dozens of towns, growing and populous, that are ready to give a large share of all they pos sess, for the boon of a railroad connection with the outside world

A railroad between El Paso and the Pecos Valley, and a valley feeder, would cost \$2,500,000, to build and equip El Paso would take not less than \$200,000 of the bonds. Other cities and towns to be served would take \$200,000 more. Right of way could be had for nothing a good part of the way, and very cheaply elsewhere. Land would be dedicated in large tracts to the company for the privilege of having the railroad. No doubt immense grants of Tex-as state lands could be had if the road should go through them. Lands could be taken up very cheaply for townsites, and large profits made.



ROUGH TRAVEL IN LABRADOR Excitement of Shooting the Rapids in Frail Cance.

The rapids continued the characteristics of the river and were ter-rific. Often it would seem that no canoe could ride the high, white waves, or that we could not avoid the swirl of mighty cross-current eddies, which would have swallowed up our canoe like a chip, had we got up our canoe like a chip, had we got into them. There were rapids whose roar could be distinctly heard for five or six miles. These we approached with the greatest care, and portaged around the worst places. The water was so clear that often we found ourselves dodging rocks which, when we passed them, were 10 or 12 feet below the surface. It was here that a peculiar optical illusion occurred.
