## THE ARTESIAN WELLS

## The Peces Valley has the largest Ara

 of Flowing Wells in World-Balt 10 Miles by 60 Miles.The Pecos Valley has the larg est area of artesian or flowing wells with the strongest body of pure water under them, ot any region in the United States, if not in the world.
This "Artesian Belt" is, so far as is known, about ten miles wide and sixty miles long. No one an yet positively knows whether or not this is the full extent of the artesian area. Geologists agree hat this district is fed by many streams and underground rivers. in their turn supplied by the melt-
ing snows and ing snows and rain fall of distant mountains. They also describe the peculiar and quite rare uuderground formation that makes flowing wells possible and makes their supply inexhaustible. There is an underground watersheet under all of the valley, and one exists, also, under the plains of the western Panhandle. It is the lowalike valuable and beautiful where ever it exists.
It is seven years since the first flowing well was drilled in the Pecos Valley. There are more than ;oo of them, and they are
pouring out into what was once a pouring out into what was once a
desert more than 280,000 gallons desert more than 280,000 gallons
per hour. They are from 240 to ooo feet deep, and cost from $\$_{500}$ o $\$ 3,000$. But the deeper the well the larger the volume of watr, so that the final cost of water is equalized. Thereafter there is no water tax per year and no cost of any kind. Absolute independnan with $a$ well is wealthy in and a lowing whose ret urns are sure. The average flowing well in the Pecos Valley will water two quarter section ( 320 acres) and often with water to spare. Some have a low that will irrigate twice that many acres.-Lake Arthur Times.

The proposition as a whole is the most fascinating railroad scheme in the United States today.
