in in various colors. One very fine
specimen was found in the necronospecimen was found in the necropm
lis at a depth of twenty-five feet
O On the cover is a figure of a woman executed in the Greek style, with long garment reaching to the ankles and a veil covering her head. Great technical skill is shown in treating the different tissues. The flesh parts are well polished and the eyes are painted, giving a lifelike aspect. The lair is gilded. Inside the sarcophagus were found the remains of the
rerson, wi'h some bronze objects. THE TYPHONOID.
"Typhonoid," a word derived from Greek term meaning whirlwind has been applied to a new type of
boat invented by a French engineer, who seeks to do away with the pres ent-day screw propeller. The new screw is placed at the bow of the
hoat ins'ead of at the stern, and it is
bit believed that by it the centrifugal displacement and the central void of
the present type are converted into benefits and the limit to the advanrageous increase in velocity of rota
tion of the propeller is removed. The apparatus is designed to work by suction in the manner of a waterspout. The inventor figures that hig
