

displacement and the central void of the present type are converted into benefits and the limit to the advan-rageous increase in velocity of rota-tion of the propeller is removed. The apparatus is designed to work by suction in the manner of a water-spont. The inventor figures that his boat, with a 32½-inch screw, will go through the water at a rate of more than 62 miles an hour.






