The Riddance of Insect Pests. are beginning to be the greatest en emies of New Mexico fruit growers. Only a few years ago, New Mexico could send train loads of apples
to eastern markets to eastern markets with the legend: worm," but it cannot do so angle more and not only apples but other fruit suffers. The spraying of
trees mitigates the evil where fruit growers of a district spray fre-
quently and diligently quently and diligently but at the best, spraying is a costly, clumsy
and ineffective method. It merely emphasizes the need of a real and economical exterminator, and it
sems that the Germans have hit upon a plan that is proving re-
markably efficacious. It has been tried at Zittau, Saxony, and the apparattus, portable in form, will
