John R. Hodges, Just Home From the South, Gives His Views on the Alfalfa Situation

John R. Hodges returned this week from a trip to the south in the interests of the Alfalfa Growers and Shippers Association, he picked up a good deal of in-formation during his two months stay in the markets. In speaking of his trip to a News reporter, Mr. Hodges said: "The people of the south and

east know very little about alfalfa, but a great many of them have read or heard of the Pecos Valley crop and are eager to give it a trial. What alfalfa they have had in that part of the country has been raised in Oklahoma, and is of a dark color and not the bright green of the Pecos Valley brand. It is selling well in New Orleans, Memphis and other markets in neighborhood, prices for hav being. Timothy. \$12.50 to \$13.50 per ton; Clover, \$4.50 to \$5.50 per ton, and alfalfa \$15.50 to \$16.50 per ton.

"In nearly every instance where we had competion with other val-ley towns, they cut under us from 50 cents to \$1.00 per ton, when there was really no need for it. All of the alfalfa shipped out could have been sold at the top prices had the representatives of other towns held up for it. I think the best thing we could do here in the Pecos Valley, would be to form an association under one head, and stick up for the highest market

prices at all times.

"Another thing the farmers should look after in packing the alfalfa in the cars. One car which was shipped from here was packed very loosely and the bottom layer of bales were all broken open when the car reached Memphis. For-tunately the wholesale dealers we the wholesale dealers we shipped to were very oblidging and they took the car just the same.

"When the news of the train load first shipped reached New

Orleans, the wholesale men spread the news abroad through the papers, and it went all over the east. They received inquiries about the hay from as far east as Massachu-setts. One man especially wanted a picture of the train to advertise with, but as the railroad had refused to let us put banners on the cars no pictures were taken. I hope to get some good photographs from the next train we send out.
"We have orders in now for ov-

er sixty cars, but so far have been unable to get the alfalfa. Unless




