This And That About One Thing and Another

Many editors from this area attended the State Press meeting in Dallas last week and were privileged to have Gen. MacArthur and his family as guests at the meeting. Following are comments by Editor Deskin Wells of the Wellington Leader, on his impressions of the distinguished guest:

All the editors got to shake hands with General Douglas MacArthur. He and his wife and their son Arthur know how to meet the public. They give the impression of being tireless and were most gracious and the editors gave them a tremendous ovation as they entered and as they departed.

But I suspect the ovation was for a great military leader and not for a potential candidate for the presidency. Most Texas editors don't want to have to choose between either MacArthur or Truman. They would like to vote for other men. Some say that MacArthur has no intention of running for president. (Of course they know he would run if he could get the nomination.) These editors think that Gen. MacArthur is trying to form public opinion and place himself in a position where he will be a key figure in determining our policy in Asia. They think this is good; but they shut up about the presidency. They revere MacArthur as a military man.

Most of the editors think that Truman is going to run again, and all but two of them shudder at the prospect. Two bosom friends of mine, one in Floresville and one in Panhandle, would probably vote for that Truman again. I talked to hundreds. All the rest are fed up with Mr. Truman.

Editors don't want a professional soldier for president if they can have some other choice. But if they have to take a soldier, Eisenhower will be their choice. That is no poll and it is not scientific. It is my simple opinion after talking to hundreds of editors.

Leg Is Mangled In Combine Accident

Charley Gowin was the victim of a most deplorable accident about 5 o'clock Monday afternoon when his right leg became entangled in the power take-off on a small combine and was so badly mangled that it had to be amputated.

Mr. Gowin was cutting wheat on the Paul Hamilton place about 4 1/2 miles northeast of Quitaque. He was pulling his AC combine with his tractor and had gotten off the machine to adjust it and it was when he started to climb back onto the tractor that his pants leg became entangled in the machinery. Paul Hamilton was with him in the field and as quickly as he could he released the injured man, helped him into his pickup and drove into Quitaque.

They went immediately to the Daniel Funeral Home where Mr. Gowin was transferred to the ambulance and taken to the hospital at Matador. There he was given a sedative and sent without delay to the Lubbock Memorial hospital. Examination disclosed that immediate amputation was necessary and the operation was performed.

A. B. Ramsey, Jr. accompanied Mr. Gowin in the ambulance, while Mr. Hamilton notified Mrs. Gowin and other members of the family of the accident, and they went as quickly as possible to the hospital to be with the injured man.

The leg was removed about four inches below the knee. Word from the hospital stated that Mr. Gowin was getting along as well as could be expected and today (Thursday) he was resting well.

WATCH OUT FOR ACCIDENTS ON THE FOURTH

The calendar may save your life this Fourth of July! That was the unusual statement issued today by Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, in pointing out that the Fourth this year will fall in mid-week, thus affording a single holiday for most people.

Because of the Wednesday holiday, Garrison emphasized that many lives will be saved that might otherwise be forfeit to a longer period. To rely on the calendar to save your life, however, is to gamble with safety, he added.

Every holiday is a day of increased hazards, Garrison said, due to the increase traffic volume and the other extra hazards which usually accompany periods of relaxation. All of these demand extra caution to avert disaster.

Last year 40 lives were lost in traffic accidents alone during the long four-day 4th of July holiday in Texas. This year the toll will be considerably less but still twice the normal for an average Wednesday. Traffic will claim 10 victims on the single day in the State this year Garrison estimates. Still another 28 persons will die of drownings and other non-traffic violence on that day.

A terrific price to pay to celebrate our independence!

He was staying with his grandmother, Mrs. Elmo Pointer, while his mother is in Cisco with her mother Mrs. John Childers who is seriously ill, and Mrs. Pointer brought him to Dr. Powers for attention. Later he was taken in the Daniel Ambulance to the Stanley hospital at Matador where he could be kept quiet and under the doctor's observation. He is getting along ok, and the wound is not considered serious at this time.

FREE X-RAY IN TURKEY TO SERVE THIS AREA

Hall County's x-ray drive will open July 3 in Turkey and x-ray headquarters will be set up in the hospital building according to Drew Holcomb and Mrs. Carl Kulp, chairmen for the county drive.

The office will be open from 9 a. m. to 5:00 p. m. and the x-rays are free of charge and takes only a few minutes.

Dr. Powers urges those in the Quitaque area who possibly can take advantage of the mobile x-ray unit in Turkey. Dr. Powers stated that the results from the tubercular survey which was conducted in Briscoe county last year showed a high percentage of positive tests. Anyone 14 years old, or older, is eligible.

COMMISSIONER OF AGG. WARNS USERS OF 2,4-D

Austin.—Numerous reports of crop damages from hormone herbicides, such as 2,4-D, are coming in to the Commissioner's office daily. The majority of these crop damages are being caused by people using this chemical who are without State license to do so. Such license may be obtained from the State Department of Agriculture upon application in writing for a nominal fee.

People using 2,4-D or any of its derivatives should bear this in mind. In addition to a general law protecting people against injury, there is a special law governing the use and sale of 2,4-D or any of its derivatives in many of the counties in Texas. Such local officials as the county judge, the county attorney, or perhaps the county agent and vocational teacher in agriculture can give good advice on the contents of this special law regulating the use and sale of these chemicals referred to above, commonly called "weed-killers."

A "day of reckoning" is coming to a lot of folk if they do not observe the provisions of this law regulating the use and sale of these "weed-killers."

Briefly, users of these "weed-killer" should be registered with the State Department of Agriculture showing they have a bond, permit or license. The sellers of this chemical should do the same. The law requires this in many of the counties in Texas, and as stated above, your local officials know to which counties this law applies. In such counties, the Department is obliged to inspect your 2,4-D spraying equipment and many inspect the land where it is to be used. All this is for the purpose of protecting valuable crops such as cotton, legumes, shrubs, and vegetables against injury; and at the same time allow producers of such crops as grass, small grain, and rice to kill out their weeds and brush.

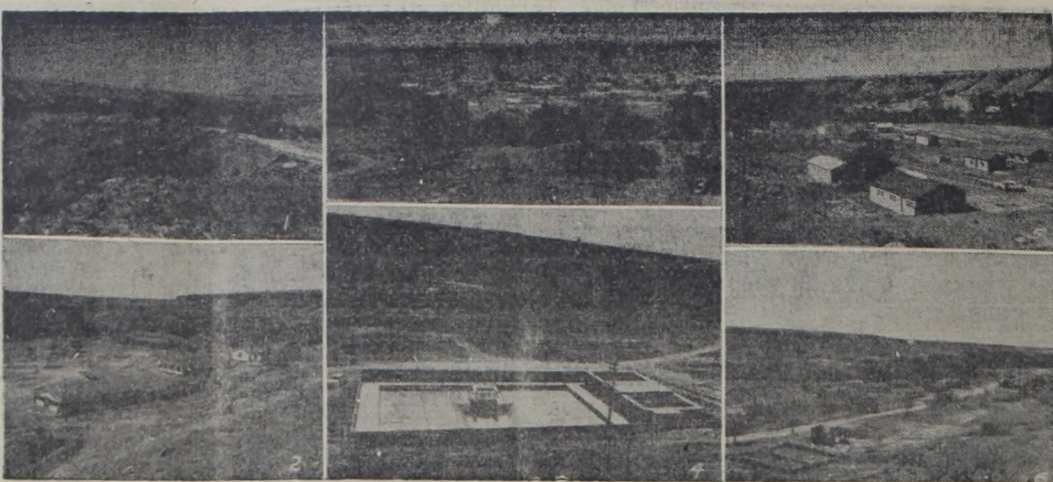
