



Connally deleted a \$600,000 Connally deleted a \$600,000 appropriation which would have allowed the New Texas Re-search Institute of Mental Sciences at Houston to lease and operate hospital facilities. "This item was not requested by the Department of Mental Health and Mental Retardation in its budget request, nor was it included in my burget recom-mendations or those of the Bud-get Board," the Governor ex-plained.
