LETTER RECEIVED FROM PRINCIPAL MITCHELL AT AMARILLO VET'S HOSPITAL

The following letter was received by S. G. "Pops" Clark last week from school principal J. B. Mitchell soon after Mr Mitchell was admitted to the hospital for medical treatment. "Pops" thought it would be of interest to many of our readers and gave permission for its publication.

"Dear Pops:

Checked in here Saturday without any trouble. They immediately took my car keys and put them in a safe, locked up my clothes, put me in bed, took my robe and slippers and said "stay there". So I'm back on complete bed rest again, what a life!

For once Earl was right about something, the food here is excellent and would compare favorably to that of the Silver Grill. Also believe it or not, there is more at each meal than I can comfortably eat, but the guards stand around and say "eat it all". I don't believe they will be happy until they get me back to 250 lbs. again.

Yesterday a little ray of sunshine came into my room and said he had hepatitis too, had been in for 61 days, went home for 3 weeks, had a relapse and now was back.

He concluded his visit by saying "We had another hepatitis patient in the room next to yours but he died Friday".

With these cheerful words he went on down the hall.

Be seeing you, I hope. "Mitch".

Guest speaker Reeves addressed the Lions Club with the opening phrase, "Water is needed so much in the State of Texas". He went on to explain that Texas is divided into three sections: the high plains area, the central area, and the Red Bed in which we are located. In his statement he explained that the water on the high plains would soon be exhausted and that some other means of supplying water would have to be sought. He also stated that 12 per cent of all the land in the U. S. was irrigated land and that in his estimation, the time would come when the state as a whole will have a network of pipe lines for irrigation purposes.

Lion Reeves was very much interested in Quitaque River and from the facts he had learned, was amazed of the total of four million gallons of water that is escaping each day without being used. He stated it was a shame all this precious water was going to waste and wished that somewhere, somehow, something could be done about it. Not just one or two individuals can put the current Dam project through; it will take the combined help of each and everyone in this area, and all the outside help we can get to make this project become a reality.

In his closing statement, Lion Reeves said to "keep working on it for tomorrow may be too late."

GUAR PROVES TO BE A PROFITABLE GRAIN CROP

There has been a lot of interest lately in the harvesting of Guar in this area. Although planted primarily as a soil builder, Guar is proving that it can hold its own, and in many cases surpass grain as a cash crop.

There was about 1200 acres of Guar planted this year around Quitaque, and as the combining of the crop has just started all of the yields are not yet in. However, most fields have averaged about 500 pounds per acre, and at 4 cents a pound, it amounts to a pretty fair dry-land crop.

Dean Dyer planted only five acres this year, but from that 5 acres he harvested 618 pounds an acre. His Guar netted him \$18.00 an acre while feed in the same field only made \$10.00, so he intends to plant about forty acres more next year.

Wendell Morris down Flomot way is also very satisfied with the way his twenty acres of Guar turned out. While his Guar crop averaged slightly under 500 pounds an acre it nevertheless almost doubled the money which was made on the same number of acres planted in feed.

Glynn Morrison has cut 700 pounds an acre on his place at Gasoline for the best yield to date. He says he made more per acre on his Guar than he did on his feed even though a lot of his feed made 1100 pounds an acre. His net Guar returns were about \$24.00 per acre. He feels that the added soil building benefits from Guar to following crops will be worth at least another \$10.00 an acre, and he intends to devote additional acres to it again next year.

A standard combine is used for the harvest of Guar, and the seed are bought by Merrell Food & Produce, who is the buying agent for General Mills in this territory.

Firemodel models include a 4-door sedan, now on display in the Bedwell showroom, sportsman hardtop, convertible coupe, special coupe, and station wagon all featuring a V-8 engine rated at 185 horsepower.

The Firelite series consist of 4-door sedans, sportsman hardtops and convertible coupes powered by the new 200 horsepower hemispheric combustion chamber V-8 engine.

The Matador Matadors eased by the Quitaque Panthers 20-0 here last Friday night in a hard fought game before what was surely one of the largest crowds ever to witness a football game here.

The game was a good one. It was rough and hard-fought and though the Matador crew outscored the Panthers, they did not out-battle the locals. It was an even closer game than the score indicated and with a few breaks on offense the score would have been much closer and could have gone in the Panthers favor. The locals dropped at least two sure touch-down passes. Other receivers dropped passes that would have meant first downs that would have kept scoring drives alive.

However, that is the breaks in the game and we aren't criticizing the Panthers. Every one of the Panther fans was pleased with the performance of the Quitaque team—they were battling all the way and the Matadors will have to admit that they had to work for every foot of the ground they gained.

The Matadors had been running roughshod over the other members of the district. In previous games the Matador offense had been sparked by the running of Harold Dean Martin, a medium-sized scat back, who had broken loose for long runs in every game to break the backs and spirit of the opposition. Friday night young Martin did not hurt the Panthers. He was well checked most of the way—and only a couple of times did he break away for more than ten yards. He got loose once for a ten yard scamper for a touchdown only to have it called back because of a penalty. The big gun for the visitors on offense was a big Sophomore bruiser fullback named Ellithorp. He was the boy who scored 19 of the Matadors 20 points and the only one who could consistently gain against the Panthers.

The Matadors were hurt by penalties, the visitors losing 109 yards via rules infractions, according to our unofficial figures. Seven of these penalties were for major infractions and three of them were for 5 yards each. The Panthers were penalized only 5 yards.

According to our notes, neither team lost the ball on fumble.

The Panthers took the opening kickoff and ran it out the 30 yard line and after managng only to pick up 4 yards, punted to Matador on their own 40. The visitors, with the aid of the Panthers only penalty, picked up one first down and then were held by the Panthers.

Matador then punted out on the Quitaque 10 yard line. The locals moved the ball out to the 35 where they stalled and then got off a short kick to the Matador 41. On the first play the Matadors caught the Panthers napping and Ellithorp went 59 yards for a TD. The extra point try was no good and right here a team of lesser caliber than the Panthers might have figured "what's the use" and let down but the Panthers only tightened up their defense and stopped the Matador scoring for the remainder of the first two periods and twice moved inside the Matador 30 yard line, only to bog down and lose the ball on downs.

The score at the half was 0-0 and still anyone's ball game. I wasn't until late in the third period that the visitors were able to push over for the second score. This drive started on the Matador 41 and with Ellithorp carrying on almost every play, the Matadors moved to a first down on the Quitaque 5. It took Ellithorp four tries to push it over from there and then he

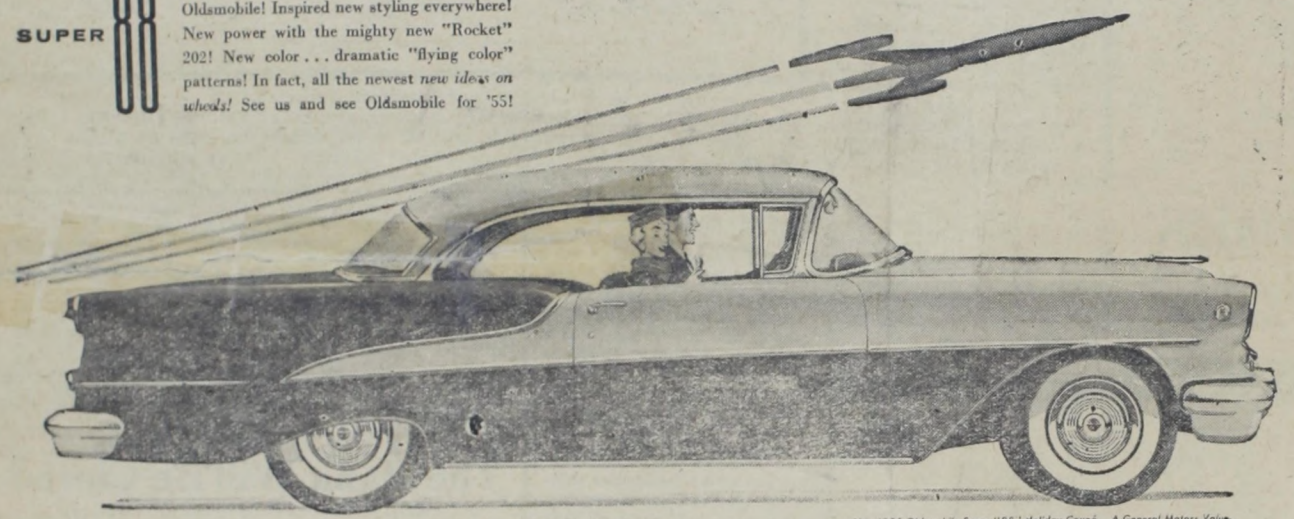

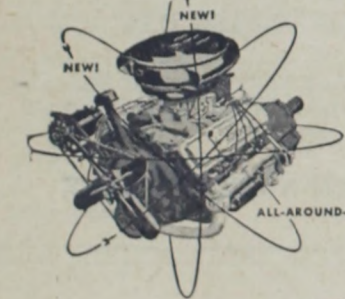

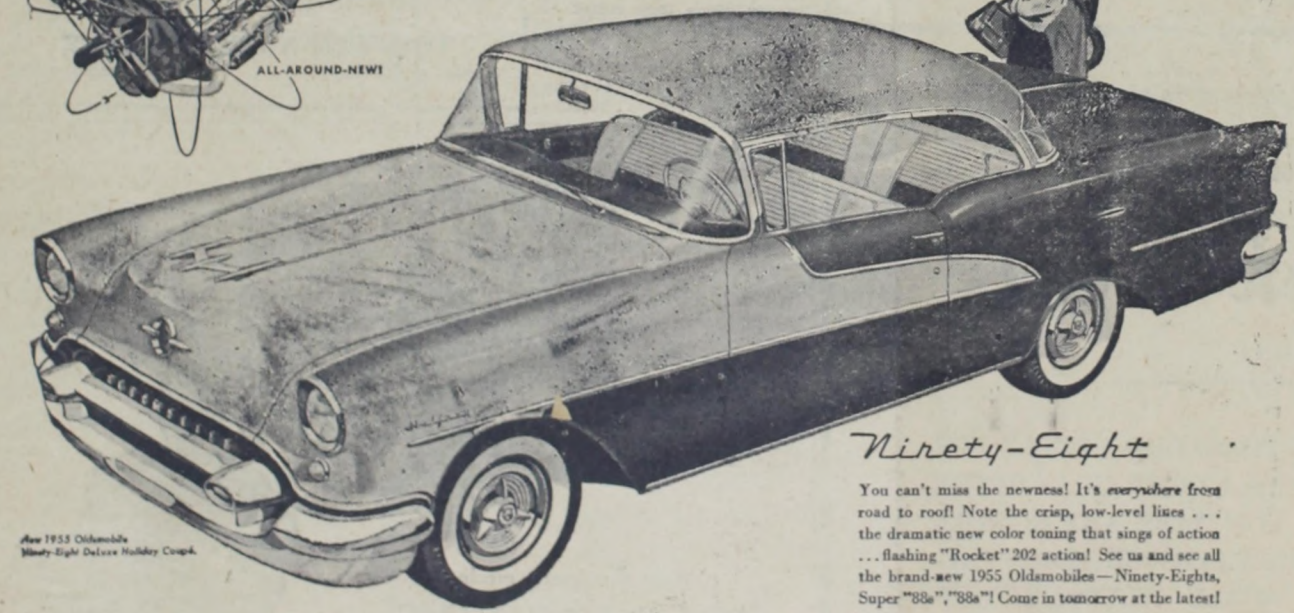
