\$20,000 FOR CALLAHAN SCHOOLS other district in the county, having

The following schools in Callahan county started last Monday, October 3d: Hart, Erath, Zion Hill, Dressy, Lone Pecan, Cedar Grove, Turkey Creek, Admiral, Cardner and Ione.

This makes seventeen schools of the cennty in operation at the present time, with quite a number beginning on the 10th and 17th. By the first of November, practically all the schools in the county will be in operation.

County Superintendent B. C. Chrisman, by tomorrow, will have completed a visit to all state and schools of the county, checking up on the equipment and making out are estimate of the amount of state aid needed for the coming term. Out of the thirty-five schools applying for aid, with the exception of one, all are applying for enough aid to run a seven months' school.

A petition is being circulated in the Turkey Creek District to raise the local tax to 50 cents and also for a bond issue to build a new school building.

PREACHING FARM DIVERSIFICATION

Baird Star: The Galveston-Dallas News has been preaching diversification for a generation. Keep it up, and maybe after another generation or two our people will see that it does not pay to risk all on one crop. Old habits are hard to break, but our people must break away from cotton unless they want to remain forever the poorest paid farmers on earth. The Star man was born and reared in a cotton section of Texas, Washington county, but never had much experience as a cotton raiser until after the Civil War, and we got enough in four years to do us, and we quit it cold.

The News has "been preaching diversification for a generation."
It expects to keep it up for another generation, or until such preaching is no longer needed. We see this year what a half crop of cotton does the isn't a bit hanghty for the price, just as we saw last Unless the Sophs are naughty. year what a double crop does for it. The South has a fine resource in its ability to grow cotton. Cotton is normally in steady demand by every country in the world. But like any other good thing, cotton can be overdone. The South has habitually overdone cotton, with the result that most cotton raisers have fared The extra acreage and poorly. careful attention given to self-support crops by Southern farmers this year have resulted in making them, for the time seing, more nearly in dependent of the grocery and feed stores than they have ever been. Is it possible that this desirable condition will be exchanged next year for the old and undesirable condition, only because a short cotton crop in 1921 put the price up to a level that attracts cotton growers?
Will our people reaffirm their independence in 1922 or will they gravitate backward under the feet of the tyrant King Cotton once more? State Press has lived all his life in the South, but he is not ready to say that Southern farmers have been weaned by hard experience from cotton gambling. The sporting incotton gambling. 
