Bank To Observe 40th Anniversary

SCOUTS BRING HOME TWO RIBBONS FROM CAMP-O-REE LAST WEEK-END

Last Friday a group of boys from Explorer Post 64 and Boy Scout Troop 64 left Quitaque to attend the 50th Anniversary Jubilee-Camp-o-ree held in Lubbock by the South Plains Council, Boy Scouts of America. These boys were: Dellis Monk, Robin Harmon, Kenneth Vines, Ray Gene Hutcheson, Jack Johnson, Warren Lee Merrell, Rex Harmon, Dusty Bailey, Walter Taylor, Mike Baird, and Ricky Boggs. After arriving at McKenzie State Park, which was to be the location for the camp-o-ree, we found the sight where Haynes District was to camp. After setting up camp and having supper, we attended a get-acquainted campfire where we met other boys from Haynes District and also some from the Longhorn District.

After the campfire we decided to go to the Amusement Park. So we rode the Ferris Wheels and Tilt-A-Whirls for about 45 minutes before turning in for the night.

The next morning after breakfast we began practicing on our Scout Skills. So when time for the contest to begin (2:00) we were prepared. We finished the Scout Skills contest about 5:30, although we wouldn't know who won until that night.

As we wearily walked back into camp we found a surprise for us. While we were gone the officials were conducting a camp inspection of all the camps. Our surprise was that, out of the whole South Plains Council, 28 troops, we had the best camp and got a "Blue Ribbon" which was about two feet long. Most of the credit for this ribbon goes to Robin Harmon and Kenneth

Vines. While we were entering the contests Robin and Kenneth stayed in camp and straightened up all the tents, picked up all paper, and really cleaned up the camp good. We've got proof that these boys did a good job, a "Blue Ribbon." That night we were to find out that the rest of the boys also did a very fine job.

That night was the climax of our trip. After dark approximately 300 Boy Scouts and about the same amount of parents gathered around the stage for the presentation of awards, gifts, and most of all the appearance of our guest star, a Hollywood TV Star.

We were very happy with the results of the contest. We were the only ones in the Haynes District that placed. Out of 28 troops that entered the Scout Skills contests we got 3rd place and another 2 ft. ribbon.

Now came the part of the program that everyone had been waiting for, the personal appearance of their favorite TV Star, Bob Denver, better known as Maynard Krebs, the Beatnik on the Dobbie Gillis TV Series. TOP 'O TEXAS RODEO OPENS MON

The shut gates for the 16th Top 'O Texas Rodeo will swing open Monday, August 1st with the Kid Pony Show scheduled for that afternoon and night.

The Rodeo proper will begin Tuesday night, August 2nd at 8:00 P. M. preceded by a giant street parade at 3:00 P. M., led by a Amarillo Air Force Band under the direction of Capt. E. S. Bridges. Other bands appearing in the parade line-up will be the Pampa High School Band under the direct-

ion of Bill Tregoe and the Miller Bros. Western Dance Band of Wichita Falls. Bill Tidwell, Parade Marshal, has issued an invitation to the Riding Clubs, Ranch entries, Civic Club entries, and Commercial Divisions to place entries in the parade which will form on West Foster at 2:15 P. M.

Prizes totaling more than \$5,000.00 supplemented with many handsome trophies to winners in the respective events will be the target of some three hundred cowboys and cowgirls expected for the big event.

An Official American Quarter Horse Show is scheduled for Thursday and Friday, August 4 & 5 with a record number of horses from the Southwest expected to be entered.

An outstanding feature of this year's show will be the Calf Scramble which will be presented Wednesday, Thursday, Friday, and Saturday nights with 4 H Club boys from the area contesting for some twenty choice calves which have been donated to the show for this thrilling event.

The colorful cowgirl's contest which is considered one of the top Cowgirl's events in the nation will feature more than forty girls from the Southwest area. A handsome hand-stamped saddle will be presented the cowgirl compiling the best average in the contest, plus cash prizes which will be split to the winners of 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place.

The crack Pampa High School Band under the baton of Bill Tregoe will furnish music for all Rodeo performances while the Miller Bros. Western Dance Band of Wichita Falls will play for dancing in the National Guard Armory Building following an appearance at the Rodeo.

The Rodeo Office is located in the lobby of the Pampa Hotel where registrations are handled and tickets for the show may be purchased.

NEWS FROM THE COUNTY AGENT

Thursday, is the day in the week that your County Agent is in the Quitaque area and I usually check in at the City Hall for a headquarters. This past Thursday, I had a nice visit with Floyd Benson. Floyd, in my opinion is about the best wheat producer in Briscoe County. His wheat yields over the past seven years are right at double the County average. How does he do this in a country that isn't supposed to be a real good wheat country? To be honest he doesn't have any set of rules, but right away when talking to Floyd you will find out that he is a real student of wheat. He probably knows more about wheat than any person you will run on to. For example, several years ago when Crockett was released from the Experiment Station to growers, I encouraged Floyd to make an early planting knowing that his decision about the wheat would be one that I could depend on. Some three years and four crops later and after being subjected to varying conditions he tells me that it is a real fine wheat and certainly one of the better ones. His only objection was that it is three to four days later than Wichita and Triumph. The yield and the quality is very good.

He further stated that he planned to put his present crop in it and some of the Oklahoma Triumph that Mr. Dannie developed.

Mr. Benson is one who knows that water is the key to production. He conserves every bit of the water that falls on his place by using stubble tillage practices that control moisture robbing weeds and leaves the top soil like a sponge to take up the water. Right now he has ample moisture for a good crop next year, and you can depend on it.

This week is Farm Safety Week. I regret now that we as a County group and through the Extension Program Building Committee have not done more to make farming safer in this County. When I look

around, I can think of many accidents that could have been prevented: Fingers being cut off by rotary mowers, arms being broken, and others. These are accidents that have happened right here. Some people may say "what the heck, farming is no different from any other occupation," but figures from the National Safety Council show farming is the most hazardous occupation in the State. The death loss in farming is slightly higher than any other occupation.

Last spring, I was asked to give a program on farm safety to the Gasoline Farmers Union. It was rather incidental that a major tractor accident occurred in that community that very day. This just goes to prove that safety is needed at home.
