A Silverton man, discharged from the Navy two weeks ago, was killed early Monday morning when his car skidded out of control, overturned and hit a telephone pole. Two other young men, passengers in the car, escaped injury.

Jim Hardin, 22, was pronounced dead on arrival at Swisher County Hospital in Tulla.

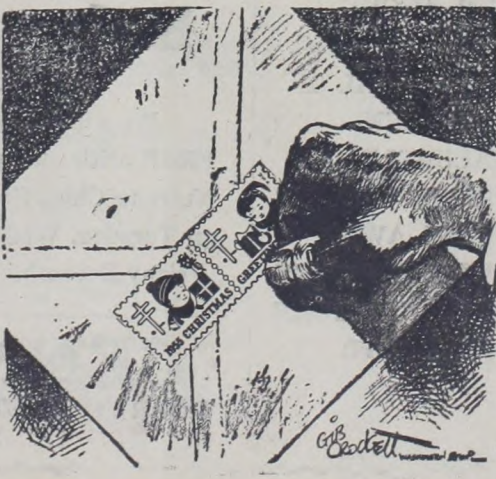
The seventh and eighth grade girls will be a part of the TV show while the boys will assist in other ways.

PUBLIC SHOULD SEND CHRISTMAS MAIL EARLY

A steady increase in the flow of Christmas cards and packages through the local post office has been noted in the past few days, according to Postmaster S. T. Bogan. He said he is pleased to see that many persons are getting Christmas gifts for distant points into the mail, pointing out that packages addressed to residents of other states should be mailed before December 10. Those destined for nearby points should also be dispatched before December 10.

Stressing the need for everyone to cooperate with the 1955 "Mail Early for Christmas" campaign, Sid said that by following three simple rules, senders are certain to have their gifts delivered before Christmas Day. These rules are: Wrap gifts securely, address packages correctly, and mail them early.

He went on to say, "Of course early mailing of Christmas cards and gifts is a big factor in getting everything delivered before Christmas. Keep in mind that careful packing and correct addressing is equally important. Every year many poorly-wrapped packages break open despite care-

ful handling and we often have to puzzle over addresses which are incomplete or simply cannot be read at all."

Advance care in preparing gift packages for the mails are making sure that all addresses are legible and complete will prevent disappointment to the sender and receiver alike.

It is always better to use corrugated cartons for shipping gifts especially where there are a number of various sized objects. Use plenty of wadded tissue or news paper in the cartons for extra protection against shock. Complete each package by wrapping in a heavy paper and tying it with a strong cord.

As an extra precaution against loss, Sid advised placing both the sender's and the recipient's address inside the carton or package before it is wrapped.

Don't seal parcels unless a notice reading "Contents merchandise" may be opened for postal inspection is included, along with the return address and the recipient's address on the mailing label. If Christmas stickers or seals are used put them on the back of Christmas cards and packages so that they will not conflict with the address on the front. Before

packages are released be sure that proper postage is firmly affixed to each.

Postmaster Bogan said Wednesday that senders of holiday greeting cards are finding it more to their advantage to use a 3-cent stamp instead of the usual 2-cent stamp. In this way they are permitted to add their own personal messages, sealing the envelopes, and also, in case the recipient has moved, the card can be forwarded. When a 2-cent stamped card cannot be delivered to the address thereon, it is returned to the sender.

SOCIAL SECURITY NEWS

Self-employed farmers will, for the first time, in 1956, pay social security tax on their farm income for 1955 according to John R. Sanderson, manager of the Social Security Office in Amarillo, Tex. If you are a self-employed farmer and have earnings of \$400 or more a year, you must file a report of your self-employed farm income at the same time you file your income tax return.

The social security tax is 3 percent of the self-employed farmer's earnings up to a total of \$4200 in earnings. If you work, or have other types of self-employed income, earnings from these sources may be combined with your farm earnings up to a combined total of \$4200 according to John R. Sanderson.

The fact that you own a farm does not automatically make you a self-employed farmer under the Social Security Law. To be self-employed, you must actually engage in the operation of a farm, either alone, or in partnership with someone else.

The rental or lease of a farm to someone else is not self-employed for social security purposes, and income from such sources is not considered farm income even though it is in the form of crops or cash. Such income is considered rental estate and is excluded from earnings that count for social security purposes.

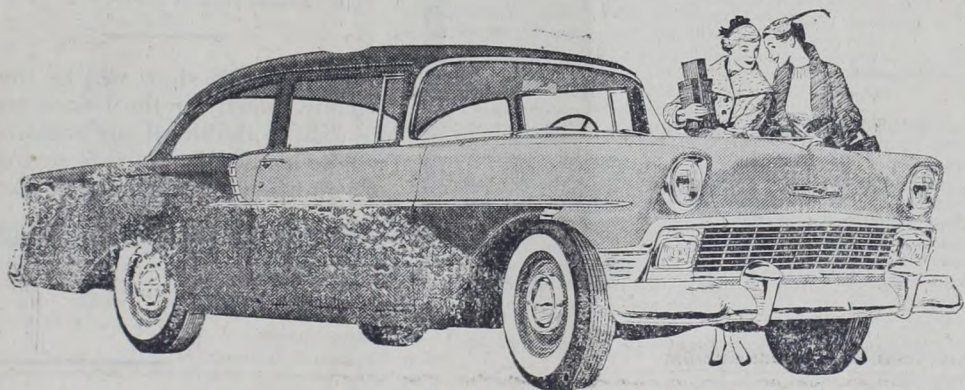

Texas Department of Public Safety

Captain J. W. Blackwell, Commanding Officer of the Amarillo Highway Patrol District stated that, during the week between November 6 and 12, the Texas Highway Patrol, using routine enforcement techniques, checked some 48,642 motorists on the rural highways in Texas to determine whether they had valid driver's licenses. As a result of the check 1562 arrests for drivers license violations and other hazardous traffic violations were made. 95.5% of all Texas drivers contacted were found to have valid driver's licenses.

Captain Blackwell advised that the 20 Highway Patrolmen working in the 26 county Amarillo District, using routine enforcement procedures, contacted 1370 motorists and made a total of 47 arrests for driver's license vio-

lations and other hazardous traffic violations as a result of those contacts. 95.5% of all Texas drivers contacted in the Amarillo District were found to have valid driver's licenses.

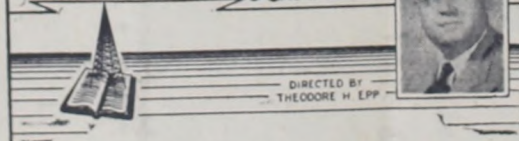
