GINNING REPORT

This week's ginning report shows their total has reached into the 2,000 bale bracket, with the amount up to Wednesday evening being 2,558 bales.

The cotton has been coming in at a fast rate during the past two weeks now that field hands are a little more plentiful than before. Lots of transient hands are working in this area, however, a few of the farmers are still short of helpers.

It is their hope that the nice weather continues as it has been until their cotton crop is all pulled and delivered to the gin.

Ginners estimate that dry land cotton is turning out from a third to a half a bale per acre; some fields even more.

Maximum capacity of our two gins for a period of a week amounts to around 1,000 bales. This week's operation of 1,054 bales show that the gins still have a couple hundred more to go before they can reach that capacity mark.
