The ceremony was performed in the presence of relatives and a number of close friends at the home of Mr and Mrs Dennis Manly, the bride's uncle and aunt. The beautiful double ring service was read by Dr James F Cox, president of Abilene Christian college. Spring blossoms, stressing a pink and white motif, and trailing ivy were used to make the rooms fragrant and attractive.

Miss Ruth Shelton, a student at ACC, was her sister's attendant. She wore a navy frock and natural straw hat, and shoulder corsage of white carnations. Hollis Manly was Mr Rucker's best man and Mrs Manly played the wedding music.



GOOD RAINS RECEIVED

Nice rains Friday and Wednesday gave Quitaque area some much needed moisture. In town the total fall was 1.08 inches, bringing the total for the month to 1.55 inches. Some farmers say they have not received enough moisture to plant on while others received rains of flood proportions. The heavy rains have been north of town where approximately four inches fell Friday and another two or three inches Wednesday, according to reports.

The rain Friday scarcely reached the southern outskirts of the city, but Wednesday gave the farmers of that area from a half to two inches of moisture. Two inches or better was reported from Flomot community.

At a school board meeting some time ago teachers for the coming year were chosen. Those elected for grade school are Joe D Slack, principal; Mrs Bruce Browning, Mrs Chester Hawkins, Miss Mary Lee Cooper, Miss Sybil Hazel and Miss Agnes Cottingham.

The high school faculty chosen for next year is composed of Sam Bryan, principal and coach; Raymond King, vocational agriculture teacher; Miss Anna May Curtis of Hedley, graduate of Texas Tech, homemaking teacher; Mrs E W Scheid, Mrs Faye Scoggins, and Roger Street.

Supt. Scheid was re-elected several months ago. At the close of the present term he will have completed his seventh year as superintendent of the Quitaque schools. Under his supervision the curriculum has been changed from purely academic courses to the more modern ideas of business administration and vocational training. This year for the first time vocational agriculture was offered and the course proved very satisfactory, the school being awarded 1 1-2 credits of affiliation on the work and the students taking the course finding it both profitable and pleasant.

Local Group Attends Funeral of Pioneer

A party of Quitaque pioneers, Mr and Mrs O W Stroup, J B Russell, J H Hughes and Jim Taylor attended funeral services in Matador Tuesday for A B Echols, 80 years old, banker and pioneer rancher, who was buried there late Tuesday. He died at Plainview Monday.

Funeral services were held at the Baptist church of which he had been a member for 50 years.

Echols, born in 1859 in Chattanooga county, Georgia, came to Jack County, Texas in 1880 and engaged in the cattle business ten years before moving to Motley county.

He had been president of the First State Bank of Matador for a quarter of a century and at one time was president of the City National Bank of Childress.

His career also included railroad-ing. For eleven years he headed the 8-mile Motley County Railroad, built in 1914 to connect with the Quanah, Acme and Pacific south of Matador. Echols was a member of various masonic orders and was on the executive committee of the Texas Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association.

As well as attend FFA meetings, and school, we find that 75 per cent of our FFA boys participate in weekly religious activities. We are very happy to report this and one of the aims of the FFA is to build character and certainly one of the best ways to build character is to attend church and Sunday school regularly.

According to the long-time supervised practice program of each boy it showed that the FFA boys are carrying a total 2.8 projects each taking the average of every boy. Some boys are carrying as many as six projects while others are carrying only one or two. These projects include productive enterprises, feeding projects and crop projects. Each boy also has a long-time supervised practice program of four years and each boy is planning to complete 20 or more supervised practice jobs.

Baird's Magnolia Sta. Installs New Washer

J B Baird has added a "power" car washer to the equipment at his Magnolia station on East Main street. The machine, or electric pump, raises the water pressure through air compression to 400 pounds, thus doing a thorough job of knocking loose all tight-sticking dirt and grease. The water pressure from the city mains is about 50 or 60 pounds. The adjustable "gun" or nozzle throws the kind of stream desired or necessary—spray, fine or large stream. The machine reduces by more than half the time required to wash a motor vehicle—body, chassis and all parts underneath as well as the motor—and is quite an attribute to the already splendid service at this station. Incidentally, it is one of the first of the machines to be installed in this section of the country.

Another thing Baird has done the past week to enhance the appearance of his station, operated by L A Broxson, is the installation of neon decorative lights around the outside of the building with a big "Mobilubrication" sign over the entrance to the wash room which contains the hydraulic lift.

AGRICULTURAL BRIEFS

By Looe Miller, Secretary
County Agriculture Committee

SPECIAL NOTICE

Secretary Wallace will make an address on the cotton situation Friday, May 26, over NBC stations in the National Farm and Home Hour, beginning at 10:30 a. m. Central Standard Time. It is not often that the southern farmer has the opportunity of listening to an address by the Secretary of Agriculture. We, therefore suggest that as many farmers as can make an effort to tune in on this broadcast.

The cotton situation is a matter in which southern farmers are all vitally interested and should take every means available to acquaint themselves with the facts which govern so many of our lives.

WARNING

It has been brought to the attention of the county committee that some farmers are of the opinion that as long as they do not oversee their cotton acreage allotment more than one-half acre that they will not be considered overplanted. However, our regulations state that if a man is

one-tenth of an acre over his allotment he will not be entitled to any soil conservation or parity checks. Therefore, we suggest that in planning your planting operations that you endeavor to plant within your allotment and of course when you are measured if it is found that you have gone over your allotment, unintentionally, you will be given an opportunity to get this acreage within your allotment. However, we are of the opinion that it is better to plant within the allotment than to have to plow up after the farm is checked.

We will begin checking compliance this year as soon as we can reasonably expect all farmers in the county to have completed seeding their cotton, and as fast as we can check the farms and they are found to be within their cotton acreage allotments, we will prepare applications for cotton price adjustment payments, which will in turn be submitted to the state office for payment. Of course, should your farm measure over, it would be rechecked, consequently, causing your payment to be later than the majority of those in the county.


