The measure approved by the outh Caro'ina Legislature recenty will be effective next Jan. 1. Drivers involved in accident after that date must prove their ability meet judgments up to \$11,000 by urance or other security, or nsurance forfeit drivers' licenses and registrations.

The only remaining states with-out this legal protection for per-sons injured in traffic accident are Louisiana, Mississippi and Nevada. But such a measure is pending in Mississippi, and a bill to afford the same protection will be submitted at the next session of submitted at the next session of the Louisiana Legislature.
