Area Children Invited To 'Welcome Elephant' Party

Children from the Clyde-Baird area and other towns in West Texas are invited to Abilene Saturday, Oct. 9, for a "welcome elephant" party to be held at Fair Park Zoo at 10 a. m.

The party is planned to introduce children to a baby girl elephant newly arrived from the African jungles, gift of the Abilene Republican Women's Club to the new Abilene Zoo.

Mrs. Julia Pickard, president of the club, and David Hooper, president of the Abilene Zoological Society, joined in invitations to the children.

Free ice cream will be provided for the young guests. Music for

the party will be by the McMurry College Calliope.

In addition to meeting the baby elephant, the children will have opportunity to see other animals and fowls being assembled at the old Fair Park Zoo located on South 7th Street, their temporary home until Abilene's mammoth new zoo under construction at Nelson Park is ready for occupancy.

Admission, a penny each, will be asked from the children, the pennies to go to the baby elephant's first week's food bill.

Two children will be selected from the crowd to present to Hooper, on behalf of the Republican Women's Club, a check for \$4,750 to pay for the baby elephant.

The winner of the name the elephant contest, will have the honor of feeding the baby her first public meal -- and if Zoo Director Walt Kuenzle finds that the young beast is well enough adjusted to her new home to allow it -- will get the first ride on her.

The new baby was captured some two months ago. She was kept in Kenya for a time, then sent on her journey to Abilene. She traveled by cargo ship, via the Suez Canal and Lisbon, to New York, was flown by jet to Dallas, then came by truck to Abilene Sept. 30.

The official introduction of her to the West Texas children to whom she will, in fact, belong was delayed until Oct. 9 to allow her time to recover from her travels and to adjust to the West Texas climate.

Dizzy Dean to Appear At Prison Rodeo

HUNTSVILLE — Fans attending the second performance of the 34th Annual Texas Prison Rodeo here Sunday, Oct. 10th, will be privileged to see and hear Dizzy Dean, former baseball great and colorful sportscaster.

Dean, whose unusual style of patter has made him a crowd-pleaser all over the nation, also gained favor with his singing rendition of the "Wabash Cannon Ball."

During his personal appearance here, Dean will autograph and present baseballs to a group of rodeo ticket holders.

In 1933, Dean established a National League strike-out record when 17 Chicago Cubs went down before his blinding speedball. He was elected to the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1933.

He rose to fame as a pitcher with the St. Louis Cardinals. Later he coached the Chicago Cubs before turning to radio broadcasting and then television.

While Dean is entertaining the rodeo crowd, convict riders will have a "breather" from the thrilling and bruising rodeo contests which highlight the rodeo each Sunday in October.

Along with the convict contests, rodeo officials also feature inmate entertainment groups who help balance the fast-moving two-hour show.

The rodeo begins at 2 p. m. and a special inmate variety show begins at 1 p. m. Rodeo gates open at noon.

Net proceeds from rodeo ticket sales go to aid the rehabilitation of nearly 13,000 inmates of the Texas Department of Corrections.

BEARS RALLY TOO LATE TO DEFEAT BULLDOGS

The Baird Bears came alive in the last half of their game against Ranger Friday night to score 26 points, but the 46 scored by the Bulldogs was too much to overcome.

The Bulldogs scored early in the first period when Johnny McGee, Ranger quarterback, circled left end on a keep, for 55 yards for a touchdown. Point after attempt failed. Brown scored the second TD for Ranger from the 3, and McGee ran for the two points.

The Bulldogs next two touchdowns were on passes, from McGee to Mehaffey for 40 yards and to Landtroop for 55 yards, ending the half with a 26-0 lead.

Larry Blackwell scored next for Ranger from the 3 yard line and McGee scored again from the 5. The last Bulldog tally came when center Terry Brown intercepted a Baird pass and ran 45 yards to the end zone.

Then it was Baird's turn. On the kickoff, Steve Stanley grabbed the ball at his own 20 and scampered 80 yards into the end zone. He tried to pass

for the extra two points but to no avail.

That ended scoring in the third quarter, but in the fourth fullback Robert Griggs scored twice, one from five yards and again from the three, both extra point tries failing.

Scoring was ended when Stanley went in from three. A pass to Allen Towler was good for two extra points.

First downs were Ranger 11, Baird 12; rushing yardage Ranger 196 and Baird 182. Passing yardage gave Ranger 119 to the Bears 6.

The Bears will travel to Eastland Friday night to take on the Mavericks in a district game. Time will be 7:30 at Maverick Field.

Better Pay Offered New Wardens

AUSTIN — That sturdy youth pursuing fall outdoor sports with more than ordinary zeal, perhaps just little taller in the saddle, may have a different role come next fall.

He could be one of the young men the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department is counting on for the annual new warden class which, some time before fall rains cool and reinvigorate the parched earth, will assume their new positions as full-fledged Texas game wardens.

Active interest in the outdoors naturally is a requisite for the applicants since a major portion of their routine will be in some form of wildlife contact, said J. B. Phillips, law enforcement coordinator.

"But a modern warden no longer is confined to the actual wildlife harvest routine," said Phillips. "Rather, he works it from both ends. He works on wildlife management details and, through contact and education, works with the hunters and fishermen and all other outdoor recreation fans."

Baird Native Returns From Duty In Southeast Asia Trouble Spot

Don McBride, a native of Baird and a 1960 graduate of Baird High School returned September 2 from a year in Viet Nam.

He was with the Army's 121st Aviation Co., and flew 400 hours in UH-1B helicopters as crew chief from his station in Soc Trang on the Mekong Delta.

Don is the son of Harold McBride and his grandparents are Mrs. E. T. McBride of Baird and Mr. and Mrs. Lee Anderson of Abilene.

"I think it is vitally necessary that our military forces are in Viet Nam and that we stay there until the job is finished," he said.

"Living condition weren't too bad. Not like home, but not too bad. There is a shower whenever we wanted it and no need for hot water. The average year round temperature there is 90 degrees.

"The monsoon season starts

about June and from our barracks we looked out over water about two feet deep covering the rice paddies.

"We had staging areas for landing the helicopters but the ambulance helicopters sometime had to land in the water. Our division was landing troops in the area to search out and destroy the Viet Cong.

Sounds of War
"We have several three-day trips to Saigon in the north. The city seemed normal although troops were passing through. The sounds of war - bombing - could be heard most of the time.

"We made one trip to Hong Kong for rest and recuperation. This city is as modern as any of ours. The buildings are all new and modern. Many bank branches are in the city.

"Military morale is high in Viet Nam. The personnel believe in what they are fighting for and think it necessary that they are there," McBride sums up.

Don attended Texas Christian University and was an employe of University State Bank in Fort Worth before entering service in November, 1963. He plans to enter TCU night school and resume his work at University Bank. He was formerly employe of First National Bank of Baird.

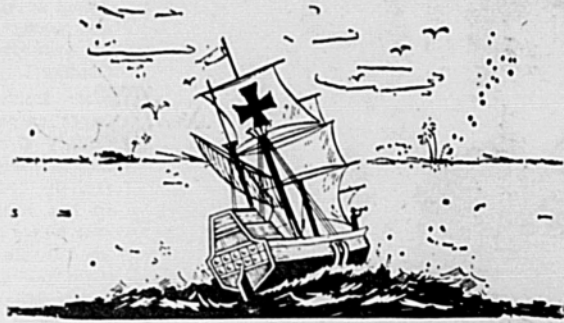

Veterans Policy Neglect Noted

Thousands of veterans are neglecting to keep up to date their listing of a beneficiary for their GI insurance policy proceeds, Jack Coker, manager of the Veterans Administration Regional Office in Waco, warned.

Because of this the insurance proceeds may not be paid to the individual nor in the manner the veteran would wish, he pointed out.

A divorced wife or wealthy parent may take precedence over a present wife or children since the VA must pay the proceeds of the insurance policy to the beneficiary designated by the veteran himself, Coker said.

A recent sampling indicated that six out of ten veterans had failed to change beneficiaries or payment options to meet the changing family conditions.

Necessary forms for these changes may be obtained from and VA office or by writing directly to the VA Insurance Office where the veterans pays his premium.



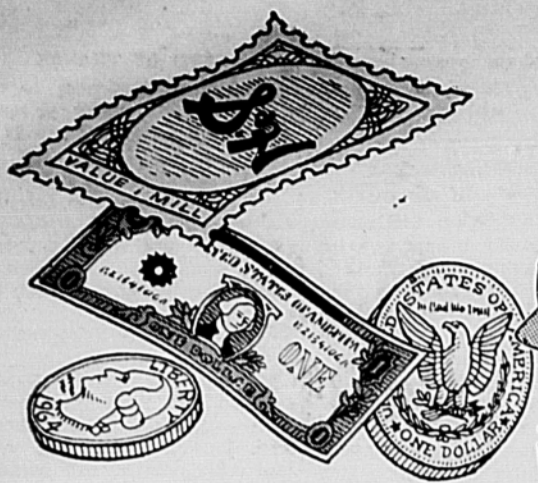
