ion will not meet.

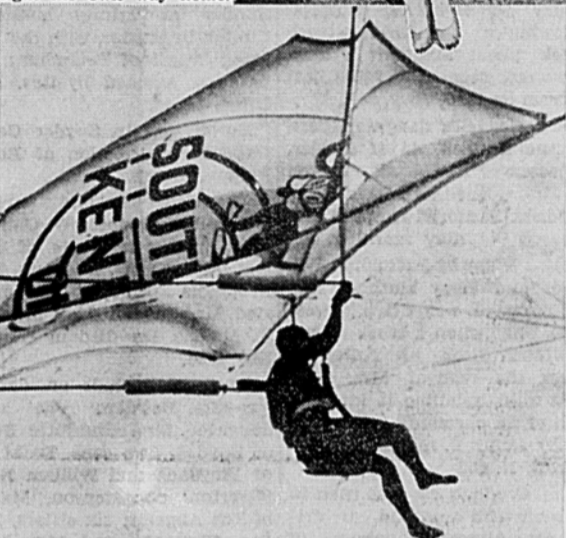

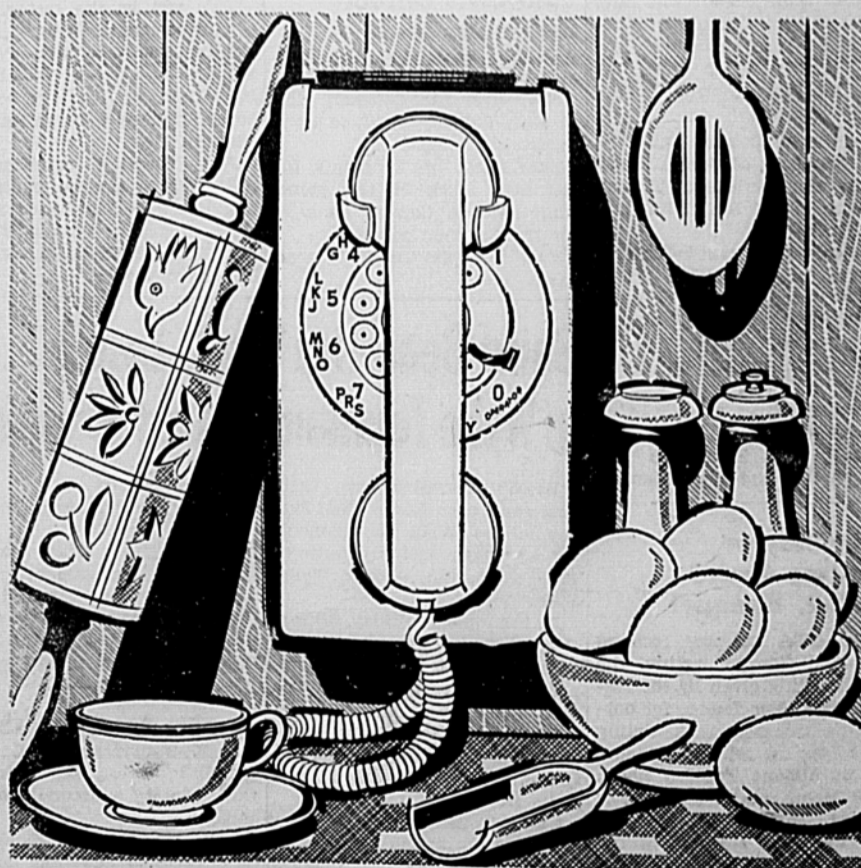

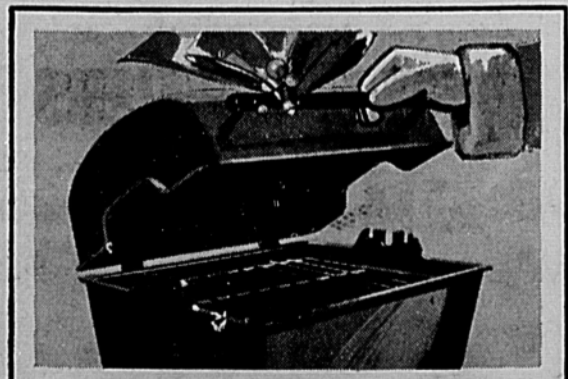

Is Your Range Drought Proof?

Many ranchers in the Lower Clear Fork, Middle Clear Fork and Central Colorado Soil and Water Conservation Districts are reducing the damaging effects of droughts, says A. H. Ringhoffer, Range Conservationist with the Soil Conservation Service at Baird. Through the development of a ranch conservation plan, ranchers are able to systematically plan the necessary conservation practices needed to maintain and improve their rangeland.

The ranch conservation plan is based on a range site and condition survey which is made by the rancher and the Soil Conservation Service technician. This survey will show the different types of country with the kinds and amounts of grasses present. The survey will also show whether the grasses are high producing grasses such as sideoats grama, cane bluestem, little bluestem, and western wheatgrass or lower producing grasses such as buffalograss, Texas wintergrass, white tridens and vine mesquite. The survey may show that the range has deteriorated to the condition that only weak perennial grasses or annuals such as filaree or six weeks grama are present.

After a range survey is made, the rancher has a better opportunity to identify his soil, plant, and water problems. He may be realizing only a part of the production potential from his rangeland because of low range condition. Brush infestation may be cutting down forage production.

Whatever the problems or opportunities may be, there is usually more than one way of dealing with each. If brush is a problem, various methods of control should be considered. Type of brush, degree of infestation, and range sites on the ranch will give clues as to whether chemical or mechanical control would be more effective.

Shortage of feed during one or more seasons may indicate the need for supplemental grazing or an increase in hay production. Additional water facilities or fences may be desirable to distribute the grazing load evenly over all the range.

Of all the possible ways of dealing with each problem, one will probably fit the objectives and desires of each rancher.

Ranchers desiring to have a forage inventory made on their ranch for the development of a ranch conservation plan, as a means of reducing the damaging effects of drought, should contact their Soil and Water Conservation District Supervisor or the local Soil Conservation Service technicians.

'Weekly Meditation'

Scripture Text: "And she brought forth her firstborn son, and wrapped him in swaddling clothes, and laid him in a manger; because there was no room for them in the inn." Luke 2:7.

There was no room for them in the inn. These few words from the Gospel of Luke give us an interesting insight into the condition of our Lord's birth. The little town of Bethlehem was crowded to capacity with those who had come from far and near to be taxed by Caesar Augustus' decree. All the available lodgings had been taken when Joseph came up from Nazareth of Galilee, with espoused wife, Mary, being great with child. As a last resort they took refuge for the night in a stable. There, amid the animals in a stable's stall, the child, Jesus, came to be born.

Now nearly two thousand years later, the same is true to a great extent. Christ came, not only to be born in a manger, but to be born in the hearts and lives of men. Too many of us have lost the true spirit of Christmas, because we have not made room for the Christ in our hearts.

We might ask, "Whose birthday is it, anyway?" No longer is it the festival of the home but the festival of department stores. Once it was dressed in swaddling clothes; now it is wrapped in cellophane and fully trimmed

trees. Once it was shepherds on the star-acoped hilltop; now it is the elbowing masses of grim-faced shoppers. Once it was a heavenly host chanting "Peace"! Now, it is a very human multitude with sore feet and thin tempers. Once it was the story of the Christ-Child. Now it is the story of a red-nosed reindeer.

We need to be reminded that it is His birthday! At what season of the year could we better honor Christ than at Christmas time? Christ was put into Christmas when God in His great love sent His Son to walk among men. When we exclude Christ from our thinking and doing and giving, it really isn't Christmas at all. Christmas becomes just another holiday for merry-making and festivities.

Let's make this Christmas for Christ. Let us honor Him with our hearts. "Joy to the World" should ring from our lips, as we share the "glad tidings of great joy" with those round about us.

What better season could we choose to share the "Good News" of the Gospel with a friend or loved one. This is the best gift humanity can receive. Won't you make room for Christ this Christmas?

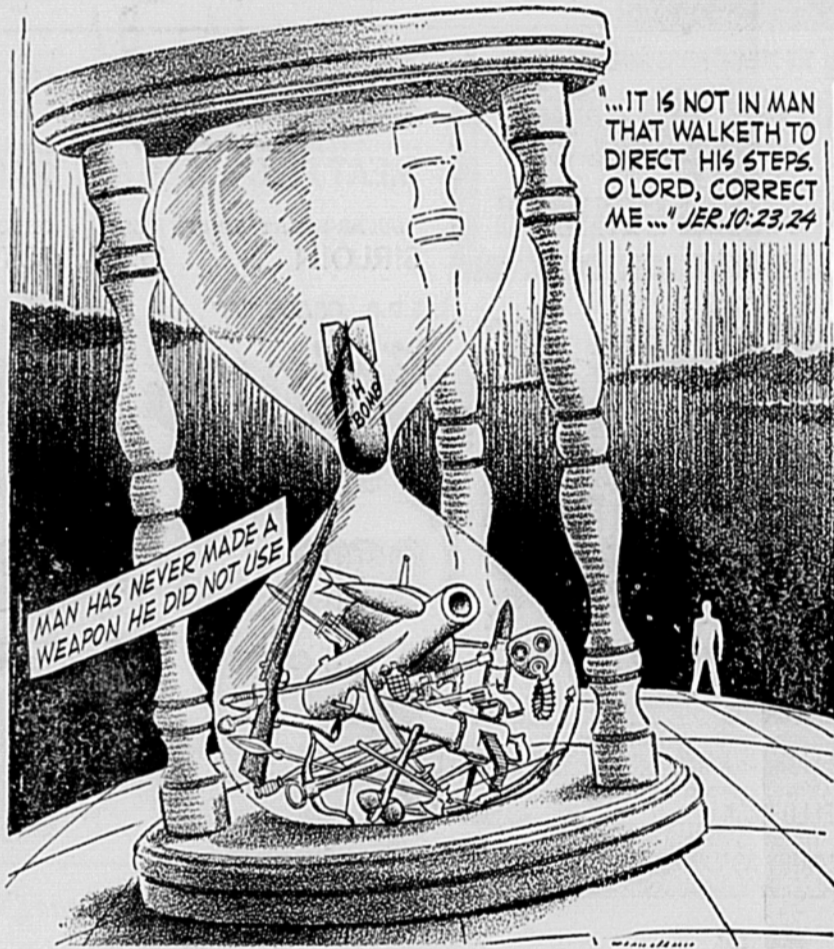

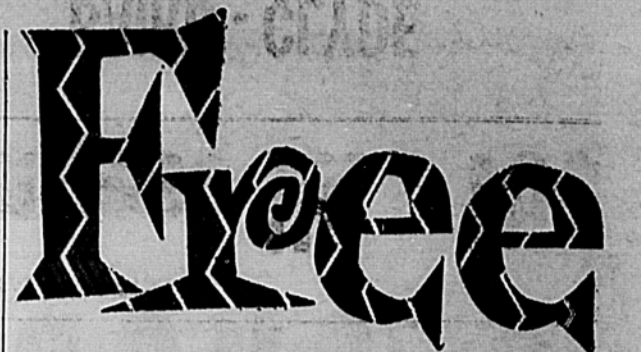
