A long-range battle plan against rampaging polio was outlined Wednesday by the State Department of Health.

State Health Officer Geo. W. W. Cox recommended these eight points of action in combatting the disease which this year is striking harder at Texas than at

any other part of the nation.

1. Spot spray insect breeding places after they have been cleaned and dstroyed. Spraying indiscriminently might kill a few insects on the wing, but it won't do the job. It might kill valuable plants and create a false sense of

2. Get rid of animal shelters in urban areas. They cannot be kept and consequently create a

health hazard as fly breeders.

3. Get rid of dump piles, tin cans, old tires, and accumulated debris which breed flies and mosquitoes and provide harborage for rats.


