PRICES OF SCHOOL LUNCHES TO BE RAISED, EFFECTIVE MONDAY

The Quitaque School Board met in regular business session last Monday night and several items of business were taken care of.

One of the items of business was school lunches and Supt. Mason reports that the Board voted that the price of school lunches be raised to 35 cents for students and 40 cents for adults with the prices to become effective next Monday, January 13. This move became necessary because fewer students are eating in the lunchroom, thus cutting down on the volume, and because food prices in general have risen a great deal since the 30 cent price was set for school lunches.

Mr. Mason also reminded school patrons that it is school policy for lunch bills to be paid every thirty days. The money is needed to operate the lunch room and school officials will appreciate it if patrons will take care of their childrens bills monthly.

In other action taken by the Board at the meeting, Supt. Mason's contract was extended for another year. His present contract runs until July, 1965, the extra year extending it to July, 1966.

AMOS PERSONS RECEIVES SERIOUS ARM INJURIES IN ACCIDENT

Amos Persons, son of Mr. and Mrs. Ray Persons, is in the hospital at Farmington, N. M. with a severely injured arm, suffered in an accident on December 28.

Amos is employed as a district manager for a natural gas company in Farmington and much of the company's gas pipe lines are patrolled by light air planes, much of it over rugged terrain. The company was considering patrolling the lines by helicopter if it proved to be a safer way to do the job. Amos had been up on a run in the craft and the pilot had set the helicopter down in one of the company yards where other officials were waiting for a run in the machine. As soon as the pilot set the 'copter down the ones waiting started toward the craft, which was a small one, the big blades being only 7 feet off the ground. Amos, fearing that someone might be hit by the blades, instinctively threw up his arm to wave them back and was himself hit by the whirling blades.

The full extent of his injuries is not known by his parents, but Amos' wife reported in her call here that his wrist was
