## Quitauque Bows To Memphis In Ball Game

Memphis came over for a return game of baseball with Quitauque Sunday afternoon and socked the Bedwell Blues 11 to 6, however Mgr Bedwell was out of town.

Quitauque out-hit the boys from the Hall county capital, getting 10 safeties to their 8, also laying on the timber a little heavier to boot, but the visitors made their hits worth more than did the Blues.

The Quitauque boys lambasted the horsehide for four 3-baggers and six singles while Memphis was accumulating five 2-baggers and three singles.

According to the score board, these multiple base knocks were accumulated as follows: Rush 1, Skipper Wilson 2, Blankenship 1. In Memphis' double-base dealings Jester hit 2, Vandeventer 1, Parker 1, Stewart 1.

Errors seemed to be the deciding factor of the game with the Blues chalking up eight to the visitors' four.

It was a good ball game except for the eighth inning when Quitauque's pitchers walked five men—four in a row—all of whom scored with nary a hit marked up in this frame, when eight alien batsmen faced him. The Memphis hurler walked two in this frame and hit Blankenship with a pitched ball, but none of these were able to score.

## First Wheat Received At Quitauque Elevator

The first load of wheat was received at the Quitauque Elevator in at 5:30 Wednesday afternoon. It was brought in by Jack Crawford of the Flomot community. The wheat was graded high moisture and test weighed 60 pounds per bushel.

The second load arrived about two hours later, at 7:30 p. m., from the W. E. Morrison farm at Gasoline. It also graded high moisture and test weighed 60 pounds per bushel. Mr. Morrison estimated that his wheat was turning out 33 bushels per acre.

Wheat in this section is about ready for harvest, Odell Setliff of the Quitauque Elevator stated this week. He said that judging from surrounding wheat that has been cut, the average yield is about up to expectations. Test weight per bushel in dry wheat this year is mostly above standard.

Estimate yield for the county is about 20 bushels to the acre, though some fields in this area will yield from 10 to 40 bushels per acre.

## POLIO FUNDS USED FOR HOSPITAL EQUIPMENT

According to an acknowledgment of Wilmer Sims, Northwest Texas State Representative, of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, the Briscoe county Chapter of the Foundation contributed \$197.97 for special polio equipment at the Plainview sanitarium and Clinic. The letter was addressed to Leon Middleton, treasurer of the Briscoe county chapter.

Since June 1, 1946, 23 chapters in Northwest Texas have contributed \$7,121.00 to be used in purchasing special polio equipment for use in the Plainview sanitarium and clinic. The records show that \$7,048.55 has been spent for equipment requested by Dr. E. O. Nichols Sr. and Dr. E. O. Nichols Jr. of the sanitarium. This left a balance of \$72.45, which was distributed back to each chapter in the form of a refund check. The refund check is the same percentage of the \$72.45 as the chapters original contribution is of the total amount contributed.

The Briscoe county chapter's original contribution was \$200.00, of which \$2.03 was refunded.

The equipment purchased for the sanitarium's use in the treatment of polio included Hubbard tanks, hot pack machines, whirlpool bath, ultra-violet lamps, heavy duty resuscitators, muscle exercise equipment and type "I" baker.

There is often a question in our minds as to what becomes of the money we contribute to such funds as the Infantile Paralysis Foundation, and this report to our county treasurer was carefully itemized to show the cost of each item and from whom purchased.
