Just this: box-cars get all mixed up and the cars of one line wind up behind the engine and on the tracts of other rail-road companies frequently. When this happens, the company using the car pays its owner a rental fee of \$2,75 per day. Since a boxcar costs from \$3,000 to \$14,000, it is easy to see that many companies with and use their own capital for other things. With some eastern companies arbitrarily rening the boxcars they need from the western companies, with which to pick up grains and other produce. This is another of those things good citizens

should feel compelled to write their congressman a-bout. Railroads suffer from considerable government intervention but this is another of the dust gathering railroad laws that definitely should be changed in a hurry. 


