

## Rep. H. G. Wells Again Candidate

State Representative H. G. Wells of Tulia today announced as a candidate for his second term as Representative from the 89th District, consisting of Briscoe, Floyd, Hale and Swisher counties.

Representative Wells, who was elected to his first term in the Legislature in 1958, is a senior law student at the University of Texas. He is a graduate of North Texas State College in Denton and did graduate work at West Texas State in Canyon. The 26-year-old legislator is a veteran of 21 months Army service. He was recently married to the former Jerry Nelson.

In announcing for reelection, Representative Wells said that he would stand on his record of service to the people of the district. He cited particularly his fight in the House of Representatives to maintain adequate legislative representation for rural areas by limiting the number of Representatives from city counties. He also emphasized his support for the various animal health measures considered in the last session.

"I will continue my efforts in behalf of the people of the 89th District in these and other fields," Representative Wells declared. "It is particularly important that this area have a representative in Austin who understands water problems and who will guard against state encroachment on private water rights. I pledge to the people of the district that I will continue to represent them to the best of my ability in the way they want to be represented."

Representative Wells said he would present his detailed platform to the voters later in the campaign but that, for the present, he wanted to emphasize his support for better education for Texas schoolchildren and solution to the state's number one problem, water, without state control of underground water.





 said Kent Creek water Control and Improvement District No. 1 shall, after construction, repair, maintain, operate and secure easements for such work.

WHEREAS this board is of the opinion and advises that an election for a fair and just tax should be called to obtain funds to defray the cost of repair, maintenance, operation, easements on land and administration of the district and that it be submitted that the maximum possible tax on a uniform thirteen cents (13c) per acre basis be voted on.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF KENT CREEK WATER CONTROL AND IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT NO. 1 that an election be held in said district on the fourth Tuesday in February, 1960, the same being the 23rd day of February, 1960, for the purpose of levying of tax by uniform assessments of benefits of an amount not to exceed thirteen cents (13c) per acre upon land in the district for the purpose of defraying cost of repair, maintenance, operation, easements on land and administration of the district. That said election shall be held in the following place in said district and the following named persons are hereby appointed officers for said election: at the residence of R. L. Brunson in Briscoe County, Texas, with J. A. Mcfield as presiding judge, Mr. J. P. White and Mrs. Joe Worluff, as clerks.

Notice of said election shall be given by publication of a copy of this order once a week for four consecutive weeks in some newspaper having a general circulation in the county in which the district is located, the first publication of which shall be at least twenty-eight (28) days before the date of such election. Immediately after said election has been held, the officers holding the same shall make returns of the result thereof in triplicate, one being retained by the presiding judge, one delivered to the President of this Board, and one delivered to the Secretary. The ballot box and other election records and supplies shall be delivered to the Secretary at the office of the District Clerk, to be presented as provided by law in said office except that the ballot box shall be returned to the District Clerk for this county.

The above order being read it was moved and seconded that the same do pass. Thereupon, a question being called for the following members of the Board voted AYE: Bert Grundy, F. Benson, James Brunson, Glynn Morrison, and the following voted NO: None.
