W. E. Hawkins bags a fine trophy



W. E. Hawkins bagged this Aoudad sheep on the Bert Hawkins land north of Quitaque last Sunday afternoon. The Palo Duro Canyon was stocked with the Aoudad about six years ago and this is the first open season on the animals. The season, which lasted only six days, closed Sunday night.

W. E. said that he killed the sheep with a .270 rifle at about 175 yards. The sheep weighed 140 pounds field dressed and an estimated 200 pounds live weight. His horns measured 10 inches around the base and 24 inches across the widest part. W. E. will have the head mounted and will have a fine trophy.

The Quitaque Panthers sailed by Silverton in the finals of the Silverton Tournament last Saturday night 79-41 to successfully defend their tournament championship.

Earlier in the day the Pantherettes took a 44-39 decision from Estelline to win the Consolation trophy.

The Hedley Owlettes defeated the Silverton Owlettes in the final game of the girls division. Last year the Silverton girls won over Hedley in the finals.

The Happy Cowgirls won Third place. In the boys division the Boys Ranch Rough Riders won Consolation and Hedley won Third place.

Jack Johnson and Jim Saul of the Panthers were placed on the All - Tournament team, along with Chessir of Hedley, Tomlin of Silverton and Reed of Boys Ranch.

The Pantherettes were defeated in their first game 39-53 and won 34-28 over Tulia B to advance to the consolation finals.

The Panthers were too tough for Happy, winning 53-43 in their first outing, with the starters sitting out the entire second half. Friday night the Panthers had their hands full in downing Hedley 53-45. In fact the Panthers trailed most of the time for three periods of play before pulling it out in the final quarter.

Saturday night's game against Silverton was never very close, and after the Owls lost their top scorer, Freddie Stafford, in the second quarter, the Owls

were unable to stay within striking distance. Meanwhile the Quitaque lads were feeding their big Panther, Jack Johnson, who responded with a fine 33 point performance. Jack made 10 field goals and 13 of 16 free shots. The entire team looked much better and sharper than it did the night before.

This is the last activity for the high school teams until December 31 when the Floydada teams come to Quitaque for a doubleheader. Floydada is one of the three teams owning wins over the Panthers this season and the locals will be out to get even, if possible. The Whirlwinds gave McAdoo a great battle Tuesday night before falling by a seven point margin, the difference being in free shots missed by the Floydada team.

It was announced late Thursday that the Floydada games to be played here have been moved up one day and will be played Monday night, December 30. Three games will be played and will begin at 6:00 P. M.

The Panthers now stand at 13 wins and 3 losses for the season. The Pantherettes have won 5 and lost 11.

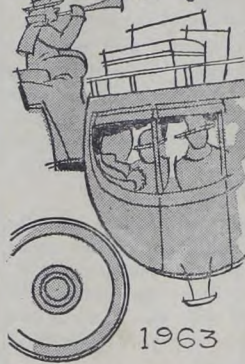

(Editor's Note: The following editorial appeared in the New York Sun in 1897 in response to a letter from Virginia O'Hanlon, then eight years old. She wrote the editor of the New York Sun: "Dear Editor: Some of my little friends say there is no Santa Claus. Papa says, 'If you see it in the Sun it's so'. Please tell me the truth, is there a Santa Claus?")

Virginia, your little friends are wrong. They have been affected by the skepticism of a skeptical age. They do not believe except what they see. They think that nothing can be which is not comprehensible by their little minds. All minds, Virginia, whether they be men's or children's, are little. In this great universe of ours man is a mere insect, an ant, in his intellect, as compared with the boundless world about him, as measured by the intelligence capable of grasping the whole of truth, and knowledge.



Yes, Virginia, there is a Santa Claus. He exists as certainly as love and generosity and devotion exist, and you know that they abound and give to your life its highest beauty and joy. Alas! how dreary would be the world if there were no Virginias. There would be no child-like faith then, no poetry, no romance to make tolerable this existence. We should have no enjoyment, except in sense and sight. The eternal light with which childhood fills the world would be extinguished.

Not believe in Santa Claus! You might as well not believe in fairies! You might get your papa to hire men to watch in all the chimneys on Christmas Eve to catch Santa Claus but, even if they did not see Santa Claus coming down, what would that prove? Nobody sees Santa Claus, but that is no sign there is no Santa Claus. The most real things in the world are those that neither children nor men can see. Did you ever see fairies dancing on the lawn? You tear apart the baby's rattle and see what makes the noise inside, but there is a veil covering the unseen world which not the strongest man, nor even the united strength of all the strongest men that ever lived, could tear apart. Only faith, fancy, poetry, love, romance, can push aside that curtain and view and picture the supernal beauty and glory beyond. Is it all real? Ah, Virginia, in all this world there is nothing else more real and abiding.

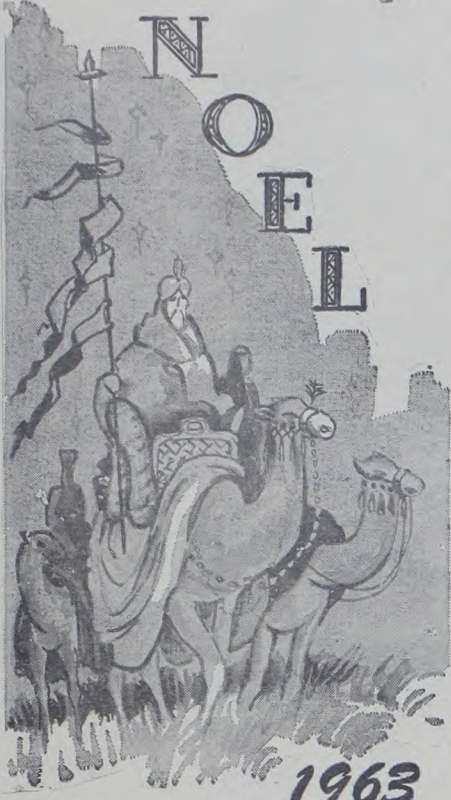

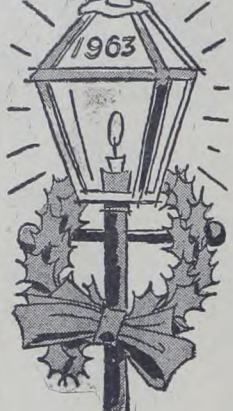

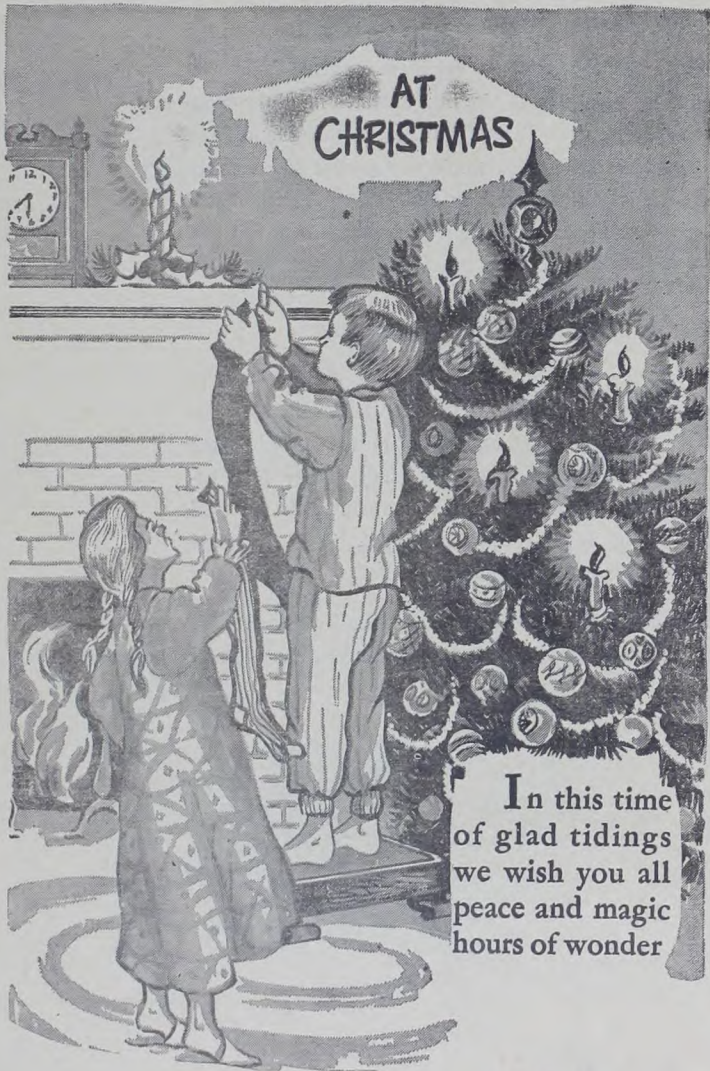

CHRISTMAS TAMALES

A popular Christmas dish in Central America is tamales or nacatamales. Nacatamales are carefully prepared and cooked for several hours.

The "stuffing" is made from finely ground corn meal, turkey, vegetables, spices and seasonings. In quantities of about one pound, the stuffing is wrapped in banana leaves and then boiled or steamed for several hours.

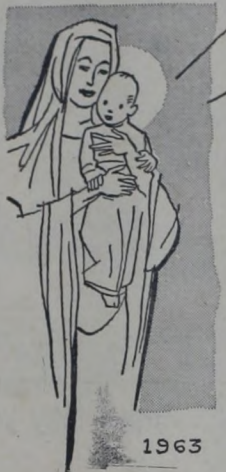

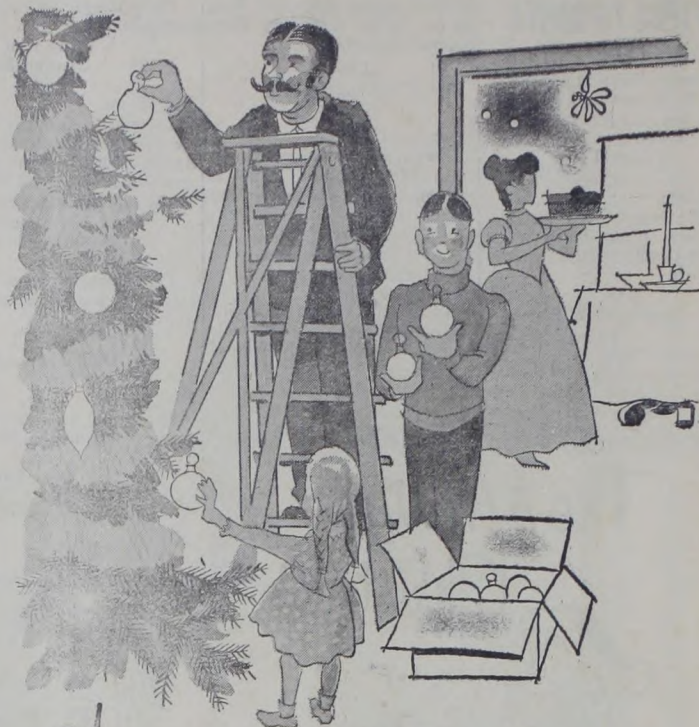
Child's Parents Are Gift Experts

Notice of said election shall be given by publication of a copy of this order once a week for three consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation published in the county in which this district is located, or if none is published in said county, in the nearest county thereto, the first publication shall be at least 21 days prior to the date of election, and not more than 35 days prior thereto. Immediately after said election has been held, the officers holding the same shall make returns of the result thereto in triplicate, one being retained by the Presiding Judge, one delivered to the President of the

Board, and one delivered to the Secretary. The ballot box and other election records and supplies shall be delivered to the Secretary at the office of the District and be preserved as provided by law in said office except that the Stub box shall be returned to the District Clerk for his County.

The above order being read, it was moved and seconded that same do pass. Thereupon, the question being called for, the following members of the Board voted AYE: Bert

Grundy, F. C. Benson, R. L. Brunson, Glynn Morrison and E. J. Hamilton and the following voted NO: None.

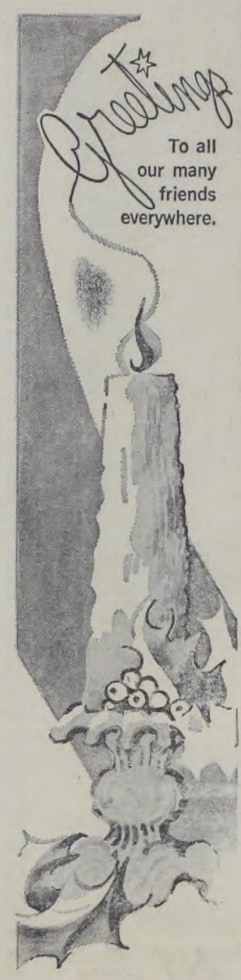
