A-If it falls on Saturday, Sunday or a holiday, your one-year deadline will be extended to cover the next regular working day.

Q-If I enroll in a correspondence course under the Korean GI Bill before my starting cut-off date, will I be permitted to switch to classroom training in the same field, after that date has passed?

A-No. A correspondence course is considered a program of traincorrespondence training to classoom training would be considered a change of program, regardless of the subject of the course. Change of program generally are not permitted after a veteran's starting cut--off date has passed.

Q—I am receiving disability compensation payments, and ac-cording to a statement by my physician, my condition has be-come worse. Would that statement alone qualify me for increas ed payments?

A-The evidence provided by your physician must be verified by an official VA physical examination. If VA finds that your compensation increase may be condition has become worse, the made effective as of the date VA received the evidence from your physician.

Q-I am planning to take flight training under the Korean GI Bill. At what rate will I use up my GI training entitlement?





From the Wildwood Independent Record, Wildwood, N.J.: The case for freeing natural gas producers from federal controls recently imposed by a U.S. Supreme Court interpretation of the Natural Gas Act of 1938 is overwhelming.

There is a great-and basic difference between gas production, and gas distribution to the ultimate consumer. Each local gas distributing company is a public utility with an exclusive franchise in its territory. Therefore it is regulated as to rates and other matters by local regulatory bodies. The pipeline companies operating in interstate commerce are similarly regulated by the federal government. No one is seeking to change this.

But there are no exclusive franchise in finding gas. More than \$4,000 independent producers compete vigorously to find it and then sell it. No single company produces as much as five per cent of the supply. And the risks are heavy, for the majority of wildcat wells turn out dry and worthless. So far as consumers are concerned, between 1945 and raid 1954 the costs of household gas rose, on a nation-wide average, by only 12 per cent, as contrasted with a jump of nearly 50 per cent in the cost of living as a whole. And producers get an average of but 10 per cent of the gas bills
