Reported By Gaston Owens The 16,000 fans who filled the Sun Bowl almost to capacity last Monday afternoon got everything they wished for except the sun-there was very little of that. The sun peeked out briefly once or twice, the wind blew hard, it was chilly, but most of the fans were happy as they saw the West Texas Buffaloes down a very good Cin-cinnati University football team

We think we saw as fine a game as was played in any of the num-erous bowls in the nation. The teams were well matched and the game produced every thrill that even the rabid fan could have asked for: long runs, long passes, hard rough football, players from each team ejected from the game and last but not least a near riot in the final seconds of the game. This was quelled before it got completely out of hand.

Although the Bearcats were the

toughest team the Buffs met this season, the West Texans were clearly the better of the two teams and should have won by a touchdown margin instead of a single point.

Quitaque fans who witnessed the game were proud, and justifiably so, of the performance turned in by Gene Mayfield. Gene called his by Gene Mayrield. Gene called his usual flawless game at quarter-back, and though he completed only about a third of the passes thrown it wasn't the fault of the passer-almost all of the passes were right in there but the receivers were dropping them. One of his passes was dropped in the end-zone and another that would have been almost a sure score was drop-ped. Gene carried the ball ten times for a total gain of 40 yards, a neat four yard average. In addition to his offensive performance Gene probably saved the ball game for the Buffs. Mrs. Cogdill's death was very sudden and unexpected. She was past 73 years old and had been in failing health for some years, but remained active in her home. About 5 o'clock Thursday after-noon she was resting in her rock-ing chair when Mr. Cogdill went to a nearby pasture to bring the cow home, and she talked with him be-fore he left. He was gone between 5 and 10 minutes, he said, and when he returned she had passed away, still sitting in the chair.

Born May 31, 1877 in Hood coun-y, Texas, before her marriage she vas Maud Indiana Hufsteddler. She was married to Rile Columbus Cogdill in Hood County on August 31, 1896 and they were the parents of eight children. Two of the children died in infancy and a daughter Mrs. Eula Bernice Boyles died in December, 1935.

The couple moved to West Texas early in their married life and lived for a time in New Mexico and Arizona. For a while they lived on the old F Ranch south' of Quitaque, and a few years ago bought a place in town and had made their home here since.

Mrs. Cogdill was a hospitable and friendly person. She loved people and friends, and showed her interest in many pleasant ways. She had the love and respect of her children and neighbors and sought always to do good and be helpful. At the time of her death she was a member of the Fairmont Baptist church. She was Baptised by Rev. C. A. Joiner at the Cedar Hill Church, near Floydada in 1915.

Fire Monday At Morris Motor Building

An explosion about 3:30 o'clock Monday afternoon at the Morris Motor Co., gutted the inside of the building and caused considerable damage. John T. Reagan, mechanic who was at work in the garage at the rear of the 50x100 building was burned on both logs. building, was burned on both legs, but the burns were not considered

Reagan was draining the gas tank on the 1949 Chevrolet sedan belonging to Lewis Lyles, preparing to do some repair work on it. A drop of the draining gasoline pop-ped on the burning trouble light which was lying near the car and the light globe burst, a spark striking the tub of gasoline which exploded

A. L. Morris, owner of the business, and several other men were in the front office when the explosion occurred and they helped Mr. Reagan out of the smoke-filled building, and also removed the two new Dodge trucks from the dis-play room in the front of the building. There were no other cars in the building. Mr. Lyles was in the garage with Mr. Reagan but he escaped without inury from the

The Quitaque fire department reached the fire with no delay and soon had it under control. The Lyles car was demolished. The building, which belongs to Pierce Hawkins, was badly damaged by smoke and water. Extent of the damage and other losses had not

been determined at this time.

Morris stated this afternoon
(Thursday) that repairing of the damage to the building had begun as quickly as possible and they were now in shape to operate. The electric wiring had been repaired and the repair shop was ready to
