#### HI-PLAINS HI-LIGHTS

Greenhouse is Given Foundation

The building campaign for the High Plains Research Foundation was started recently with a gift of \$17,500 for a greenhouse and equipment by the Jim Hill Estate of Hereford. The gift is contingent upon the matching of this amount by others for a laboratory, library, and conference room. An office building is included in the plans for the efficient operation of the Foundation. The total estimated cost of the structures is \$63,000. An additional gift of acoustical tile for the ceiling of the offices has been promised by Jimmy Willson, Jr. and David Wilson.

The greenhouse, together with the laboratory, will accelerate the research program at the Foundation by establishing controlled conditions for the development of new soybean and sesame varieties needed for the High Plains. Fertilizer combination testing under greenhouse conditions can give answers in advance of field trials. Farmers and agri-business will profit from these new facilities by receiving answers to their needs. In many cases, two years of research can be achieved in one year.

The trustees of the Jim Hill Estate of Hereford making the gift were O. L. Bybee and R. L. Thompson of Hereford and Joe S. Bridwell of Wichita Falls. Foundation officials accepting the gift in Plainview, Wednesday, August 16, were Harold Hinn, Chairman of the Board, Frank Moore, President, Dr. T. C. Longnecker, Director, Dr. Earl H. Collister, Chief Agronomist and Assistant Director, and H. S. Hilburn.

Mr. Harold Hinn, Chairman of the Board, stated in announcing the gift that the members of the

Foundation staff and the Board of Trustees are delighted with the gift and they are anxious to receive matching funds soon so the facilities will be available this winter.

#### THIRTY HOLIDAY DEATHS PREDICTED FOR TEXAS

Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the Texas Department of Public Safety, today announced the official prediction that 30 persons in Texas will be killed in traffic accidents during the Labor Day weekend.

In making the prediction, Garrison warned motorists that records show this three-day period to be one of the most dangerous times of the year on the highways.

The highest Labor Day holiday toll since World War II was in 1951 when 46 persons were killed in 33

accidents. The lowest was in 1949-53 killed in 19 accidents. Figures prove most fatal accidents are caused by traffic law violations.

The DPS, in an effort to focus public attention on the hazards of holiday traffic and to compile data which will be helpful in improving the state's traffic management program, will conduct "Operation Motorcide," from 12:01 A. M. Saturday, September 2, through 11:59 P. M. Monday, September 4.

During the 72-hour period, the safety agency will tabulate all traffic deaths in the state and issue bulletins at 10:00 A. M., 3:00 P. M. and 9:00 P. M. each day.

"Driving is always a full-time job, and driver concentration and alertness are especially essential during holiday periods because crowded highways increase driving hazards," Garrison said.

"An all-out effort will be made by DPS enforcement personnel to remove traffic violators from the highways. The Texas Highway Patrol force will be augmented by some 150 patrolmen from the other uniformed services of the Department of Public Safety. All available radar units will be in operation.

"But law enforcement officers can only do so much. Texas highways will be as safe as Texas drivers want them to be. And what they want will be reflected in the way they drive.

"This Labor Day weekend we are asking each driver to cooperate in making Texas highways safe by obeying the traffic laws and by staying alert while driving."

Garrison suggested several ways drivers can cut down the holiday traffic death toll.

1. Allow sufficient time for travel.
2. Obey the traffic laws; they are designed to facilitate smooth traffic flow and to save lives.
3. Anticipate dangerous situations. Don't depend on another driver to prevent an accident—be prepared to do it yourself.
4. Stay alert. Anything that impairs your driving skill or distracts your attention while driving might prove fatal.

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
