County productivity indexes ranging from 885 to 4,267 pounds per acre have been established for grain sorghum on the High Plains under the new feed grain program. The indexes, announced by Ag-ricultural Stabilization and Con-servation offices, were computed on the basis of average or normal yields for each county, officials say.




