All of the talk in recent days a out taxes and the chance for tax cut bring to my mind the need some substantial tax revision I feel that under the present tax laws many inequities could be eras ed by some quick amendments Any tax law, like any other type o is only after administration of the een errors become obvious.

As an example, let me cite the ase of a young man who was sup porting his several sisters and also his mother. The father had absented himself and completely fail-ed in his responsibility to the famiv. Hence, the mother and the sev eral sisters were directly depend ent upon this young man for their

Under the income tax laws as ney presently stand, however, the oung man could claim exemptions or his sisters as dependents, bu one for his mother - the reason eing that since the mother had not been legally divorced from the ather, she was charged with reder the community property laws Actually, she did not receive on dime from the errant husband and had no way to collect any money

Certainly no one would contend that the law should place such a penalty on a young man who was obligation in supporting his sisters warded for his fine Christian attitude. Nevertheless, the law so read. It was obviously an oversight at the time the tax law was writ-

I have introduced a bill to correct this gross inequity. If we can get this amendment passed it will not only relieve this young man and fair and burdensome penalty, but t may save many from criminal prosecution. There are undoubtedly the facts and the ruling that wa


