Weather conditions being one of the paramount factors a farmer has to take into consideration if he is to make a success of farming, the fact that many farmers in all parts of Texas are changing from cashcrop farming to a diversified system may be attributed to a great extent to unfavorable weather standing beside the truck while conditions. This is indicated by figures taken from adjustment loans FHA has made; amounting to more than \$12 million since July 1, 1953.

also be available July 1. A special program of loans to livestock men, hard hit by drought conditions is also administered by FHA. These loans are to help farmers retain their normal position in the production of cattle and sheep and to restock ranges where herds were reduced by drought or economic reasons.

No matter what type of credit is sought, FHA cannot approve applications from farmers whose credit needs can be handled by private or cooperative lenders. Banks and other lending agencies have referred hundreds of applicants they could not accomodate to FHA offices since July 1, 1953.

In the eight months' period following June 30, 1953, a total of over 14,000 loans were made for more than \$44,750,000. Of this amount \$12 million of special livestock loans were made to 800 ranchmen; and approximately \$20 million in emergency loans to 10 thousand Texas farmers, of whom 150 received \$508,000 to establish or to improve water facilities on their farms.

Fishing Ordinances Adopted By Directors

At a meeting of the Board of Commission. Directors of Callahan County Water Control and Improvement District No. 1 on Monday, March 8, 1954, the following ordinances were adopted, applying to fishing in Lake Baird.

1. Lake Baird will be opened to the public for fishing from Margaret Gilliland sun-up until 9:00 p.m.

2. Charges for fishing as fol-

A. \$1.00 a year per family to all Water District Tax Payers.

B. \$2.50 a year per family to all Non Water District Tax lene. Payers residing in Callahan County.

C. \$7.50 a year per person to all Non Tax Payers residing out of Callahan County.

D. 50c a day to each person over twelve years of age, other than those with yearly permits.

3. The following boat regulations were set:

A. No boat with motor to exceed 121/2 horse-power. B. All persons in boat must have life preserver or life

C. Racing or any unsafe handling of boats strictly prohibited, if this is observed on Lake, Lake Keeper has authority to cancel all permits held by owner or occupant and order from Lake.

4. No swimming will be allowed in Lake Baird.

5. No Blood Bait will be allowed in Lake Baird. 6. The Lake Keeper shall be given franchise on all boat

all concessions. 7. All persons must check in with Lake Keeper with their per-

8. It shall be unlawful for any person using or operating any boat on Lake Baird to attack or tow behind any such boat, any surf board, water ski, or any other conveyance other than another boat.





ATOMIC ENERGY AND THE FUTURE

There is hope and confidence, based on scientific knowledge, that eventually atomic energy, which has so far served only as an incredibly destructive force, can make an immeasurable contribution to the arts of peace, primarily as a source of electric power.

The question is whether the enormous amount of work and research that must be done before this goal can be approached will be continued as an iron-clad government monopoly-or whether the law will be amended to allow private enterprise, with its vast human and financial resources and 'know-how", to participate.

Those who favor such amendments include the present chairman of the Atomic Energy Commission, Lewis L. Strauss; past chairmen Gordon Dean and David Lilienthal, and such leading atomic scientists as Harold Urey. The amendments proposed would in no way weaken the government's ability to protect atomic secrets and to prevent misuse of this staggering force. Production of nuclear weapons would, of course, remain the province of government alone. The role of private enterprise would simply be to help bring a peacetime atomic age into being as soon as possible.

Suppose that from the very beginning the internal combustion engine, which has literally transformed the world, had been a monopoly of government? Can anyone seriously believe that in that case it would have served mankind as it has? Monopoly, whether governmental or private, always blocks and in some cases actually stifles progress. This is the fact we must not forget in deciding our future policy toward the atom and its yet barely-



Soil Conservation District News

Now is the time to begin preparation for the planting of guar. Seed should be secured soon along with an inoculant for inoculating the seed.

Guar should be planted in May or the early part of June about cotton planting time. Spaced in normal width rows, guar is a good soil improving crop. Five to six pounds of seed should be planted per acre.

Guar can be used as a cash crop by combining the seed. In addition to this, guar may also be used as a green manure crop by plowing up and leaving on or near the surface when the plants are in full bloom.

Since cotton, wheat, and peanut acreages have been restricted this year, many farmers are asking about soil improving crops for these diverted acres. Guar will fit into our cropping system extremely well. In average years guar will produce from four hundred to six hundred pounds of seed per acre.

Crops succeeding guar have shown decided increases over crops not following guar. Guar seed can be obtained
