## LOCAL VOTING LEAVES TWO IN RUNOFF

On the local scene voters poured to the polls Saturday in an election that left 10 prospective office holders holding nothing but an empty pocket book, and left two hanging in the balance, their fate yet to be decided. The only run-off in the county will be between the present Commissioner B. K. Hamilton and the next highest contender, Mort Hawkins.  
In the race race which featured three contenders, Hawkins led with a vote of 154, followed by Hamilton with 103, just a short jump ahead of Glynn Morrison totaling 95. The 95 votes polled by Morrison will be enough to put either of the remaining candidates in the office, if they all go to the polls on August 23, in the Second Democratic Primary.  
Judge J. W. Lyon, Jr. returned to his office with a 582 vote count to Conrad Alexander's 347 and Gus F. Gibson's 152.  
Dee McWilliams went back in office to her another term as County Clerk with a 748 vote over C. L. Wilson's 221 and 111 for Mrs. Bruce Womack.  
In a race of four, Florence Durham took over the office of County Treasurer with an undisputed majority of 618 votes. Her nearest opponent, Annie J. Stevenson, incumbent, polled only 191 votes; Agnes Bingham 138; and Mrs. Avis M. Crow, 131.  
J. W. Ewing beat out Wiley Cain in a narrow race, holding a margin of only 15 votes.  
The closest race in the County, however was between O. M. Dudley and Roy S. Brown for

Rogers carried in all of the 15 counties in the 30th Senatorial District but Hale County.  
He carried by a majority in Swisher and Bailey Counties. Swisher is the home county of Saul and Bailey is the home county of Karl Lovelady, the other opponent.  
Rogers made his best race in Childress, Collingsworth and Hall where his majorities over his two opponents were more than two to one.  
The total votes for the three opponents were as follows:  
Rogers—14,852; Saul—6,196;



Lovelady — 2,784.  
Briscoe county voted 570 for Rogers; gave Saul 404 and Lovelady 46.  
Hall gave Rogers 1,394 to 194 for Saul and 198 for Lovelady.

U. S. Senator Ralph YARBOROUGH carried 29 of 33 Panhandle counties in the Democratic primary election last Saturday. The vote was 37,427 for YARBOROUGH to 24,783 for W. A. Blakely of Dallas.  
YARBOROUGH showed his usual strength in Southeastern Panhandle and South Plains counties and he carried nearly all 29 counties in the region by a comfortable margin.  
Briscoe County gave YARBOROUGH 689 votes to 348 for Blakely in the hotly contested race.  
**DANIEL RE-ELECTED**  
Gov. Price Daniel had easy sailing in his race for re-election to the Governor's Chair. W. Lee O'Daniel, possibly the most sparkling political figure within many years, came out with a low second. Gonzales ranked next with Irwin trailing the voting sheet.  
Briscoe County gave Daniel a 262 majority against O'Daniel with 262, Irwin 31, and Gonzales 92.

### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

HJR #1—Number One on the Ballot.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1** proposing an amendment to Section 5 and 24 and authorizing a new Section 24 of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to provide for annual Sessions of the Legislature; changing the compensation, per diem and travel expense of the Members of the Legislature; authorizing temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House in the Capitol; providing for an election; prescribing the form of ballot and providing for the necessary proclamation and publication.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 5 of Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 5. The Legislature shall meet every year, under the condition and limitation hereinafter provided, at such time as may be provided by law, and at other times when convened by the Governor.

"During the First Regular Session of each Legislature, which shall convene in January, 1958, and each succeeding two (2) years thereafter, the first thirty (30) days thereof shall be devoted to the introduction of bills and resolutions, acting upon emergency appropriations, passing upon the confirmation of the recess appointments of the Governor and such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided that during the first thirty (30) days of the First Regular Session of the Legislature the various committees of each House shall hold hearings to consider bills and resolutions and other matters as may be submitted by the Governor; provided further that during the following sixty (60) days the Legislature shall act upon such bills and resolutions as may be then pending and upon such emergency matters as may be submitted by the Governor in special messages to the Legislature; provided, however, either House may otherwise determine the order of business by an affirmative vote of four-fifths (4/5) of the membership.

"During the Second Regular Session of each Legislature, which shall convene in January 1959, and each succeeding two years thereafter, the Legislature shall be divided into two (2) sessions, each of which shall be of equal length, and shall act upon the following only:

"a. Make annual appropriations for the general operation of the State government; which appropriations may be passed by a majority vote of each House.

SJR #4—Number Seven on the Ballot.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.**

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 4** proposing an amendment to Section 17 of Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas, providing that the Legislature be authorized to appropriate money and to establish the procedure necessary to expend such money for the purpose of developing information about the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, recreational and living resources of Texas, and for the purpose of informing persons and corporations of other states through advertising in periodicals having national circulation, and the dissemination of factual information about the advantages and economic resources of Texas; providing that neither the name nor the picture of any living state official shall be used in any advertisement; and providing that the Legislature may appropriate money to be expended hereunder shall be matched by an equal sum paid into the State Treasury from private sources before any of said money may be expended.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Section 17 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas be amended to read as follows:

"Section 17. The Legislature of the State of Texas shall have the power to appropriate money and establish the procedure necessary to expend such money for the purpose of developing information about the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, recreational and living resources of Texas, and for the purpose of informing persons and corporations of other states through advertising in periodicals having national circulation, and the dissemination of factual information about the advantages and economic resources of Texas; providing that neither the name nor the picture of any living state official shall be used in any advertisement; and providing that the Legislature may appropriate money to be expended hereunder shall be matched by an equal sum paid into the State Treasury from private sources before any of said money may be expended.

### CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT THE GENERAL ELECTION ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.

SJR #6—Number Two on the Ballot.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.**

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 8** proposing an amendment to Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas, authorizing such county to provide retirement, disability and death benefits for appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct, or for appointive and elective officers and employees of the county or precinct; providing for the submission of the proposed amendment to the voters qualified to vote thereon, and providing for the necessary election, form of ballot, proclamation, and publication.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. That Subsection (b) of Section 62 of Article XVI of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to read hereafter as follows:

"(b) Each county shall have the right to provide for and administer a Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund for the appointive officers and employees of the county or precinct, or for the appointive and elective officers and employees of the county or precinct, provided same is authorized by a majority vote of the qualified voters of such county and after being published in at least one newspaper of general circulation in such county once each week for four consecutive weeks; provided that the amount contributed by the county to such fund shall be at least equal to the amount paid for the same purpose from the income of each such person and shall not exceed at any time seven and one-half per centum (7 1/2%) of the compensation paid to each such person by the county.

"All funds provided from the compensation of each such person, or by the county, for such Retirement, Disability and Death Compensation Fund, as are received by the county, shall be invested in bonds of the United States, the State of Texas, or counties or cities of this state, or in bonds issued by any agency of the United States government, the payment of the principal of and interest on which is

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 20** proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas to require that vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace be filled by the Commissioners Court only until the next General Election.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. Section 28 of Article 5 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 28. Vacancies in Offices of Judges of Superior Courts To Be Filled by the Governor.

"Vacancies in the office of Judges of the Supreme Court, the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Court of Civil Appeals and the District Courts shall be filled by the Governor until the next succeeding General Election; and vacancies in the office of County Judge and Justices of the Peace shall be filled by the Commissioners Court until the next succeeding General Election."

HJR #31—Number Four on the Ballot.

**PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 4, 1958.**

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 11** proposing an amendment to the Constitution of Texas to provide that county officials for whom four-year terms of office were authorized in 1954 must resign such office prior to announcing for a different office within more than one (1) year remains unexpired of the term for which they were elected, and providing for the filling of such vacancies in the manner now provided by law.

**BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:**

Section 1. Section 65 of Article 16 of the Constitution of the State of Texas is hereby amended so as hereafter to read as follows:

"Section 65. STAGGERED TERMS OF OFFICE.—The following officers elected at the General Election in November, 1954, and thereafter, shall serve for the full terms provided in this Constitution:

(a) District Clerks; (b) County Clerk; (c) County Judge; (d) Judge of County Courts at Law, County Criminal Courts, County Probate Courts and County Domestic Relations Courts; (e) County Treasurers; (f) Criminal District Attorneys; (g) County Surveyors; (h) Inspectors of Hides and Animals; (i) County Commissioners for Precincts Two and Four; (j) Justices of the Peace.

"Notwithstanding other provisions of this Constitution, the following officers elected at the General Election in November, 1954, shall serve only for terms of two (2) years: (a) Sheriffs; (b) Assessors and Collectors of Taxes; (c) District Attorneys; (d) County Attorneys; (e) Public Weighers; (f) County Commissioners for Precincts One and Three; (g) Constables. At subsequent elections, such officers shall be elected for the full terms provided in this Constitution.

"In any district, county or precinct where any of the aforementioned offices is of such nature that two (2) or more persons hold such office, with the result that candidates file for 'Place No. 1,' 'Place No. 2,' etc., the officers

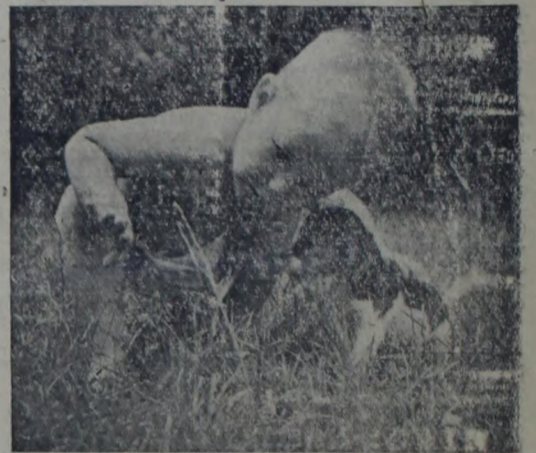

**"How Close? It Depends . . ."**

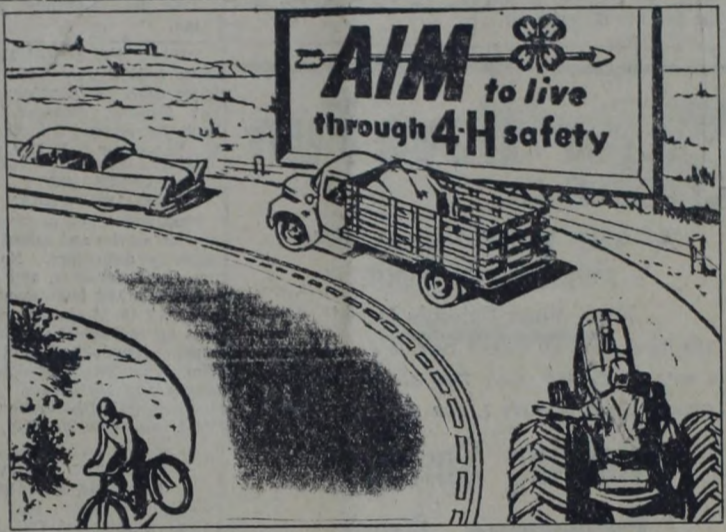
Should you ask a professional photographer how close you ought to be when you snap a child's picture, chances are he'd say, "Close enough to see what's going on!" It's a good rule for any kind of snapshot, too. But it's doubly important when you're snapping 'the small fry' to move in as close as you possibly can without cutting off any main element of the picture. Let's say that the reason for a particular picture lies entirely in the expression on a child's face. The child might be cuddling a pet, examining a flower, popping bubble gum, or reacting to a new food. The best place for your camera to be is just as close as it is capable of making a sharp picture. With box cameras this distance is about six feet—until you slip a close-up attachment over the lens. Then, you may move in to a more desirable three and a half feet. At this range, the zone of sharp focus is rather narrow, so you'll do well to measure your camera-to-subject distance with a little care. Where the picture situation depends on what the full figure of the child is up to, step back a pace or two in order to catch the entire subject in your viewfinder. If there's even the slightest chance that your subject might change position, back up an extra foot or so to allow a safety zone. Often the meaning—the special mood—of a picture will depend to some degree upon the background. When this is the case, include as much of it as you need, but no more. Generally speaking, snapshots of this kind call for simple but sharply focused backgrounds. In most cases, however, we feel that interest will be concentrated in the expression on your small subject's face. And that's why a close-up is your best bet. But a snapshot of a youngster can be close and sharp and still miss its mark in effectiveness. This happens when you stand stiff-backed in all of your height and shoot down at a child who's less than half your size. All you catch is a good shot of the top of his head—and not much else. His expression—which tells so much of the story—is completely lost to view. Here's a case where you should keep your camera down low—even if it means bending, kneeling, stooping, squatting or sprawling. —John Van Gulder

In this issue of the Post there appears the full text of one or more of the Constitutional Amendments to be voted on at the upcoming General Election (Nov. 4). So that you may be fully informed we urge that you read each proposed measure in its entirety, and study all of them carefully before you go to the polls to cast your vote.

different amendments follows:  
**NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (HJR 1)** — Provides for annual sessions of the legislature, changing the compensation, per diem and travel expenses of members of the legislature and authorizing temporary residence of the Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House in the Capitol Building.  
**NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (SJR 6)** — Authorizes each county to establish, after approval by its voters, a re-

tirement, disability and death benefits officers, either elective or appointive, or both not to exceed four years.

**NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (HJR 17)** — Provides for pension to retired Texas Rangers who are ineligible to participate in the Employees Retirement System of Texas, and their widows.

**NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (SJR 4)** — Authorizes the Legislature to make appropriations and establish procedure for advertising the historical, natural, agricultural, industrial, educational, recreational and other resources of Texas.

**NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (HJR 36)** — Gives the Legislature the power to authorize vendor payments for medical care in addition to the amount paid in the form of direct public assistance to and on behalf of needy recipients of Old Age Assistance, Aid to the Blind, Aid to Dependent Children or Aid to the Perman-
