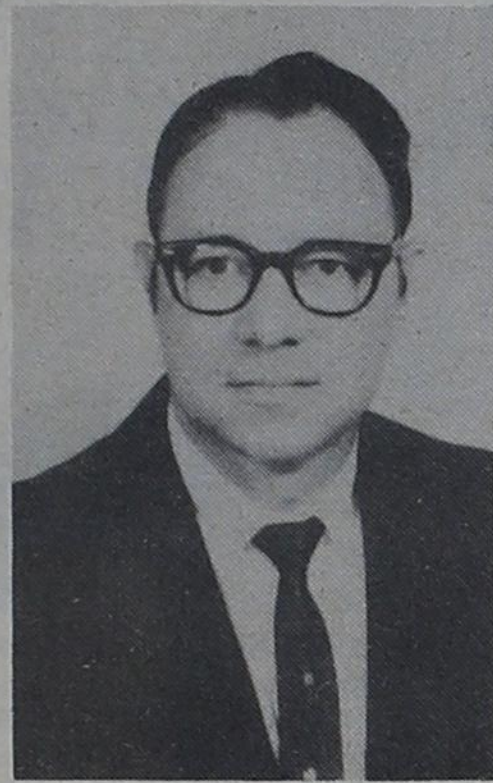


Carter Appointed City Marshall

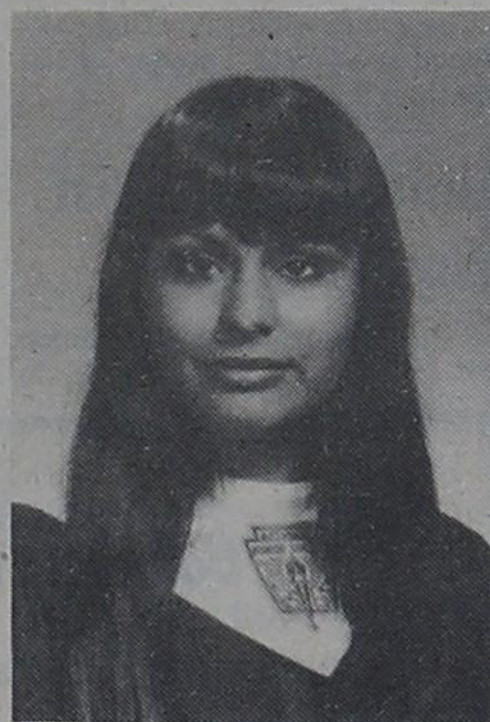

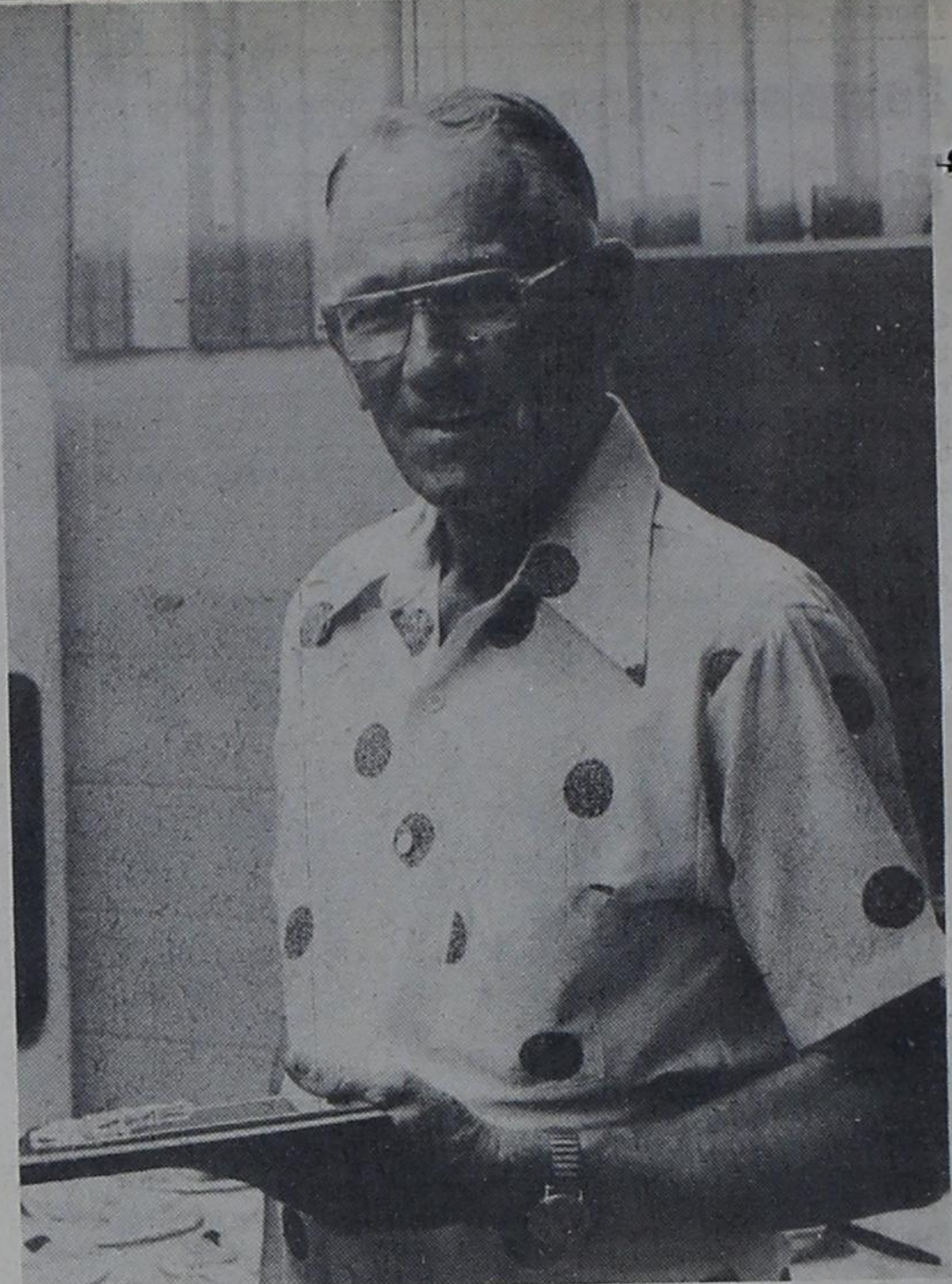
Each member was given a yearbook for the 1977-78 term and everyone is looking forward to interesting programs again for next year.

Farmers, Ranchers Must Plan For Future Business Operations

COLLEGE STATION — How much time do you devote to thinking about and planning for the future? Most farmers and ranchers need to give this question serious consideration because planning for the future is a key part of any business operation, says Dr. Wayne Hayenga, economist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

"Managing change is as important in the business of farming and ranching as it is in any other business. Part of what is involved is learning to respect time, especially the manager's time," points out the Texas A&M University System specialist.

Hayenga points to a successful business consultant who said recently, "One yardstick I have found useful in assessing the real strength of a company is how much time its very best people devote to the future. Wherever I see most of the company preoccupied with today's and next month's and even this year's problems, very frequently I find an enterprise that was either in or headed for trouble.

"On the other hand, the best managed corporations, I find, are those that invest substantial amounts of their most precious resource—the time of their top managers—in the future."

According to Hayenga, these companies protect their future by defining future problems and

opportunities and, most important, deciding how to best shape the future instead of being shocked by it.

"A good time to do a little planning is when you are doing routine work," says the economist. "I do this when I'm driving on the highway. When I was on the farm, I thought about the future and did some planning while plowing."

What does farm planning entail? Hayenga suggests three questions to help in the planning effort.

"First, do you plan to retire in 10 or 15 years, or do you want to buy more farm or ranch land to expand your operation? This is a long range goal.

"Second, how can you best accomplish your long range goal, and what should you do this year to help you reach your goal? Your banker, attorney, family members and business associates can provide assistance."

A third question, says the economist, is "What do you do if?" This question involves operational decisions: "How will a lack of fuel or fertilizer change my operations? Can my marketing plan be improved?"

"Farmers and ranchers face as big a challenge as any businessman in managing their future. But they need to keep a proper perspective. You can't neglect current problems, but you must also allocate enough time to the future. Otherwise, your business can head down an endless tunnel before you realize it," cautions Hayenga.

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Prime Time For Tornadoes in Texas

A spokesman for the U.S. Weather Service says Texas has more tornadoes than any state. Encyclopedia Britannica says Oklahoma and Kansas have more per square mile. But both sources agree that April, May and June are prime time for twisters. May seems to be the worst month of all and the hours between 3 p.m. and 7 p.m. are the most dangerous time because that is when it is easiest for thunderstorms to form and create tornadoes.

North Central Texas in the area ranging roughly from Lubbock to Dallas seems to be the heart of the Texas tornado zone, the U.S. Weather Service (USWS) says. Warm, moist air coming up from the Gulf of Mexico collides with concentrations of cool, dry air coming across North Texas from the Rocky Mountains and the northern U.S. This collision creates thunderstorms that spawn tornadoes and hailstorms, another violent weather pattern that occurs mostly in May.

Scientists have studied tornadoes for years and the one thing they are sure of is their unpredictability. The killer storms can strike anytime anywhere. People need to be alert and prepared to deal with them at all times but especially during tornado season, the Texas Medical Association says.

Tornadoes usually occur in hot, sticky weather with southerly winds and threatening sky with thunderclouds bulging down. In most cases the tornado moves from the west or southwest toward the northeast. Rain and hail often precede the tornado.

Another good weather signal is the USWS bulletin. The USWS issues three types of weather bulletins: a) The severe weather watch bulletin indicates where and when probabilities are highest. b) The severe thunderstorm or tornado warning bulletin means a severe thunderstorm or tornado actually has been sighted in the area or indicated by radar. It is advisable to take cover immediately if the warning is issued in your area. c) The all clear bulletin indicates the storm or the threat of a storm has ended in the area previously included in a severe thunderstorm or tornado bulletin.

If away from home, take shelter in a steel-framed or reinforced concrete building. In open country, move away from the tornado's path at a right angle. Tornadoes can travel between 0-70 mph. If unable to escape its path, lie down flat in a low place that is reasonably safe from flash floods, shield your head and cover your face with clothing to prevent suffocation from dust.

Do not stay in a car, trailer or mobile home. Stay out of buildings with wide-open roofs, such as theaters and gymnasiums.

RETRIEVERS BECOME TOP DOGS AS GUIDES

The German Shepherd is no longer absolutely top dog when it comes to guiding blind men and women.

At Guiding Eyes for the Blind, a Yorktown Heights, New York Training School whose primary purpose is to provide independent mobility via guide dogs, a new dog—the Retriever—is having his day. Nine out of every 10 dogs bred and trained by this School are Labrador or Golden Retrievers. They are now leading hundreds of blind persons to offices, schools and stores in cities and rural areas across the country, taking the pressures in stride.



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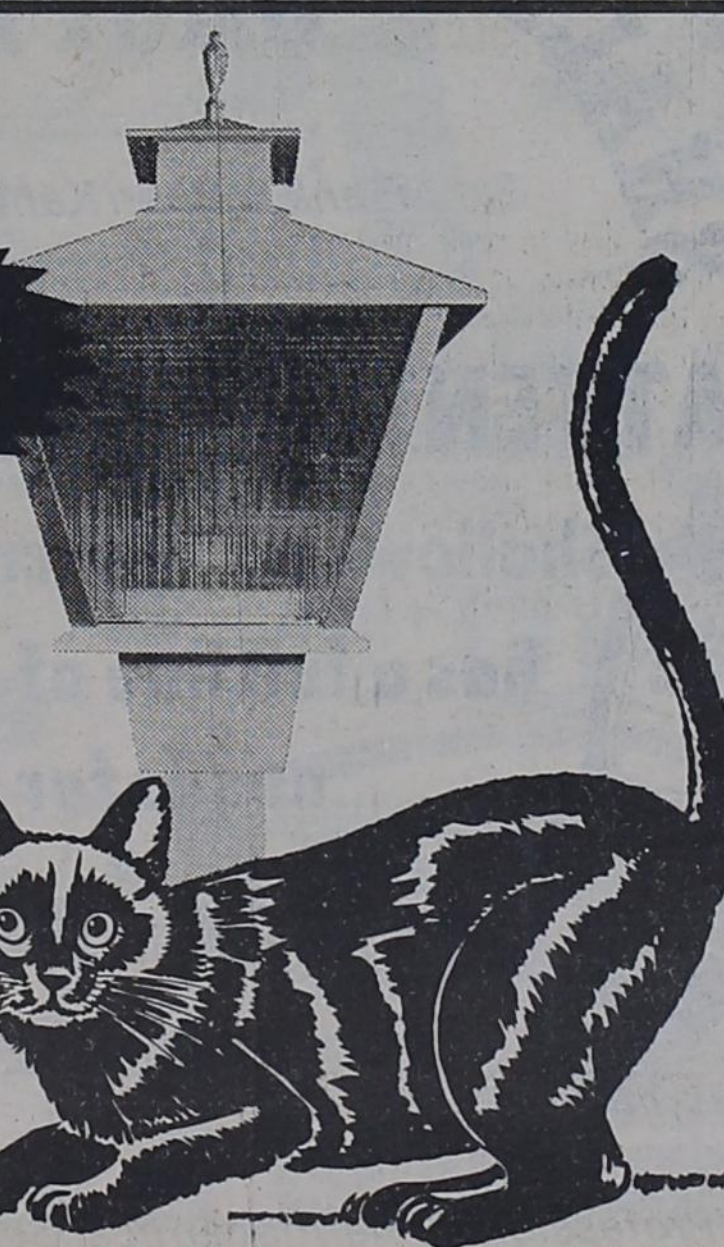
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EMT Meeting Held

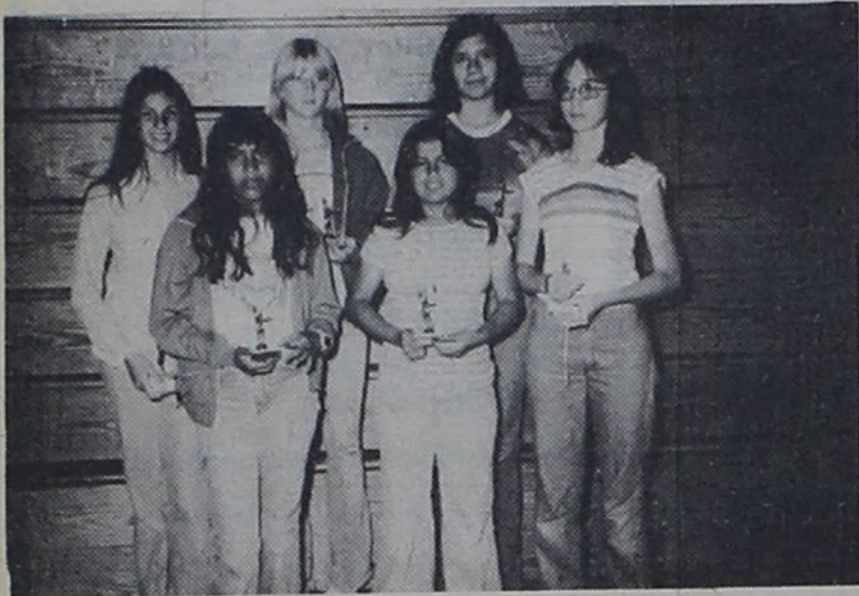

Extension Update

Summer is nearly here and so once again, the air conditioner in your home will be a very busy, very important appliance to you. A clean, well-maintained air conditioner means more efficient cooling—and comfort—for your family.

Regular inspection and cleaning of filters and grills in home air conditioner units keeps the house cooler—and saves fuel.

Filters are traps for the almost invisible impurities in the air and regularly build up an accumulation of dirt.

Air conditioner filters in most units—and those in older buildings—require vacuuming and warm-water washing monthly. Shake off excess water, dry and replace filter.

An alternative to that is the disposable filter—available in various sizes, usually easy to change, and inexpensive.

New homes—or recently remodeled homes—may need more frequent filter changes, or cleanings, during the first cooling season, because of extra dust in the system. For cleaning room grills, use a soft cloth, mild soap and warm water—not waxes or cleaners.

If the system seems sluggish after cleaning, call a service man certified by the manufacturer of the air conditioner—or an electrician.

Since cleaning filters and grills is relatively simple, someone in the family should be responsible for giving them a frequent check.

HOW TO SHOP TELEVISION SET "SALES"

Sales this month on television sets may offer good buys if you know how to find them.

Before shopping, decide on the

type set you need—and decide what you can afford.

Color TV is more popular than black-and-white, but black-and-white does provide the action of most programs—and at half to one-third the price.

A battery-operated set is necessary for the bathroom, laundry room, near the kitchen sink or near a grounded appliance—moisture or an electrical ground mean danger for TV sets operated by an electric current.

When shopping, compare several sets in several stores. A wide variety of controls is available on all sets with a one button control, or as an adjustable knob on some sets. Some consumers prefer the preset control while others like to adjust the fine tune themselves.

Some specifics for TV shopping follow:

—Compare the sets for sharpness, focus, visible detail, sound and for lack of distortion.

—Be sure to examine the warranties.

There are variations in how long parts and labor are covered. Generally warranties require taking the set to an authorized serviceman—or shipping it prepaid to the factory for repair work covered by the warranty.

—Consider location of repair and servicing before buying.

If you don't know a good repairman, it's best to buy from a reliable dealer who has his own service shop.

—Be sure any set you consider has solid-state circuitry. Transistors in solid-state use less energy than tubes, produce less heat during operation and don't burn out the way tubes can.

Even a good thing has a tendency to come to an end.
