Need for feedlot efficiency keynote of beef conference

Major advances in feedlot nutrition may be an entity of the past with future efforts directed toward the evaluation of existing practices and nutrient requirements and a search for new additives for more efficient beef production, according to Dr. R. Hollis Klett, superintendent of the Texas Tech University Center at Amarillo.

Klett addressed the first Texas Beef Conference meeting in the Amarillo Civic Center Friday. The conference, sponsored by Texas Tech University, the Agricultural Extension Service, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Texas Cattle Feeders' Association and West Texas State University, brought together researchers, educators, legislators, consumer affairs specialists and cattlemen for discussions of the status and trends in the beef industry.

Klett discussed energy-fiber-protein relationships in feedlot rations. Klett said the removal of diethylstilbestrol (DES), a synthetic hormone, from cattle feeding by the Food and Drug Administration (FDA) has provided the impetus for studies toward practices such as the removal of protein at defined stages of finishing or manipulation of feed-fiber and energy sources to improve efficiency of feed utilization.

Klett explained that DES is a synthetic hormone which caused steers to produce more muscle and less fat while being finished out in feedlots. A desirable replacement additive which produces the same effects in cattle is being searched for.

He emphasized the high cost of feed cattle and feed ingredients coupled with the price ceiling placed on beef have made efficiency of production the key to a profitable feeding program.

Other presentations at the beef conference included discussions of cattle death losses on the high plains, handling light calves on arrival, new cattle disease research, and antibiotics, hormones and substitutes.

A session of the conference devoted to the consumers' concern about beef was presented by Virginia Knauer, special assistant to the president for consumer affairs, with responses by Tom Herrick, president of the Texas Cattle Feeders' Association, and Bill Donnell, president of the Texas and Southwestern Cattle Raisers' Association. Dr. Anson R. Bertrand, dean of the Texas Tech University College of Agricultural Sciences, presided over the consumers concern session.

Guidelines aid painters

Spring painters can do better work around the house with several basic guidelines, according to Patricia A. Bradshaw.

The housing and home furnishings specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University, first suggested painting in a room kept at 60-70 degrees to permit smooth paint application.

"Also, the home painter can cut drying time, fumes and odors by creating good cross-ventilation."

"Before painting, remove as many furnishings as possible from the room, and cover remaining furnishings and floors with drip cloths or newspapers."

"Also remove light-switch and wall plug plates—they can be painted before reinstallation on freshly painted walls."

Miss Bradshaw advised painting "like a pro."

This includes dipping only the bottom third of the brushes into paint to avoid drips and splatters.

When splatters occur, remove them immediately.

"When using latex paint, excessive dripping results in quick-drying paint build-up on roller nap or at the base of brush bristles. To prevent, wash brush or roller with water occasionally."

"During long interruptions cover the can and suspend brush or roller in water (for water-base paints) or turpentine (for oil-base paints)."

"Between jobs keep paint can tightly closed and clean brush or rollers, the specialist stressed. "To clean applicators dipped in latex paint, wash with soap and water, then rinse thoroughly."

"For brushes used in oil-base paint, loosen paint in turpentine or thinner. Then work bristles against bottom of container. To release paint in brush center, squeeze or work bristles between thumb and forefinger. Rinse brush again in turpentine or thinner."

"Finally, rinse brush in mild soap suds and then in clear water. Straighten bristles, then wrap brush in heavy paper or aluminum foil."

"Store brushes by hanging or placing them flat—never stand brushes on bristles. Rollers should always be hung when stored," the specialist concluded.

Fryer price drop due

Fryers will wear attractive price tags soon, if they follow recent reports of adequate supplies. Mrs. Gwendolyn Clyatt said this week.

The consumer marketing specialist, Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University, added that whole fryers make a better buy than parts. "Frozen turkeys are available in most meat departments with some markets featuring parts at prices consumers can't afford to ignore."

"There are fewer specials on beef and pork, but they are worth considering," the specialist remarked.

"Best pork values at this time generally include shoulder roasts and steaks, end cut loin roasts and pork chops, hams, picnics and pork liver."

"Beef chuck cuts, ground beef, round steaks and beef liver make generally more economical choices in that department."

"Turning to fruit and vegetable counters, Mrs. Clyatt mentioned strawberries as one of the more expensive 'first of the season' items, adding that prices will drop as supply increases. Pineapple—at its peak this month—will follow the same pattern price-wise."

"Melons—mostly cantaloupe—and avocados are available. Citrus crops have been excellent, but there will be fewer grapefruit on the market this month."

LAZBUDDIE (Special)—A 68-year-old Shallowater man became the 45th South Plains traffic accident victim of 1973 Wednesday morning.

Claude J. Blackburn, 68, of Shallowater died at 5:45 a.m. Wednesday in Highland Hospital in Lubbock as the result of injuries he sustained in a two-car accident 12 miles east of Muleshoe on U.S. 70 at 5 p.m. Friday.

Blackburn had lived in Shallowater about one and one-half years after moving there from Lazbuddie.

Disabled Workers Should Apply Promptly For Social Security Payments

Workers who face a possible long-term disability should apply for social security benefits as soon as possible to avoid loss of payments they may be entitled to, according to social security officials here.

Social security pays monthly cash benefits to eligible workers and their families if the worker is severely disabled and cannot work for a year or more. "Back payments can only be made for up to 12 months," a social security spokesman said. "So you shouldn't delay your application—even if you're not sure you'll qualify for payments."

About one of every 12 workers who get social security disability payments doesn't get all of his back benefits because he didn't apply soon enough, according to the spokesman.

"If you're disabled and haven't applied for benefits, call any social security office and apply as soon as possible," he said. "Or ask a friend or relative to call for you."

It can help speed up the processing of the claim if the disabled worker has certain information ready when he applies, the spokesman noted. "For example, we'll need the names and addresses of doctors and hospitals involved, dates of treatment, and a brief history of the disability," he said.

To qualify for payments, a worker must be disabled before 65. "He must have worked long enough on jobs covered by social security. That's generally at least 5 years of work during the 10 before the disability began," the spokesman said. "But younger workers can qualify with less covered work—as little as 1½ years for workers under 24. Most jobs are covered."

The disability can be a severe physical or mental impairment that prevents any substantial work for a year or more.

Because of a recent change in the law, starting

in January 1973, social security payments will begin for the 6th month after the disability began, and the first check will be delivered early in the 7th month. Under the old law, payments began for the 7th month after the disability started, and the first check was delivered early in the 8th month.

Social security pays \$390 million a month in disability benefits to 3 million people—1.7 million disabled workers and 1.3 million members of their families. The average payment to a disabled worker with a wife and children is \$355 a month.

In selected cases, social security helps pay for vocational rehabilitation services from State and local agencies, the spokesman said.

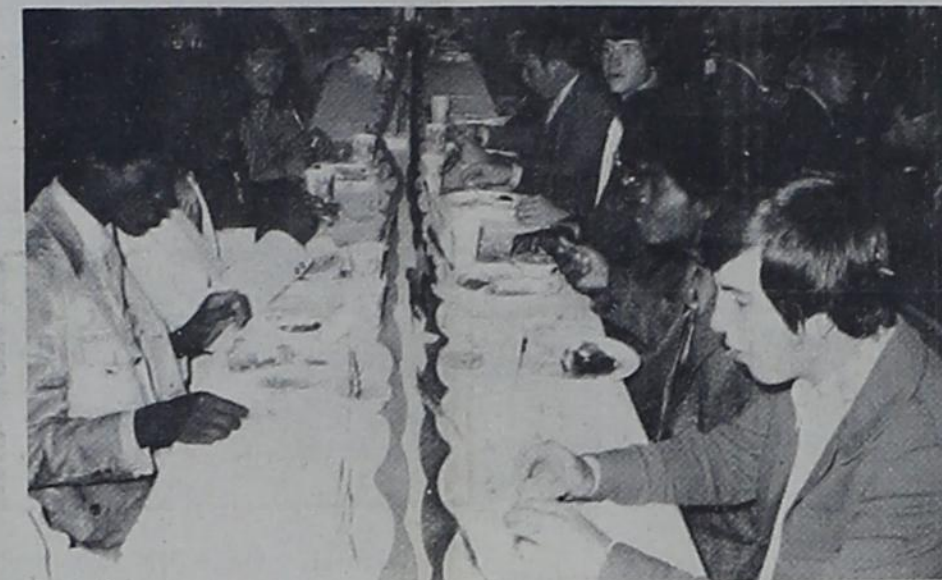

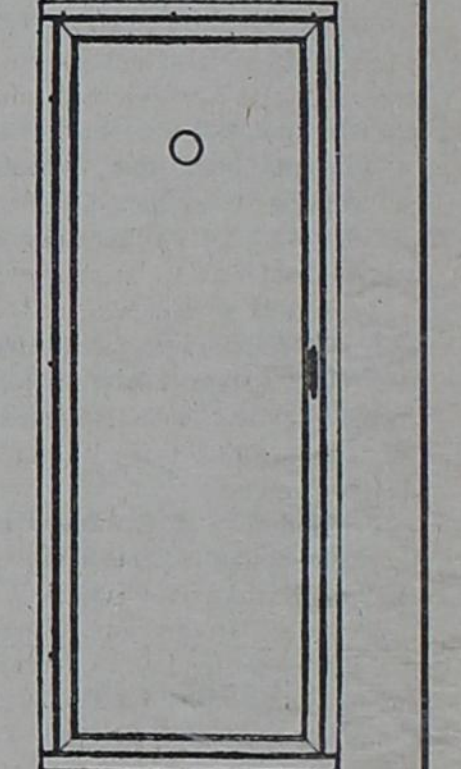

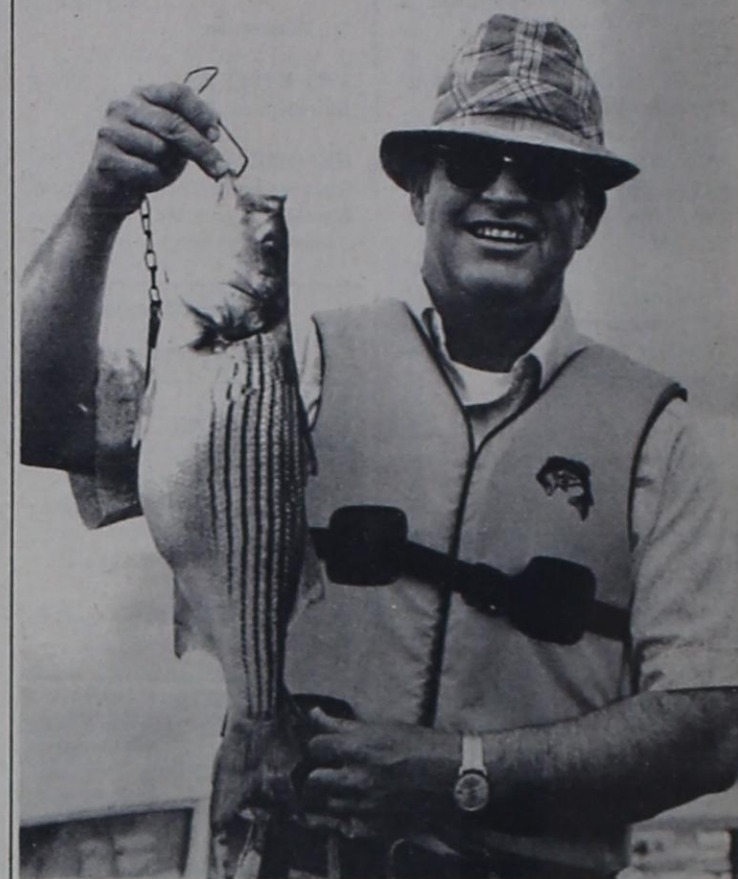
Women's Lib 'making more alcoholics'

LAKE E.V. SPENCE—Black bass fishing at Lake Spence has been slow during the past week, due to muddy water conditions, but catfish anglers and striped

bass fishermen have been netting some respectable hauls.

Lake Spence caught an additional five feet of water last week. Heavy rains fell on the upper Colorado River watershed. Lake Spence receives its major source of water from the Colorado.

Cattfishermen are setting their lines in the river region of the lake and are baiting with cut bait and shrimp. Channel catfish have made up the major portion of their stringers, but some fair-sized yellows have also been taken.

Stripers don't seem to be hampered by the sudden rise in water level. Some salties in the eight-pound class have been caught by trotliners who baited with minnows.

Bait casters are taking them in deep water with spoons and deep running lures. Like catfish, the stripers appear to be heading to the flowing water.

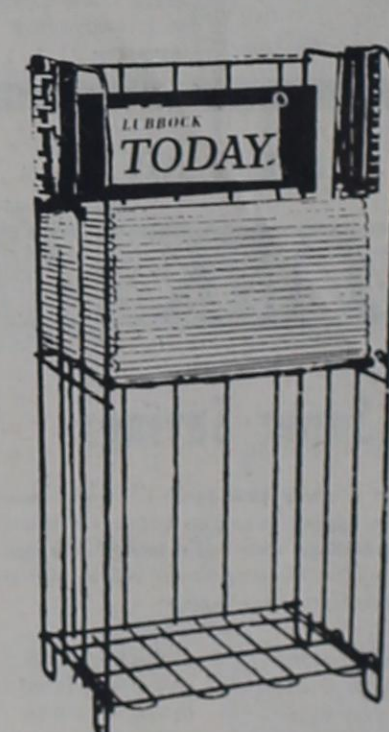
