This is far ahead of the volume at this date last year when only 8,500 samples of the 1972 crop had been classed
Quality of the cotton harvested continued excellent and is considerably higher than last year.
Grades of 31 and 41 continued to be the predominant grades at Lubbock, making up 72 percent of all classed. Grade 31 made up 32 percent, Grade 41, 40 pe
Grade 32,12 perce

Staples were predominantly 30 32. Forty-fivedominantly 30 staple lengths of 30 and had and the 55 shorter and the remaining 55 percent stapled 31 and $312 / 32$. staple length was $31.2 / 32 \mathrm{nds}$ of an inch.
Micronaire readings are an indication of fiber fineness or maturity. These readings indicate that most of the early harvested bales were fully mature. 83 percent of all cotton tested at Lubbock had micronaire readings in the premium range of 3.5 to 4.9 , 11. percent was in the high micronaire range of 5.0 to 5.2 and 4 percent was in the very high range of 5.3 and above
The Agricultural Marketing Service of the U.S.D.A. reported increased trading on the Lubbock market. Prices were $\$ 20.00$ to $\$ 30.00$ per bale higher and averaged 34 cents per pound and the loan. Most lots were selling in the price range of 50 to 60 ing in per pound per pound
Average prices paid for the most predominant qualities in the 3.5 to 4.9 premium micronair range were: Grade 31, Staple 30 49.65 cents per pound; Grade 31 Staple 31-52.40; Grade 31, Stampe 32 - 55.40; Grade 41 Staple 30-48.70; Grade 41, Staple 31-51.25; and Grade 41, Staple 32 -53.95.
