Scientists at the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station in Lubbock say that research is turning up come answers to preventing heavy cotton losses on the South Plains.

Two diseases known as root-knot nematode and fusarium wilt, which often combine to wipe out entire crops on the High Plains, have been found vulnerable to soil fumigation practices using control chemicals,

A nematologist with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station, Orr says that field studies conducted from 1965 to 1972 in ten counties on the South Plains reveal that soil fumigation can increase cotton production yields an average of 150 pounds of lint per acre

"Root-knot nematodes appear as galls or knots on the roots of cotton plants," he explains. "They cause a stunted growth pattern because the disease attacks the root tissues. The nematode also acts as a means of entry for the fusarium wilt.

"The fungus caused by the wilt will spread through the entire plant causing it to turn yellow and eventually die," he adds.

According to the researcher, the best results in abating these problem diseases were control practices which used soil fumigation.

"We applied the control chemicals using one chisel per row in soil with adequate moisture," he explains, "and when soil temperature was above 50 degrees."

"Another important aspect of the soil fumigation practice," he points out, "is pure economics. The total cost is less than four dollars per acre, and that alone should be enough incentive for saving a promising cotton crop."

Turning to fusarium wilt, Orr explains that the disease is much

Frenship School District won the first round Wednesday in what may prove to be a long and bitter battle to keep a part of the original school district's area. In a 4 to 1 vote, the County Commissioner's Court of Lubbock County refused the petition of land developer Howell Kilgore, which has been requesting the de-annexation of a section of land bordered by the Lubbock Independent School District, and within the newly annexed city limits of Lubbock. Kilgore had contended that the land involved was actually more a part of the city of Lubbock than that of the Frenship (ie Wolfforth) areas, and thereby should be allowed to be included in the Lubbock Independent School District. Lubbock Independent School District Superintendent Ed Irons appeared at the hearing and pointed out where proposed sites for future school locations were in regard to the developer's section of land.

The vote by the Commissioner's Court went as follows: FOR the de-annexation of the land, a single vote by Commissioner Alton Brazell; AGAINST the deannexation, four votes, cast by Commissioners Les Derrick, Arch Lamband Max Arrants and County Judge Rod Shaw.

Although there had been no move by press time, it was expected by court house observers that an appeal would be filed by Mr. Kilgore's attorney within the next few days. The only question remaining unanswered at the present time was whether the appeal would be filed in a local district court or in Austin with the State Board of Education.

like a side effect of the nematode disease.

"Total crop losses have been known to occur when both diseases attack the plant," says the nematologist. "But, usually, the severity of the fusarium wilt is reduced when the disease damage wrought by the nematodes is brought under control.

"Some cotton varieties," continues Orr, "have a tolerance to the namatodes. However, many of these varieties are open-boll types and typically have a weaker fiber strength."

Rotating to grain sorghum was found to reduce nematode infestation in some cases, he adds. The sorghum is more tolerant to the disease than cotton or vegetable crops.

"However," he concludes, "rootknot nematodes will live and reproduce on the grain sorghum roots. If enough nematodes survive, the disease will almost always reoccur in next year's crop, even after the sorghum rotation."

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PUBLIC NOTICE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

SPECIAL ELECTION NOVEMBER 6, 1973

NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 8)

Article III, Sections 5, 24 and 49a and Article VIII, Section 6 of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Provide for regular annual sessions of the Legislature. The regular session in each odd-numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 180 days. The regular session in each even numbered year would be for a period not to exceed 60 days and would be limited to consideration of fiscal matters and any emergency matters submitted by the Governor. The 60 day ses-sion could be extended by the Governor for a period not to exceed 30 days;

Provide an annual salary for members of the Legislature not exceeding \$15,000 per year and a per diem not exceeding \$18 per day for each day of each regular

session or special session; Provide that no appropriation of money shall be made for a longer term than one year and direct the Comptroller to make annual estimates of anticipated revenue rather than biennial estimates.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as

"The constitutional amendment to provide for annual regular sessions of the legislature; and to provide an annual salary of \$15,000 and per diem for the members of the legislature, effective in January,

NUMBER TWO ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 7)

Article XVI, Sections 50 and 51 of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be aban-doned except with the consent of both spouses.

Presently a single adult person is not entitled to claim a homestead exemption and a married man can abandon a family homestead without the consent of his wife.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as

"The constitutional amendment to include within the scope of homestead protection the real property of a single adult person which meets the other requirements of homestead property, and to provide that a family homestead may not be abandoned except with the consent of both spouses.'

NUMBER THREE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 13)

Article VIII, Sections 1-a and 1-b of the Texas Constitution are amended to:

Extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the residential homesteads of unmarried adults.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as follows:

'The constitutional amendment to extend the \$3,000 ad valorem tax exemption to the homesteads of unmarried adults.'

NUMBER FOUR ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 1)

Article XVI, Section 59, of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Subsection (e) which:

Provides that no law creating a conservation and reclamation district shall be passed unless a copy of the proposed law is delivered to the commissioners court of each county and to the governing body of each incorporated city or town in whose jurisdiction said district or any part thereof is or will be located. Each such commissioners court and governing body may file its written consent or oppo-sition to the proposed law with the Governor, Lieutenant Governor and Speaker of the House of Representatives. Each special law creating such a district must comply with general laws then in effect relating to consent by political subdivisions to the creation of such

districts. The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as

> 'The constitutional amendment establishing certain requirements relative to the enactment of laws creating certain conservation and reclamation districts."

NUMBER FIVE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 12)

Article XI, Section 7 of amended to:

Provide that all counties and cities bordering on the coast of the Gulf of Mexico are authorized to levy a tax to pay for bonds issued for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a majority vote of the resident property tax-payers. Counties and cities are presently authorized to levy such taxes and this amendment only changes the required vote from a twothirds majority to a simple

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as

'The constitutional amendment authorizing counties and cities bordering on the Gulf of

for the construction of sea walls and breakwaters upon a vote of the resident property tax-

NUMBER SIX ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 26)

Article V, Section 8 of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new paragraph which:

Provides that the district court, concurrently with the county court, shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court and in a probate proceeding shall also have the jurisdiction otherwise conferred on it by law. It also provides that the legislature may increase, diminish, or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, may adopt rules governing the filing, distribution, or transfer of cases and proceedings as between the courts having jurisdiction of probate matters, and may provide that all appeals in probate matters shall be to the courts of civil ap-

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it will appear on the

ballot is as follows:
"The constitutional amendment stating that the district court concurrently with the county court shall have the general jurisdiction of a probate court, and providing the jurisdiction thereof, and further providing that in any probate proceeding the district court shall also have jurisdiction otherwise conferred upon it by law, and further providing that the legislature may increase, diminish or eliminate the jurisdiction of the district court or county court in probate matters, and further pro-viding that the legislature shall have power to adopt rules governing the filing, distribution and transfer of all such cases and proceedings as between district courts, county courts, and other courts having jurisdiction thereof, and further pro-viding that the legislature may provide that all appeals in such matters shall be to the courts of (civil) appeals."

NUMBER SEVEN ON THE BALLOT (H.J.R. 6)

Article III, Section 49-b the Texas Constitution is of the Texas Constitution is amended to:

Provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund. This amendment increases the present \$400 million authorization to \$500 million;

Remove the present provision which permits buying of land only by those veterans who served between September 16, 1940 and the date of formal withdrawal of United States troops from the armed conflict in Viet Nam. This amendment would allow all veterans who serve after September 16, 1940 to buy land from the Veterans' Land Fund, provided they are otherwise qualified;

Provide that, in the event Mexico to issue bonds of the death of an eligible

Texas veteran after the veteran has filed with the Board an application and contract of sale to purchase through the Board the tract selected by him or her and before the purchase has been completed, then the surviving spouse may complete the transaction.

The wording of the proposed amendment as it will appear on the ballot is as

'The constitutional amendment to provide for an additional \$100 million in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the Veterans' Land Fund."

NUMBER EIGHT ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 29)

Article XI, of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 5(a)

Authorizes and requires incorporated cities, towns, and villages, regardless of population and notwithstanding the constitutional limitations on total tax rates, to levy such annual ad valorem taxes on the taxable property in the city, town or village as are necessary to pay the principal of and interest on, when due, the general obligations here-inafter issued by the city, town, or village. The legislature is empowered to limit by general or special law the total principal amount of general obligations which may be issued, but unless and until the legislature acts to do so, the limitations established by statute with respect to the total principal amount of bonds which may be issued by independent school districts shall apply as the rate limitation on cities, towns, and vil-

The wording of the proposed constitutional amendment as it appears on the ballot is as follows:
"The constitutional

amendment to authorize cities, towns, and villages to levy such ad valorem taxes as are sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on their general obligations hereafter issued subject to the restrictions provided by

NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT (S.J.R. 25)

Article VIII of the Texas Constitution is amended by adding a new Section 2C which:


Allows the Legislature, by general law, to exempt all real and personal property used by non-profit water supply corporations or cooperatives from all property taxes. The exemp-tion would apply only to such property as is reasonably necessary to conduct the business of a non-profit water supply corporation or cooperative.

ballot is as follows:
"The constitutional amendment authorizing the legislature to exempt from property taxes certain property used by a non-profit water supply corporation or a nonprofit water supply cooperative.

Still, he seemed to sum up what the reserves, using Utah plays, unfortunately, felt. The reserves scrapped the so-called first two offensive and defensive teams pretty much to a standstill. When it was all over, there was a lot of head shaking.

True, the "Utes" only scored once, but it was a sustained drive, something like 70 or 80 yards and included a fourth and 15 pass that succeeded against a veteran defensive backfield.

Indeed, that vaunted defensive secondary did a good job of equalling the rest of the team. Neither was impressive. Oh, for a time, the defense had the upperhand, but as the session continued, the reserves became embarrassingly potent.

Okay, so it was a dismal effort Saturday. It's behind us and the real game is ahead, that's the important thing. There's no question but what the players were tired after two-a-days. Work has been intensive this fall and the enthusiasm, Saturday, wasn't there.

As one observor quipped, as he listened to the Country Western music languidly flowing from the loudspeakers onto the field: "The players are about as inspired as the music."

I have every confidence that the Red Raiders will put it all together this week. They may have scored a lopsided victory over Utah last year, but the Utes have a better team, apparently, than they showed.

Also, in Don VanGalder, they have a quarterback who is one of the best. He's a year more experienced and he has a more experienced line to operate behind. The Utah defense is suspect, but Bill Meek is capable of bringing that along rapidly.

It's not, despite the 45-2 rout a year ago, an easy opener. The Utes are capable of moving the ball and Tech's defense ought to get a good test, both on the ground and through the air.

As for the Raiders, the potential is there. You can talk all you want to about inexperience, but it depends on what you mean. If you mean many offensive and defensive players didn't start last year, you're right. If you mean they haven't (1) played or (2) gained experience in games, you're wrong.

All in all, I look for an interesting game, with the Raiders getting a good test, but coming out on top with ease. Both teams probably will be a little tight. Both probably will make mistakes.

After that, I look for the Raiders to start putting on a show, led by Joe Barnes, George Smith, John Garner, James Mosley and the finest stable of backs Tech probably has ever had. By all means get a look at Tech Saturday. I think you'll like what you see and will come back-and back-and back. ******

Everybody else is picking the way the conference is goind to wind up after the final action, so I might as well join them, even though the only team I've seen is Tech.

It appears to be another one of those years when the league is divided into three portions. The top echelon has only one team, Texas. The Horns appear to be in a class by themselves. In the second echelon is Tech and, at this point, SMU and maybe Baylor. The third echelon has Arkansas, A&M, Baylor, Rice and TCU.

I hope someone trips up Texas. At this writing, I don't know which team it will be. The Horns could be better than last year.

Then comes Tech and SMU-and I'm going to have to include a much improved Baylor team on this level. Injuries could kill the Mustangs and

That leaves the lower echelon to the Aggies, Owls, Frogs, and would you believe it, the Razorbacks!

If you want to analyze it, SMU could have the more explosive attack,

while the Bears will depend more on balance and inspiration. Tech has ability and good depth. I can't buy the Kiddie Korps at A&M as a contender. Arkansas could

surprise, because I respect Frank Broyles. The Hogs could hurt anyone and overyone. The Owls will hve ups and downs, with more of the latter. While the Frogs could be the best defensive team in the league and be the real spoilers in the title chase. ***********

Joy wrote for the prize winning recipe "since we raise and eat so many blackeyed peas in Hockley County". Joy tried the recipe on her family with favorable results-well, it was really 75 percent favorable. It is a different way to serve blackeyed peas and Joy has graciously shared the recipe. I hope you will try it and let Joy Wheeler know if you like it.

Blackeyed Pea Casserole

- 1 cup cooked blackeyed peas 1 cup white corn meal
- 1/2 cup flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon soda 2 eggs, slightly beaten
- 1 cup buttermilk
- 1/2 cup cooking oil
- 1/2 pound grated sharp cheese
- 1 chopped onion
- 2 to 3 Jalapeno peppers
- ½ can (size 303) corn
- 1 pound drained and browned hamburger meat

Mix all together adding the cheese last (reserve 1/2 cup of the cheese for topping). Pour in greased oblong pan. Top with cheese. Bake at 350 degrees F. 45 minutes.



To help you interpret and make the best use of your test scores, you will receive a booklet called Your PSAT/NMSQT Scores with your score report which will explain how you can estimate your SAT scores. Then, by using such College Board services as The College Handbook and College Locater Service, you can compare yourself with enrolled students at hundreds of colleges and universities as well as find out your chances of getting into—and succeeding at—the colleges of your choice.
