Shallowater from Brownfield on
May 20, 1948 and he was very
active in the club until an illness
on March 10, 1975 forced his
retirement. The club was first
organized in 1948 and after two
years, became inactive. In 1954
the club was rechartered and
Powell served as President for
three years.

He also served as zone chairman in 1961 and again in 1968 was District Deputy to the Governor in 1962-63 and was selected "Man of the Year" in 1965 and was on the Board of Directors from 1954 until 1975.



Powell is also a Mason, joining on May 16, 1967. He was Worshipful Master in 1970 and is also a lifetime member.

#### Windsong Addition Progress Reported

The laying of several hundred feet of water and sewer lines has been completed by Irrigation, Inc. of Littlefield in the Windsong Addition and plans for paving approximately 1350 feet of 5th Street should get underway later in the week.

At an approximate cost of \$35,000, Irrigation, Inc. layed sewer and water lines on the south side of 5th Street, between 5th and 6th streets and 6th and 7th streets.

The new Windsong Addition was approved at the October council meeting and developer of the project is Bridin, Inc. with Shallowater resident, Robert Mauldin serving as president.

Joining Mauldin in the development are well known home builders, Brian Walker and Dwayne Mauldin, Vice President of Briercroft Savings and Loan.

Building sites will be ready for the construction of homes in January. Information concerning the lots may be obtained by calling 792-2907 between 9 a.m. and 5 p.m., or by writing to 8506 Knoxville Avenue, Lubbock, Texas 79423.

The lots will average 65 x 120 feet in size, and construction will be restricted to brick homes with at least 1400 square feet. In addition to the building lots, Bridin, Inc. has dedicated three well sites to the city to provide for the future water needs of Shallowater.

The South Plains Shrine Club of the Khiva Shrine Temple is creating a scholarship for education in burn care to be awarded a student of Texas Tech University School of Medicine (TTUSM), local club President Ralph Jumper announced today.

Scholarship recipients will study for one month at the Galveston Unit of the Shriners Hospitals for Crippled Children, Burns Institute. The month's study will be a regular elective for the student, according to TTUSM Dean George S. Tyner, and carry full elective credit.

"We are hoping this program will begin a new trend in education on the management of burns," Jumper said. "Scholarship recipients will bring back information to other students and will be contributing to burn treatment wherever these young physicians practice."

The scholarship recipient will be sent to Galveston by the South Plains Shrine Club and will spend a month as a working member of the Burns Institute staff. Under direction of Duane L. Larson, M.D., chief of staff for the Institute, the recipient will participate in all facets of burn treatment.

The Galveston Institute is nationally recognized as a leader in research on pediatric burn care and has developed many of the innovative management techniques being used in burn centers across the country. When the Galveston Institute was created by the Shrine in 1966, patients with burns covering 50 per cent of their bodies had a 50 per cent chance for survival. Today, at the Galveston Burn Institute a patient with a 50 per cent burn has better than a 90 per cent chance of survival.

Some new developments produced at the Institute are: accident and burn prevention through education and legislation including regulation of flammable garments for children; development of formulas for intravenous fluid replacements in children; prevention of stress ulcers (in stomach and small bowels) by the flow of milk and antiacids. Further developments include: use of improved methods for skin grafting; prevention of chondritis of ears (inflammation of cartilage) through improved management; marked decrease in crippling deformities and scar formations by the use of pressure garments and splints.

Initial care and treatment of burn patients makes an important contribution to the patient's chances for survival and to damage ultimately sustained. "It is our hope, that with a good understanding of the course treatment takes, these young physicians will be able to direct initial treatment more knowledgably," Potentate W.E. Scott of Amarillo said.

Criteria for scholarship awards has been developed by the TTUSM Office of the Associate Dean for Academic Affairs to include previous academic performance and evaluation of demonstrated clinical expertise.

The winner will be flown to and from Galveston, and stay in university housing during the month of study.

Funding for the scholarship will come from proceeds of the Shrine Club's fund raising activities including the bingo booth at the South Plains Panhandle Fair. The local group hopes to augment with donations so that interest on a permanent endowment will enable one recipient a month to receive the training.

"Some Shriners and non-Shriners alike may wish to make year-end tax deductable charitable contributions to the South Plains Shrine Club Scholarship Fund at the Texas Tech University School of Medicine," said Jumper. "Contributions may be made to the fund through the school at Box 4569, Lubbock, Texas, 79409."

Shriners opened their first crippled children's hospital in 1922 in Shreveport, Louisiana. They currently operate 18 crippled children's hospitals and three burn institutes in the U.S., Canada and Mexico. Since the program's inception, approximately 250,000 children have received partial or fully paid care. Traditionally, only the most severe cases are admitted to a Shrine Institute regardless of ability to pay. Hospitals are funded nationally by the Shrine through activities such as football bowl games, circuses and hospital benefit days.

The reason for the wasting of all that water is that the council had the water tower painted and due to having only one tower, had to close off the water flow into the tower in order to have it cleaned, sand blasted and painted on the inside.

City employees have been working around the clock to stop the water pressure as near normal as possible, due to water being pumped from the storage tank direct into the lines, and an over buildup of pressure could have caused lines to burst.

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


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


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
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## Sheridan's Ride

I'll bet you a dollar to a donut that you can't pin-point exactly where you were, what you were doing at five minutes after noontime thirty-six years ago today! Well, I can tell you where and what I was going to the letter!

My alltime favorite, Greta Garbo, had just completed what was to be her final film, "The Two-Faced Woman," a sad affair billed as a comedy with Melvyn Douglas in the co-starring spot.

Remember this was produced in the days before the coded G-X range had been introduced and, for 1941, some of the scenes in the picture were deemed pretty "hot stuff." So much so that there was talk about pulling the picture out of national circulation.

It had opened on a Thursday at the giant (now razed) Fox Theater in San Francisco and so, this Sunday, Dec. 7, I drove the 20 miles from my home on the Peninsula (Burlingame) into the city to catch the first showing at 11 a.m.

Now, while I had done it before, I am not given to going off to the movies at breakfast time. But, Garbo was special, and I, fearful that the film would be jerked, fled to the Fox to catch the picture while it was still available. (It was never pulled-in fact, it just died a merciful death at the box office and sent Garbo into lifelong retirement!)

Well, I saw the picture. I got into my car and pointed the nose across Market St. and down the road toward home. The big Naval station, Moffat Field (Sunnyvale) was some forty miles down the road (the Bayshore Highway) and it was not uncommon for the intersecting corners of Market and Mission Streets to have a parcel of bell bottomed sailors heading back to the base after their night on the town. This particular Sunday broke all the records. Those gobs, in their blues and white caps, were seemingly everywhere. I had switched on the car radio as I left the theater, since high noon on the Pacific Coast meant the weekly broadcast of the New York Philharmonic Orchestra on CBS,

In the short space of about three minutes, I had picked up a hitchhiking sailor, had the concert interrupted for a special news bulletin and my lifetime suffered an instant and radical change.

That bulletin interruption was, of course, the announcement of the bombing of Pearl Harbor by Japan and the beginning of World War II.

All sailors had been ordered back to the base immediately, hence the mobs of them on every street corner of the highway. There was high tension, confusion and fear rampant in the city by the Golden Gate, for here we were, perched on the very lip of the continent, and those thousands of miles from the Golden Gate to Tokyo Bay had narrowed in an instant. The enemy was "out there" and nobody knew what to do about it! The blackouts, the exaggerations, the false alarms were to come in the next awful days and nights.

And so I drove my sailor down the highway, past the airport and along the (then) unchartered mudflats and brackish bay water to the turn off at Broadway, Burlingame, where I let my navy man out, and headed for

That Sunday, December 7, 1941, you see, does live in "infamy," as the then Chief Executive President Franklin Delano Roosevelt was to say the following day to the stunned nation. It sent Garbo into the retirement in New York City that she has maintained ever since "The Two-Faced Woman," and it sent many of us into ways of life totally strange, at home and abroad.

It was 36 years ago today. Can time have passed so quickly? It seems

like it was only yesterday.

Along these lines I want to report that I have just finished yet another book with a show business background, that I got from the public library and that I think will fascinate and entertain you. It is Charles Higham's new biography "Marlene," which tells the story of the fabulous Marlene Dietrich, the legs and all, her full life (she is 76 now and ailing) on screen and stage, her loves and her vexations.

It is yet another finely researched job by author Higham, following up on his superb biography, "Kate: The Story of Katharine Hepburn," a few years ago.

Dietrich rose to international fame and stardom as Lola-Lola in "The Blue Angel" that masterpiece of the destruction of a school teacher (Emil Jannings) at the hands of the obsession of his life, the sleazy night club singer. This is the film that provided Marlene with her signature tune all the years, "Falling in Love Again," which you must remember.

Her long love affair with Jean Gabin, her tragic marriage but maintained until the end of his life with Rudolph Sieber, all is told here

and most tastefully.

It was interesting that I finished reading the book over breakfast on Friday morning last week. That night on the cable-TV out of Dallas channel 3's 9 o'clock movie turned out to be the superb Stanley Kramer Academy Award-winning film, "Judgement at Nuremberg," starring Dietrich along with Spencer Tracy, Judy Garland, Burt Lancaster and Maximillian Schell, among others (Schell won the Oscar for Best Actor for this one). And, lo, the very next night, Saturday, our own superb Channel 5, KXTX-TV (Texas Tech-Public Broadcasting Service) on their laudable Saturday 9 o'clock revivals of the greats of filmdom, gave us nothing less than the original German dialogue (English subtitles) "The Blue Angel." Talk about timing it right; I did so certainly with "Marlene."

Speaking of television, there has been and is a wealth of entertainment this past month and continuing through the Christmasladen weeks to come on Home Box Office, that specialized and valuable

adjunct to the regular cable-TV channels here in Lubbock. For example, in the past days I have watched "The Sting," that fine movie with Paul Newman, Robert Redford and Robert Shaw, uncut in any way and not riddled with commercials; "The Encounter," last Christmas's first run release at theaters; and coming up this month are the Barbra Streisand-Kris Kristofferson "A Star Is Born," Newman's "The Mackintosh Man," Julie Christie's strange "Demon Seed," "Bugsy Malone" that kids musical, and "Fun With Dick and Jane," Jane Fonda and George Segal. To say nothing of the lavish and naughty "Casino de Paris" show film in its original state in the City of Lights, starring Line

So, you see, you don't have to move a muscle to be entertained these days. Just hook on to Cable-TV and add HBO and settle back with your Kool-Aid, tea, or your favorite drink and let the rest of the world go by!

#### **Public Hearing** Set Dec. 12

A public hearing will be held in Lubbock from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. December 12 at the Garden and Arts Center, 4215 University Avenue, to gather comment on proposed changes in the way the state sets rates to pay nursing homes for the care of Medicaid patients.

John Frannea of Austin, who heads the medical program development section for the Texas Department of Human Resources (TDHR), will conduct

the hearing. TDHR presently pays nursing homes a flat rate per patient per day, varying from facility to facility only with the type of care required. New federal regulations require states to base the rate on

"a reasonable cost-related reimbursement methodology." In addition to the Lubbock hearing, others are scheduled December 13 in Dallas, December 14 in Houston, and December 15

in San Antonio. "These hearings are being held to encourage interested parties to comment on the material and to propose possible improvements in the rate setting process," Frannea said. "The Department is seeking to establish reasonable and equitable rates of reimbursement in the long term care programs. Comments and suggestions from the public and from the industry are sought in order to reach this end."

Written comments are invited and may be sent until December 15 to Susan Johnson, Administrator, Systems and Procedures Bureau, 728 Texas Department of Human Resources, John H. Reagan Building, Austin, Texas 78701.

A final recommended rate proposal will be developed from the public hearings, written comment, and further analysis of the audited data. The final proposals will be presented to the Texas Board of Human Resources in late December with the new rates to become effective January 1, 1978.


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


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#### **Jr. High Cagers**

The J.V. Girls met with the Cooper J.V. on Dec. 2 in a tough defensive game. The Fillies came ahead to win 27-24.


