On Thursday, April 25th, Police mayor, city secretary, and city councilmen, that he was resigning his position effective between May 8th and 15th.

Trulove stated, "It is with regret and much thought that my resignation was submitted. I was notified on April 24th by the city of Post, Texas that I had been chosen to assume the duties of Chief of Police in that city."

Services for Mrs. F. Gus (Hilda) Grawunder, 82, of Brownfield was held at 2 p.m. Saturday, April 27 in Shepherd of the King Lutheran Church in Lubbock with the Rev. A. Dean Kelm, pastor of the Redeemer Lutheran Church in Odessa, and the Rev. Robert Metzger, pastor of the First United Methodist Church in Brownfield, officiating.

Burial was in the City of Lubbock Cemetery under the direction of Brownfield Funeral Home.

Mrs. Grawunder was dead on arrival at Brownfield General Hospital at 9:22 p.m. Thursday, April 25 after a brief illness. She was born in San Marcos and married in Thorndale in 1909. She came to Lubbock County in 1920, to Dawson County in 1939 and to Brownfield in 1943.

Survivors include four sons, Milton of Brownfield, Gilbert of Corpus Christi, Leroy of Shallowater and Kenneth of McDonald, N.M.; four daughters, Mrs. Agnes Brown and Mrs. Gladys Stice, both of Brownfield, Mrs. Alice Stansell, Jr. of Lubbock and Mrs. Leona Phipps of Belle Plains, Kansas; seven sisters, Mrs. Anita Penny of Naples, Mrs. Tena Walther of Elgin, Mrs. Etta Petzold of Bakersfield, Calif., Mrs. Mary Schick of Tulink and Miss Lena Lange of Thorndale; 19 grandchildren and 25 great grandchildren.

"I have put much thought into Chief Jim Trulove, notified the my decision for this move", says Chief Trulove, "I feel as though my experience in Shallowater and the manner of operation of the Shallowater Police Department was a determining factor in being chosen as Chief of Police in a larger city for a larger police department."

The operation of the Post Police Department will be composed of five full time officers for 24 hour daily police coverage including relief officers. The Post Police Department will also be responsible for continuous modern and efficient ambulance service for Garza County. The police department will operate from the recently constructed Garza County Law Enforcement Annex which also houses the Garza County Sheriff's Department, Justice of the Peace, Department of Public Safety, Parks and Wildlife Department, and the Garza County Jail.

"My family and I have made many good friends and acquaintences since becoming a part of Shallowater", stated Trulove. "We hate to leave these people behind, but we plan on frequent visits to Shallowater. We feel that this opportunity is an advancement in the field of law enforcement, and feel that Shallowater had a large part in this advancement. I do feel that the citizens of Shallowater should be proud of their police department. The department has struggled for the past eight months to upgrade and promote citizen backing. It has reached a high point of efficiency and will continue to operate in that manner".

This week the Shallowater Lions Club announced that it was honored to recognize three individuals as the Outstanding Citizens for the month of May. These will be honored with an Open House at the Shallowater First State Bank on Friday, May 3 from 9 a.m. to 3 p.m.

Mr. Henry Mahoney has been named to receive one of the awards. Mr. Mahoney was born in Marshall, Texas on March 17, 1890. He accompanied his mother and sisters in a covered wagon when they came to the Plains and Lubbock County January 1, 1900, where they homesteaded land. His sister, Mrs. Mary Mahoney Lupton taught school at Grosville and Mr. Mahoney accompanied her and another sister, Agnes to school in a buggy and then attended college in St. Mary's College in Kansas, until his graduation then he returned to work for the Spade and L.F.D. Ranches before settling on the family spread and doing ranching and farming.

Mrs. Henry Mahoney will also receive an award. She was the former Nettie Stokes who accompanied her parents, the D.N. Stokes to the Plains in 1907 by covered wagon. They settled in Lubbock County and engaged in farming. Nettie attended school in Lubbock along with her brothers and sister. Mahoney and the former Nettie Stokes were married on October 8, 1916 at Slaton, Texas.
