## Shallowater Water Rates to Increase

At their February 18th meeting, the City Council of Shallowater decided unanimously to increase the city's water rates. The decision was reached after an evaluation of the present water system. The additional revenue will be used to finance additional water storage facilities, additional sources of supply, and to improve the water system in general.

The new rates are effective immediately although the increased rate will first apply on water statements mailed April 1, 1974. The new rate schedule is as follows:
First 3,000 gal. min., $\$ 1.00$ per M 4 thru 20,000 gal., $\$ 0.55$ per M 21 thru 50,000 gal., $\$ 0.45$ per M 51 thru 150,000 gal., $\$ 0.35$ per M Over 150,000 gal., $\$ 0.30$ per M This is the first water rate adjustment in the City in more than 10 years.

As I told Gerald Myers Saturday night, soon after the Red Raiders looked like themselves again, "fine thing. I go away for two weeks with Tech in good shape and what do you do? You blow it!"
Gerald grinned in reply and said, "Yeah, that's the trouble. You went away." Neither statement had any more truth in it than some of the Watergate testimony, but it was good for the Raiders to get back on the winning track. It was almost essential that they blast Rice
Now, the Raiders go into the final two games in pretty good shape and with a little more optimistic outlook. You can call it confidence, if you like, it all adds up to the same thing
The changes are good, following Texas' upset of A\&M on its home court, that when Tech and the Smoos play here Saturday, it will be the Raiders playing for a title tie. What a reversal. After TCU upset Texas, Tech held a two game lead with five games left, three at home, and looked like the biggest cinch since Nixon beat McGovern.
I was in Houston when Tech played A\&M, heard the major portion of the first half via delayed broadcast. And I thought Tech had a goc- chance o win. We started to listen at my daughter's home when TV announced the double overtime loss.
That wasn't the end of the world, but it wasn't long in coming, Tuesday night, to be exact. I couldn't get the game on the radio at Fredericksburg, so had to wait until the 10 o'clock news. It made me sick.
Then I remembered back to what I had written even before the league race started: the hardest thing for any team to do is to win back-to-back titles.
By all rights, winning or losing Saturday should be academic. As it is, both SMU and Tech will be hoping for a miracle, that Arkansas or Baylor will upset the Horns. SMU hopes so and that it can beat Tech for a title tie Tech hopes so in order to beat Smoo and win the crown outright.
"It's going right down to the wire," Gerald declared after the Rice game. "I was pleased over the way our defense played. We needed that kind of game right now. And the offense did well."
The defense did play well, which was fortunate early in the game because the Raiders were tight.
"Yeah, the pressure's on them," Polk Robison said. But when they came out of it, they smashed the Owls. With Tech leading 13-12, the Raider outscored Rice, 19-4 up to the half and 25-10 in the first 8:36 of the last half.
William Johnson, with Rick Bullock double-teamed and sagged on, has come to the fore. In the last seven games, he has been the high point man our times
Grady Newton has come through, too. If the Raiders can avoid fouls and still be aggressive, while playing tight defense, they can still win and either take the title outright, or force a play-off.
As Polk said, the pressure's on and Saturday will be for all the marbles in all probability.
And now there's not a team that hasn't lost once at home, with Texas the giant killer. The Hook-em folks have beaten Tech, SMU and A\&M on the road. In fact, the Horns have the best league road record (5-1), but slipped to Tech and SMU at home. Tech, A\&M and SMU are all 5-1 at home.
But the key to the race is the second half. SMU is $5-0$; Tech and A\&M are all 3-2. That's allowed the Ponies to come on fast with a drive that might earn them a title tie.

Last week I called on a man by the name of Wallace Ottmers. As soon as I saw the name, I recalled a Frank Ottmers, who played end for Texas Tech back in the late 40 s. Could they be kin?
"Kin? He's my brother!" Wallace said with a grin. The records shows that Frank played at Tech in 1945, eame back and finished his eligibility in 1947 and 48. He was a fluid end, with good moves, good hands and an engaging personality. The big, likeable guy with a good sense of humor was one of my favorites.
Wallace, a Gulf distributor in Fredericksburg, and I had a good talk about Frank, who is in the oil business in Dallas. I asked if he, Wallace, had been a football player, too?
"No", he replied, "I played in the band."
"Where, at Tech?" I persisted.
"No, at Hardis Frank was paying. I was in that great organization at the same time Frank was playing for Tech."

And for those who don't have memories any better than mine, in those days Tech and H-SU were bitter rivals, almost always meeting in the year's last game for the Border Conference title.

Friends, do you remember what rain is? Last week in Fredericksburg a thunderstorm came through about $11: 30 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$. It had been so long since I had seen rain that I went to the door in my PJs.

Rain is wet-feeling. It is an almost clear substance that you can feel when you put it on your hand, or rub between your fingers. It darkens everything it touches. I washes your car. It glides silently down the gutters. It has a refreshing smell. Maybe, just maybe, one of these days we'll see some in Lubbock.
Fishing fever is reaching Fredericksburg, as it is most South Central Texas. After all, magnolias, jonquils and other trees and flowers are in bloom, it's in the 70 s and 80 s, trees are leafing out and the bass and crappie are starting to move.
I told Wallace I was thinking of throwing a rod and reel in the back of my car and he said: "You do that and we'll go out. The fishing is great around here."
All over Fredericksburg there are deer horns. Fred Kraus, the Pearl and Coca Cola distributor, had elk, reindeer, deer, moose and antelope heads on the wall of his place, as well as a javelina head.
Many stores have deer heads and one service station has an antler tree. Hunting is maybe the second way of life, although it gets good competition from fishing. It's a proud community. People are proud of their German heritage, but also proud to be Americans.
Fredericksburg, in fact, was the only city I went through on Friday, Washington's birthday, that flew American flags. Not only that, but the flags lined both sides of long Main Street long before dawn, to say nothing of side streets. Yes, and they had flown on Monday, too.
It's one of the few cities where "danke, schoen", "bitte", "wien
