

Q. At the time of my father's death two years ago I was 19 and never received so-clal security benefits. I am now attending the university tall time. Am I eligible for students benefits?

A. Yes. Student benefits were payable beginning with January 1965 so you should apply at your so-clal security office immediately, bringing with you your father's so-clal security number, and you must show that you are a full-time student and unmarried.
