Launches Mosquito War, Spraying Starts

Day's Slogan: 'Get That Can!'

Despite the fact that the weather has been "most uncooperative," city of Muleshoe is staging a mosquito elimination program. City Manager Albert Field said Saturday, "We've tried and we'll try again and again," said the manager, "but every time we put on a spraying program, it rains."

And because it rains the problem becomes more acute, he explained. It's like this: "The rains fill those backyard tin cans, weed-covered holes and the like and this causes more mosquitoes and still more mosquitoes. So it's a case of cause and effect."

He said that Morgan Locker had done an excellent job of spraying the city from the air, but every night it would rain after he had done a spraying job that morning," the city manager said, "so the spraying was not as effective as it could have been if the weather had cooperated."

Locker swooped his Pawnee aircraft tree-top high over Muleshoe three different "stills" mornings, the spray tanks putting out a fine spray of malathion, a chemical which normally kills the mosquitoes on contact. Rains, however, prevented the malathion from doing a complete job.

New Truant Officer Cracks Whip, Father Pays \$15 Fine

Muleshoe school district hired a truant officer and put him to work this past week. By mid-week he already had

cracked down on possible violators with the result that a father paid a \$15 fine in county court for alleged violation of the school attendance law.

The campaign to get every Willie and Sally of school age enrolled in the school will continue until every eligible child is enrolled, a spokesman for the school said.

School Superintendent Neal Dillman said that "all youngsters between the ages of 6 and 17 years of age, as of Sept. 1, 1966 are required by state law to attend school regularly. A minimum of 165 days of the school year is required."

Dillman said the new truant officer has been given orders "to give one warning to the parent and student; then if they do not enroll in school and attend regularly, the parent will be filed on in county court."

The superintendent asked that

all citizens report cases of truancy with which they are familiar. Such persons should call the superintendent's office or any of the school principals.

4 Plead Guilty In County Court

Five pleas of guilty, involving four persons, were heard by County Judge Glen Will in county court this past week.

Cases included: Doan Lewis, charged with giving a worthless check, \$7 fine and court costs. Theodore Avila Ramus, charged with failing to send children to school, fined \$15 and court costs; Dorothy Martin, charged with theft, fined \$15 and costs and given three days in jail. Melvin S. Alpha, two cases, charged with worthless check. Fined \$10 in one case and costs and \$15 and costs in the other case.

Thriller TD's, but Muleshoe-Dimmitt Game Ends in 6-6 Tie

The game had a couple story-book thrills -- storybook touchdowns, in fact -- but it ended in a victory for nobody. That was Friday night's Muleshoe-Dimmitt ball game, played before a wild, enthusiastic Dimmitt crowd that hung right on through the final seconds when the hometown outfit got its one and only touchdown to put a spectacular ending to the season's opener for both outfits.

But Muleshoe's touchdown had been just as much of a thriller. It had come shortly before the end of the first half when Paul Swint raked a high

Bobcat pass right out of the air and scampered off 70 yards for a touchdown.

But almost everybody would have to agree that the Dimmitt outfit did the better job of ball hugging -- more ground gained in scrimmage, more passes tried, more first downs tallied. But until the closing minutes of the contest, it had appeared that Muleshoe would win the squeaker.

Of course, Muleshoe missed its biggest opportunity to score on straight football late in the third quarter. The goal-ward drive had started somewhere around midfield after the

Bob cats had been forced to punt when one of their marches fizzled. The big drive ended when sore-footed Andy Stovall tried a field goal that refused to go between the uprights.

That big drive started soon after the start of the second half. Muleshoe had kicked off, Stovall doing the booting. Stafford, who did a lot of good ball-toting for the Bobcats, scampered up the field with the ball to the 33. And then Hutton, another top ball-lugger for Dimmitt, picked up more yardage on a series of plays, the two (Stafford and Hutton) alternating at the ball-carrying

assignments.

The drive went fairly well until the Bobcats got themselves penalized. They took to the air and got one of their aerials snagged by Swint behind his own goal line.

The ball went over to the Mules as a result on their own 20, and then early in the fourth, after a series of plays, the Mules pushed the ball into kicking territory. But Andy didn't have a good night with his booting, but through no fault of his own. His kicking foot had been injured. So, the big moment passed and the points that would have iced down a nice margin

(even after the last minute Bobcat score) would have been sufficient to have spelled victory for the Mules.

The Muleshoe Mules of Coach Willie McAlpin were within the 20 yard line only once, Dimmitt was within the 20 yard line only three times.

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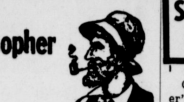
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The Sandhills Philosopher



Editor's note: The Sandhills Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm puts the big city problem in a different light in his letter this week.

Dear Editor:
 According to an article I read in a newspaper which drifted onto this Johnson grass farm yesterday, don't know where it came from, the mayor of New York informed a Senate Committee in Washington that New York has reached the limit of its taxing ability, has run out of new sources of revenue, and will need \$0 billion dollars from the Federal Government in the next ten years to keep the city livable.

Moreover, other major cities are getting in the same shape, and one Senator, figuring up their requests, calculated it would take 250 billion dollars in the next ten years to keep them all livable.

I got to thinking this over, and while I don't know exactly how many are there in the country's major cities, I esti-

imate they're asking for roughly about \$50,000 per acre per year.

You can see this makes the farmers, who never got more than 3 or 4 dollars an acre in Federal help, look like pikers.

It makes a person wonder, can we really afford these cities?

I know land is valuable in a city, but if it takes \$50,000 an acre per year in Federal handouts to keep it producing, it makes a man scratch his head.

Furthermore, there are other complications. For example, farmers now make up less than 10 per cent of the total population in this country, and if the 90 per cent now living in cities can't support themselves and are looking outside their boundaries for help, somebody is sure dreaming if he thinks us farmers can carry the load.

I wouldn't mind sending New York a dollar now and then, but 10 billion? Just haven't got it.

Somebody ought to tell the cities, where all the brains are supposed to be, that just because farm prices are up a little it doesn't mean we can take up 25 billion dollars a year just to tide them over.

Social Security Q's and A's

Q. At the time of my father's death two years ago I was 19 and never received social security benefits. I am now attending the university full time. Am I eligible for students benefits?

A. Yes. Student benefits were payable beginning with January 1965 so you should apply at your social security office immediately, bringing with you your birth certificate, your father's social security number, and you must show that you are a full-time student and unmarried.
