





Liberal amounts of moisture reported from the cattle country during the past few days put a \$12.50, and canners and cutters bullish tone to the trade at Ft. sold from \$7 to \$10.50. Bulls Worth Monday.

Immediate demand from wheat areas, as well as stepped calves sold from \$16.50 to \$19, up demand from the winter and common and medium sorts clover grazing areas of East and cashed at \$12 to \$16. Culls sold Central Texas, caused stocker from \$9 to \$12. classes to move sharply higher.

This higher surge carried slaughter kinds upward as stocker buyers invaded the classes that have been selling largely for slaughter.

All cattle and calves were fully 50 cents higher and many stocker kinds were 50 cents to \$1 and more higher.

Choice fat cattle were virtually lacking, a few in the \$20 to \$22 range, but most of the medium and good slaughter steers and yearlings sold from \$16 to \$20, and lower grades scaled down on the \$12 to \$16
