## Shallowater City Tax Notices to

 Be Mailed to City Residents this Weekplaced in $t$ according to Miss Jessie Lee Vance, Tax Assessor for the City of Shallowater, and Mrs. Ruth Walker, Tax Assessor for the Shallowater Independent School District. These notices will advise all property owners of the new assessed valuation placed on their property for 1974. The tax value property for 1974 . The tax value
shown on the notice will be the shown on the notice will be the
value for both the City and the School District if the property is in the city limits. If the property is outside the city, the value is for the school district only.
These tax valuations are the result of the tax 'equalization program' employed by the City of Shallowater and the Shallowater Independent School District to insure that each property owner pays only his fair share of the cost of operating the city and school. Many property owners will find Many property owners will find
that their assessment has been reduced, while many others will find their assessment has been increased; some assessments will remain approximately the same. The taxes paid by the property owner is an 'ad volorem' tax-meaning 'according to value.' The state law requires assessment of this tax on an equal and uniform basis. To comply with the law, it was necessary to reappraise all property in the City of Shallowater and the Shallowater Independent School District equitably and uniformly. All of the land has been set out on maps, as well as aerial photographs, and appraised at so much per front foot, square foot or acre, depending upon the many factors that must be considered. All residences and commercial buildings have been appraised separately from the land. Buildings were appraised by the use of a cost schedule which takes quality of construction type and tion was applied depending upon age, condition and degree of utility. All appraisal data has been placed on permanent record cards. One side of this appraisal data has been placed on permanent recor
building estimated cost per square foot of floor space and the amount of depreciation applied. This results in the present value results building. The appraisal card also building. The appraisal card also ellects a detailed description of he land, and shows the legal description, the size and unit price per square foot, front foot or acre. The total land value is then added to the value of the building, thus, the total appraised value of the property is obtained.
The notices that will go out this week are not intended to be a summons for the property owner o appear before the Board of Equalization. To the contrary, they are merely to inform the property owner of the results of the appraisal survey insofar as his property is concerned. Any property owner who so desires may go to the Administrative Offices of the Shallowater
Independent School District on the date listed on his notice to present any information pertaining to the valuation of his property. The appraisal staff employed to do this job will be glad to consider any information furnished by the property owner and to explain how the value of the property was determined and the methods used in arriving at the assessment. Those taxpayers who are not offered by the eppraisen offered by the appraisers may Equalization.

The Board of Equalization will review all values placed on
properties, both real and personal, and will hear any property owner who wishes to 'protest' his assessment. The Board will have authority to compel the production of books and records, as well as other evidence of value, and to approve, raise or lower the

## Beef for The Home Freezer

Buying beef wholesale for storage in the home freezer can be a money-saving experience, if it's done wisely. Some guidelines are listed by Woodrow Bailey, livestock and meat specialist for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.
First of all, locate a reliable firm. The Better Business Bureau Retail Credit Association can furnish information.

Decide what cuts of beef your family likes and know how much you consume over a period of time. Beef will usually show some Berage flavor after six months in a freezer.
For a family of six or more people that enjoys hamburgers, steaks and pot roasts, Bailey suggests buying a complete side of beef. It will provide all the cuts you see displayed in a supermarket If broiled steaks are the family preference, a full loin may be the preference, a full loin may be the
best purchase as it will yield only best purchase as it will yield only sirloin, porterhouse, T-bone and
club steaks. club steaks.
For those favoring pot roasts, a fore quarter would be in order. The price would be much less than a hind quarter and the amount of edible meat would be about the same.
Bailey also advises buying beef according to grades by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The "Choice" grade is best if steaks and roasts are to be broiled or dry roasted. Choice beef has been fed longer and has more marbling (fat

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Shallowater, Texas
cattered throughout the lean). It is more expensive. On the other hand, "Good" grade beef is suitable if steaks are pan fried and roasts are "pot roasted". If ungraded beef is bought, check the rib eye muscle for a liberal sprinkling of fat throughout the lean.
Cattle that have been grain fed provide the best beef for your money. Bailey advises agains purchasing a calf for your freeze out of a pasture.
When buying beef wholesale, be sure the meat is trimmed properly with only a minimum amount of fat. A Choice carcass should not have more than one-half inch of fat on the outside.
The specialist also suggests that wholesale cut or carcass b weighed in the buyer's presence. A carcass should yield about 75 per cent retail cuts, with the remaining 25 per cent going to fat and bones.

Two Boston teams apparently are headed in opposite directions, a least as of Monday night. The Celtics overcame major obstacles to win the pro basketball title in the NBA, but the Bruins played like pussycats in falling behind Philadelphia in the hockey playoffs.
The Celtics, who used to rule the roost in the days of Bob Cousy and Company, had the determination. They were underdogs and yet they shrugged it off to come out on top.
John Havlicek possibly was the key. The veteran Celtic played like a youngster and literally drove his teammates to victory. The Celtics obviously wanted the title more than the Bucks. (And that could be a play on words, since it also meant dollars).
You might say the Bucks were Kareem-ed. The former All American got his points, but he didn't get enough scoring help. Shades of Wilt Chamberlain in his prime!

As for the Hockey Bruins, they didn't show much Sunday. Where the Celtics played with desire and drive, the Bruins looked apathetic and almost listless.
The Flyers carried the fight to the Bruins, forced them into mistakes and took advantage of careless play. Surprisingly, the Flyers now have the edge and, while the Stanley Cup playoffs are far from over, the momentum is with the Flyers.
I quite honestly didn't hold the Flyers in high esteem when I saw the series against Atlanta. They impressed me with their physical strength, but I didn't think they were capable of beating a team of equal size, strength and ability
I still don't think that they are better than the Bruins, when the latter play up to their ability. Anything less than their best, though, is going to cost Boston victory.
The Flyers proved that they are sound. They have good speed, they are quick, they check hard and they shrug off penalties with brilliant defensive hockey. The Flyers also are alert
To give credit where credit is due, they carried the fight to the Bruins and, despite Bobby Orr, the most exciting player in the sport, Phil Esposito and Wayne Cashman, the Flyers came up with players as equal or better. If Boston fights back, it could be one of the best of the Cup finals.

Then, there probably will be another Oldtimer's Game, with the site yet to be determined. Plainview might be a good spot for, in the short time pro ball flourished, it did well there.
