He was a member of the Presbyterian Church in Baird. He was the son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Ira Frazier, and was born in the commissary used when the Texas and Pacific rail line was being built where Baird is today.

He was also the first Model T Mechanic in the Baird area. He had been retired for several years.

Six Flags To Open On April 20th

The 1963 season for SIX FLAGS Over Texas will commence on Saturday, April 20. The third operating year for the historical theme park, located midway between Dallas and Fort Worth, has been set up to begin on a Saturday and Sunday basis only until June 1. For the months of June, July and August, SIX FLAGS will be open seven days a week. Following Labor Day in September and continuing through December 1, the Park will revert again to a week end only operation.

Following a siege of bad weather a few weeks ago, which hampered the nearly \$1,000,000 expansion program, balmy days have followed bringing smiles to the engineers and construction workers who are charged with having the Park in tip-top operating shape by April 20.

Projections on attendance for this year indicate an even higher figure than the 1,272,000 visitors who clicked through the turnstiles in 1962.

Part of the heavy expansion program is centered around a new six acre site added to the U. S. A. Section of SIX FLAGS. It will be known as "Boom Town," depicting the days of the exciting oil discovery finds in Texas during the late 1890's and early 1900's.

Dominating Boom Town as well as the entire 115-acre Park is the Sky Hook. Towering 190 feet into the air and weighing 40 tons, the Sky Hook looks like an enormous steel crane with two arms outstretched. A steel basket is suspended from each arm and supported by oversize ride in each basket that is carried up to a height of 155 feet.

A 180 degree turn follows and a panorama of SIX FLAGS unfolds down below. From this height, on clear days, the skylines of Dallas and Fort Worth, both 15 miles away, may be seen. New rides, attractions and shows are being added to the other five sections of the Park. Restaurant, parking and air-conditioning facilities have been expanded to keep pace with the new additions.

Forecasters said this week that probably less than 200 Baird voters would go to the polls Tuesday to elect three members to the city council posts for two year terms.

Four men have filed for the council posts and three are to be elected. Candidates for the spots are Sam Gilliland, Irvin Corn, C. H. Lunsford and Jon Hardwick, local C.P.A. Gilliland and Corn are seeking reelection to the council while Hardwick and Lunsford are seeking the posts for the first time.

The election is to be held at the city hall with Tee Baulch as the judge. Clerks will be Mrs. L. G. Kerby and Mrs. H. D. Driskill.

Bears Score In Bluebonnet Meet

The Baird High School Bears scored 12½ points in the Bluebonnet Relays held in Brownwood Saturday in spite of an ankle injury by Johnny Higgins, the team's jump artist who can usually be counted on for places in the jump and vault events.

Competition in track and field events was stiff as again Class "AA", Class "A" and Class "B" schools competed in the same division.

Baird's mile relay team composed of Wally Harris, Thomas Robbins, Tencil Scott and Cotton Barnes, were seventh in the event with a 3:38.7 time. The Bear sprint relay team made up of Harris, Scott and Barnes were 10th with 47.1.

Johnny Higgins took sixth and one point with a leap of 19' 11¼" in the broadjump and tied for third in the high jump with 5' 8". He scored 3½ points in the jump. He sprained his ankle on a vault attempt and made only one try at the high jump.

Childers broadjumped 16' 11¾" and ran the low hurdles in 24.7 and the high hurdles in 18 seconds flat.

Tencil Scott won second in the open 440 yard dash with 52.8 and scored 8 points. Barnes ran a 53.9 and Ault ran a 57.1. Robbins was timed at 2:08.1 in the 880 and Ault was timed in 2:22.2. Harris hit 25.6 in the 220 and Garcia ran a 5:18.2 in the mile run for his best time of the year. Bobby Stanley ran a 5:20.8 mile in practice.

Tally Windham threw the discus 124 feet and heaved the shot 42'.

The Bears are entered in the Red Dog Relays at Ranger this week end. The Saturday running of the Red Dog Relays is the initial running of the event. It will be held at the Ranger Junior College track.

Graves Of Civil War Veterans To Be Marked

"Every unmarked grave of a Civil War Veteran in Callahan County will be officially marked and recorded", B. C. Christian, president of the Callahan County Historical Survey Committee announced today.

The Committee will determine the location of the graves mark them with an official government marker and report the erection of all such markers to the Texas State Historical Survey Committee to be included in a master file.

"The marking of every Confederate grave in Texas is a main objective of the Confederate and Civil War Centennial Programs", stated Mr. John Ben Sheppard, president of the Texas State Historical Survey Committee sponsor of the project.

"This recognition by the state is long past due, and we feel that the information will be invaluable to the historian, scholar and genealogist and will be of real interest to the tourist," Mr. Sheppard said. "We urge anyone knowing of the graves of Civil War Veterans in the area to notify this committee."

The Baird grade school track and field team took second place in the annual Sweetwater grade and junior high school track meet held Saturday at the Sweetwater High School track. There were some 30 area junior high school and grade school teams entered in the meet.

Mann Junior High School of Abilene won the meet with 27 points. Baird took second place with 18½ points and Cisco was third with 17 points. Big Spring with 15 points was in fourth place and Snyder was fifth with 12 points.

Winning places in the meet for Baird were: Marvin Parker, 2nd in broadjump with 19' 3" and second in the 330 yard dash with a time of 42 seconds; Bobby Voights, third in high jump with 5' 3"; Rickie Joy, fourth in high jump with 5' 2", and the 880 relay team composed of Martinez, Lopez, Faircloth and Parker, second in 1:46.8.

During their freshman year Paula won all tournament honors at the Noodle tournament and Karen took tournament honors at the Trent tourney. In their sophomore year Corn was named to the all-tournament teams of the Dyess, Cross Plains and Hawley tournaments, and in the season just completed both were named to the all district team and Corn made the all tournament team at Dyess, Cross Plains and Hardin-Simmons. She was named the most valuable player of the Hardin-Simmons tournament.

With the return next year of the high scoring duo, and of Elaine Hass, diminutive speedster and playmaker to the forward court, L. B. Howard should become even a better coach, and the Baird lassies should raise their school several rungs up the ladder toward the state crown.

Pair the trio of stellar performers in the forward court with Peggy Payne, Sue Howard and Sharon Jeter, all top guards, and Coach Howard should have one of the top performing sextets in the area and the state come next season. The guards developed rapidly this season, and next year should have the poise that is gained by experience. Howard and Jeter were playing their sophomore year this year. Payne is a junior.

The entire starting team is to return next year, barring unforeseen complications. The starting team, plus a good bunch of this year's reserves, should keep Baird High School and Coach Howard in the girls basketball playing business for at least another season.

A series of four meetings of stockholders and guests were held in Abilene, Coleman, Brownwood and Ballinger from March 12-21, with votes cast by eligible stockholders for two places on the five-man board.

Pitzer, a stockman and farmer has been a board member for 25 years and Porter, a livestock operator has been on the board 18 years. Both were relected for three-year terms.

Holdover directors are S. P. Horne of Coleman, G. W. Jenkins of Melvin and Wade Carter of Norton.

In other business activities at the meetings, General Manager J. C. Marshall of Coleman gave the association's financial statement and reports of activities of the board of directors were also presented.

Marshall pointed out that the association had a loan volume of more than \$8,000,000 during 1962, highest in its history, and that the association is operating on a sound, economical basis.

The association had an attendance mark of approximately 50 per cent of its stockholders at the four meetings, one of the highest marks on record.

"We are very pleased with this fine turnout at our meetings," Marshall commented. "This shows the interest our people have in their home-owned and operated credit organization."

YOUR FAIR SHARE

Most Texans, we believe, are fair-minded folks. They believe in fair play, square dealing, and mutual respect for personal and property rights. Those who want to take advantage of their neighbors are the exception.

Sometimes it may be hard to define "a fair share." This can occur in dividing oil or gas production, when two or more landowners are involved.

As we all know, oil and gas don't pay any attention to fence lines.

Here in Texas many wells have been allowed to produce more oil or gas than they should have because they were drilled on very small tracts. That extra oil or gas came from under the neighbor's land.

Some oilmen made a regular practice of this type of operation. Obviously, one owner got more than his fair share—others, less.

People in 26 out of 29 oil-producing states have found a way to divide their oil and gas so that each owner gets what is rightfully his. They simply put their small acreage together and share the costs and income. This system is known as POOLING.

Such a system is needed in Texas. It is proposed in a bill now before the Legislature, HOUSE BILL 510. When the neighbors cannot agree, the Railroad Commission would set up a drilling block and see to it that the rights of all owners are protected . . . all costs and proceeds equitably divided.

Oilmen who have made fortunes at the expense of others could not be expected to support House Bill 510. They are bitterly opposing it. But the responsible oilmen of Texas are overwhelmingly for it. So are the informed citizens who want to see justice done.

Ask your Senator and Representative at Austin to support House Bill 510—so Texas, too, will have a reasonable and legal way to assure each landowner his FAIR SHARE.
