

## Former Hall County Hospital Admini strator Killed In Plane Crash Near Bastrop Cou

Two hospital administrators and a hospital board member from Perryton, and a Book-er physician were killed early Friday when the light plane in which they were fly-ing crashed in a field in Bastrop County about 25 miles east of Austin.

Jerry Leon Weatherly, 44; Donald Douglas Holmes, 36; and Roy Henry Grunden, 34, all of Perryton, and Dr. V. S.

Christopher, 41, of Booker died in the crash, said Texas De-partment of Public Safety

spokesman Mike Cox. The men were flying from Perryton to Austin for a Texas Medical Foundation confer-ence, said Lawrence Ellzey, board president of Ochiltree General Hospital.

Witnesses told Bastrop County sheriff's deputies on scene they heard the the

plane's engine sputter, and said it appeared the pilot was losing radar and radio contrying to land in the field, said County Sheriff J. Beggs. The engine stalled and the

plane flipped and crashed nose down, the witnesses said. The plane broke into pieces on impact, and the propeller was buried in the ground. The Federal Aviation Ad-

ministration called DPS at Economic Development Program

to be in the area on a training mission, and the pilot radioed that he spotted the crash at 8:51 a.m. Officers arrived on the scene approximately 10 minutes later. Weatherly was Ochiltree

County hospital adminis-trator, and was a native of Hall County, growing up around Turkey. Grunden, a native of Cheyenne, Wyo., was nursing administrator at the Perryton facility, where he had moved last summer from Childress

Christopher, a native of In-dia, had a family practice clinic and had just established a nursing facility in Booker. He was piloting the

Holmes, an X-ray techni-cian, served on the board of directors of Ochiltree General.

Their deaths were a great loss to the community, a spokesman said.







Rochr said he is convinced the man is telling the truth, but trash from the roadside parks is removed by a private firm contrac-ting with the Texas Highway Department, and incinerated and buried at either Pampa or Memphis.


