# **Action Taken By** City Council

The Quitaque City Council met in a regular meeting on December 3, 1990. Action taken during this meeting included the passing of an ordinance defining the duties, powers, and responsibilities of the mayor and councilmembers and outlining procedures for adopting motions, resolutions, and ordinances. This ordinance repealed and updated the first ordinance of the City of Quitaque passed in

Also passed was an ordinance establishing an active and continuing records management program prescribing policies and procedures consistent with the Local Government Records Act.

Other action included the authorization of the purchase of a computer billing system for the City, and the establishment of a 10 percent deliquent charge to be charged to past due utility bills. This delinquent charge will be placed on all utility bills not paid by the 15th of the month and will become effective January 15, 1991.


