ORDINANCE NO. 79-07 BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TURKEY, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. There is hereby created the office of Animal Warden. The Animal Warden shall be appointed by the City Council and shall perform such duties and receive such compen-sation as shall be prescribed by the City Council and this ordin-

SECTION 1-1. It shall be the duty of the Animal Warden or any of his deputies or any city policeman on duty to seize or impound, subject to the provisions of this ordinance, animals found running at large in viola-tion of this ordinance, whether in the immediate presence of the owner or custodian or otherwise.

SECTION 1-2. Any animal found trespassing or running at large on any person's private property may be taken up by



SECTION 14. The Animal Warden, his deputies and city policemen, are authorized to en-ter upon any unfenced lot, tract parcel of land for the puror pose of chasing and impounding any animal running at large


ther SECTION 2. Definitions. When used in this ordinance the fol-lowing words and terms shall be

interpreted as follows: SECTION 2-1. Running at Large - Shall pertain to an animal off the premises of the own-er and not under the physical, visible or audible control of the owner or his authorized representative. An animal intruding upon the property of another person other than the owner, shall be termed "Running-at-Large.'

SECTION 2-2. Owner - Any person who has the right of pro-perty in an animal or who harbors an animal or allows an ani-mal to remain about his premis-es for a period of seven (7) days.

SECTION 2-3. Harboring - The act of keeping and caring for an animal or providing a premise to which the animal returns for food, shelter or care.

SECTION 2-4. Vicious Animal -Any animal that commits an unprovoked attack upon a person or constitutes physical threat to

In the event of loss or destruc-tion of the original tag provided in Section 3.3, the owner of the animal shall obtain a duplicate tag.

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

This program, initiated in 1971 to help producers reduce harvesting, marketing and processing costs, will be offered where Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation state committees determine facil-ities and conditions make it feasible.

> As in the 1979 program, up-As in the 1979 program, up-land cotton loans will be for 10 months beginning on the first day of the month the loan is made. In the tenth month, loans may be extended for an additional eight months at the produ-cer's request, providing the average price of the basic cotton grade in the designated spot markets for the preceding month does not exceed 130 percent of the average spot price for the preceding 36 months. Program provisions will be similar to those of the 1979 program.
