The MUMPS vaccine will be given children through seven years of age.

If the child has been vaccinated for MEASLES before one year of age, the child MUST be vaccinated again. The old immunization is not valid.

A NEW form will be sent home with your child to be signed and EACH FORM MUST BE SIGNED, or the parent must accompany the child to school to sign the form, before the child can be vaccinated.

Please note these changes and respond accordingly.

## Crop, Livestock Reports Needed

From mid-November to early January, thousands of Texas farmers and ranchers will receive a crop or livestock questionnaire from the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service or will be personally interviewed by the Service's field staff. The information gathered through the final acreage, yield, and production of crops and end-of-the-year livestock and poultry numbers for the state of Texas and for each county.

All of the estimates published by the Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Service are based on the data provided by Texas farmers and ranchers, County Extension Agents, ASCS offices, and many others in agriculture. This cooperation provides the necessary data which is, in turn, returned to farmers and ranchers and others in the form of accurate estimates, which are so essential in making the wisest production and marketing decisions. Accurate estimates are also essential to farm organizations and legislators in promotion, planning and enacting wise

legislation and are used in establishing acreages and payment levels to producers under the various commodity programs.

The collection and publication of agricultural statistics are a cooperative effort between the Texas Department of Agriculture and USDA. This cooperation avoids duplication of effort, promotes economies, and increases the effectiveness of statistical reports. All individual farm and ranch information is kept confidential, and only state and county summaries become part of the final published estimate.

County estimates for 1978 and January 1, 1979, are available on livestock, poultry, dairy, field crops, small grains, cotton, vegetables, fruits and pecans, and cash receipts from the sale of Texas farm commodities.

**ORDINANCE NO. 79-07**  
 BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TURKEY, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. There is hereby created the office of Animal Warden. The Animal Warden shall be appointed by the City Council and shall perform such duties and receive such compensation as shall be prescribed by the City Council and this ordinance.

SECTION 1-1. It shall be the duty of the Animal Warden or any of his deputies or any city policeman on duty to seize or impound, subject to the provisions of this ordinance, animals found running at large in violation of this ordinance, whether in the immediate presence of the owner or custodian or otherwise.

SECTION 1-2. Any animal found trespassing or running at large on any person's private property may be taken up by

that person and delivered to the Animal Warden or his deputies; but no such person is authorized hereby to destroy such animal, such authority for the destruction of any animal being hereby specifically reserved to the Animal Warden or any of his deputies or any police officer.

SECTION 1-3. Every person, other than a police officer, the Animal Warden or his deputies, who takes up any dog or cat under the provisions of this ordinance shall immediately thereafter give notice thereof to the Animal Warden, and every such person, or any person in whose custody the animal may in the meantime be placed, shall deliver such animal to the Animal Warden without fee or charge, and the Animal Warden shall thereupon hold and dispose of such animal as though such animal had been found running at large and impounded by him.

SECTION 1-4. The Animal Warden, his deputies and city policemen, are authorized to enter upon any unfenced lot, tract or parcel of land for the purpose of chasing and impounding any animal running at large thereon.

SECTION 2. Definitions. When used in this ordinance the following words and terms shall be interpreted as follows:

SECTION 2-1. Running at Large - Shall pertain to an animal off the premises of the owner and not under the physical, visible or audible control of the owner or his authorized representative. An animal intruding upon the property of another person other than the owner, shall be termed "Running-at-Large."

SECTION 2-2. Owner - Any person who has the right of property in an animal or who harbors an animal or allows an animal to remain about his premises for a period of seven (7) days.

SECTION 2-3. Harboring - The act of keeping and caring for an animal or providing a premise to which the animal returns for food, shelter or care.

SECTION 2-4. Vicious Animal - Any animal that commits an unprovoked attack upon a person or constitutes physical threat to human beings or other animals.

SECTION 2-5. Public Nuisance - Any animal which:

1. Molests passersby or passing vehicles
2. Attacks other animals
3. Trespasses on school grounds
4. Is repeatedly at large
5. Damages private or public property
6. Barks, whines or howls in an excessive continuous or untimely fashion

SECTION 2-6. Stray Animals - Any animal for which there is no identifiable owner or harborer.

SECTION 2-7. Rabies Vaccination - Shall mean the vaccination of an animal with an anti-rabies vaccine approved by Texas Department of Health and administered by a veterinarian licensed by the State of Texas.

SECTION 3. Rabies Control.

SECTION 3-1. Vaccinations - Every owner of an animal shall have every animal vaccinated at three (3) months of age or older against rabies. Such vaccinated animal shall be revaccinated once during each twelve (12) calendar month period. Owners of animals moving from a location outside the city limits of the City of Turkey shall comply with these regulations within fifteen (15) days after moving into the city limits of the City of Turkey.

SECTION 3-2. Certificate of Vaccination - Upon vaccination, the veterinarian shall execute and furnish the owner of the animal or evidence thereof a certificate upon a form furnished by the veterinarian.

SECTION 3-3. Rabies Tags - Concurrent with the issuance and delivery of the certificate of vaccination referred to in Section 3-2, the owner of the animal shall cause to be attached to the collar or harness of the vaccinated animal a metal tag, serially numbered to correspond with

vaccination certificate number. Such tag shall be worn by the animal at all times.

SECTION 3-4. Duplicate Tags - In the event of loss or destruction of the original tag provided in Section 3.3, the owner of the animal shall obtain a duplicate tag.

SECTION 3-5. Proof - It shall be unlawful for any person who owns or harbors a vaccinated animal to fail or refuse to exhibit his copy of the certificate of vaccination upon demand to any person charged with the enforcement of these regulations.

SECTION 3-6. Harboring Unvaccinated Animals - It shall be unlawful for any person to harbor any animal which has not been vaccinated against rabies, as provided herein, or which cannot be identified as having a current vaccination certificate.

SECTION 4. Reporting Bites and Related Procedures.

SECTION 4-1. Any person receiving an animal bite shall report such incidence to the proper authority or animal control officer. In addition that animal shall be impounded and observed by a licensed veterinarian under the rules commonly and universally accepted as being suitable.

SECTION 4-2. The owner of any impounded animal redeeming the same shall be liable for all charges and expenses incurred by the impounding of the animal. In addition, the owner of any impounded animal which is unvaccinated shall cause the animal to be duly vaccinated prior to its release.

SECTION 5-1. It shall be unlawful for any person to maintain or keep an animal three months of age or older without a collar or harness attached firmly to the animal. In addition the collar or harness shall display a valid vaccination tag.

SECTION 6. Animals Running At Large.

SECTION 6-1. It shall be unlawful for any animal to be off the owner's premises and not under the physical, visible or audible control of the owner or his authorized representative. Such animals shall be impounded.

SECTION 6-2. It shall be unlawful for any owner of any female animal to allow said animal to run at large while in season (stage of estrus), regardless of any other provisions contained in this regulation.

SECTION 7. Impounded Animals.

SECTION 7-1. Impoundment - Animals owned or harbored in violation of this regulation shall be taken into custody by an Animal Warden or other designated official and impounded at the impoundment facilities at the City Hall for not less than three (3) days. At the end of this period of time, such animal shall be taken to a veterinarian or a veterinary clinic for disposal. The name and addresses of the veterinarian or veterinary clinic to which such animals are taken (or currently being taken) shall be kept on file with the City Secretary, and any changes in such location shall be noted immediately at the Secretary's Office.

SECTION 7-2. Redemption of Animals - The owners shall be able to redeem any animal at any time prior to the disposal of the animal upon payment of a handling fee of \$5.00 to the City of Turkey, Texas, such fee to double with each impounding event concerning said animal, plus the cost of boarding the animal at the impounding facility.

SECTION 7-3. At such time of redemption of animal, unless currently complied with, owner shall vaccinate the animal in accordance with this ordinance.

SECTION 8. Penalties.

SECTION 8-1. Whenever in this ordinance an act is prohibited or is made or declared to be unlawful or an offense or a misdemeanor, or wherever in such ordinance the doing of any act is required or the failure to do any act is declared to be unlawful, where no specific penalty is provided therefor, the violation of any such provision of this ordinance shall be punishable by a fine or not exceeding \$200.00, provided, however, that no penalty shall be greater or less than the penalty provided for the same or a similar offense under the laws of the State of Texas. Each day any violation of this ordinance shall continue shall constitute a separate offense.

SECTION 9. Savings.

SECTION 9-1. The sections, paragraphs, sentences, clauses, and phrases of this ordinance

are severable, and if any phrase, clause, sentence, paragraph or section of this ordinance shall be declared unconstitutional by a valid judgment or decree of a court of competent jurisdiction, such unconstitutionality shall not affect any of the remaining phrases, clauses, sentences, paragraphs, and sections of this ordinance.

The fact that there does not now exist a method in the City

of Turkey for controlling the animals constitutes a danger to the public health and creates an emergency and therefore the rule requiring the reading of the ordinance at three (3) con-

secutive meetings is hereby suspended.

**1980 Cotton Loan Rate, Seed Cotton Program Announced**

A 1980 loan rate of 48 cents per pound for upland cotton, the statutory minimum provided by law, has been announced. This is 2.23 cents below the 1979 level.

Also announced was the 1980 seed cotton loan program similar to that available in 1979, with recourse loans available to borrowers.

The 1980 upland cotton loan rate applies to Strict Low Midling (SLM) 1 1/16 inch upland cotton (micronaire 3.5 through 4.9) net weight, at average location in the U. S.

Based on the spot market calculation, the loan rate would have been 47.45 cents per pound, but law requires the rate to be at least 48 cents per pound.

A schedule of premiums and discounts for other qualities and the base loan rate for SLM 1 1/16 inch cotton at each warehouse location will be issued later.

Under the recourse loans available in the seed cotton program borrowers must repay the full

dollar amount of the loan. This is different from the department's regular nonrecourse loan which permits producers to satisfy loans by forfeiting the crop under loan to the Commodity Credit Corporation. This program, initiated in 1971 to help producers reduce harvesting, marketing and processing costs, will be offered where Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation state committees determine facilities and conditions make it feasible.

As in the 1979 program, upland cotton loans will be for 10 months beginning on the first day of the month the loan is made. In the tenth month, loans may be extended for an additional eight months at the producer's request, providing the average price of the basic cotton grade in the designated spot markets for the preceding month does not exceed 130 percent of the average spot price for the preceding 36 months. Program provisions will be similar to those of the 1979 program.
