Hall County Hires New Administrator

Hall County Hospital in Memphis has named Bill Neeley as the new administrator. He began his new duties Monday. He and his wife, Barbara, have already moved to Memphis.

Administrator Neeley has been an experienced hospital administrator for 18 years, beginning in 1970 at Meridian, Texas. Serving there until 1976, he then became administrator of the West Community Hospital in West, Texas.

A 49-bed institution employing approximately 100 persons, the hospital over-

came a \$260,000 deficit during this period. Six physicians were also recruited.

From October, 1985 to May, 1986 Neeley served as administrator of the Franklin County Hospital in Mt. Vernon, Texas, an acute care institution. He later served in the same position at Lake Whitney Memorial Hospital.

A member of several professional groups, he is a past delegate to the Texas Hospital Association, past vice-chairman of Texas Hospital Sub-Division, and Texas Hospital Committee on Smaller Hospitals, where he served as treasurer.

Sorghum Session Planned In Amarillo November 29th

Peter C. Myers will address the Sorghum Session of the Amarillo Farm and Ranch Show in Amarillo on November 29, 1988. Myers is Deputy Secretary of Agriculture and has been named as a likely contender for the top USDA position in the next administration.

Myers will discuss the 1989 farm program and the outlook for future programs at the program sponsored by National Grain Sorghum Producers Association beginning at 1:30 p.m. The Fourth Annual Farm Show will be held at the Amarillo Civic Center on November 29 through December 1. Show hours are 10-6 daily.

Boyce Hart, New Deputy, Takes Office In Quitaque

Boyce Hart, 58, of Matador was bonded and sworn in as Deputy Sheriff of Briscoe County on Monday, November 14, 1988, ending the two week search to fill vacancy of that office.

Hart is an experienced, certified peace officer. He served 23 years as Compliance Officer with the Texas Animal Health Commission. He is married, has two grown daughters, and attends the Baptist Church.

"It hasn't been an easy task trying to fill Oliver's position, but I'm very pleased to have been able to get Boyce Hart to serve as my deputy," said Briscoe County Sheriff Dick Roehr. "We are currently looking for a house for he and his wife, Elaine, and

hope to have him settled in and on the job by the weekend. As soon as possible, we will have his phone number printed in the newspaper, so the citizens of Quitaque, and the area will

have it on hand." Elaine Hart serves as dispatcher for the Motley County Sheriff's office. At present, she will retain her position there and commute to Matador.

Quitaque, Silverton File Joint Application

The City Council of the City of Quitaque held their regular monthly meeting Monday November 7, 1988. Included in actions taken was the appointment of David Brunson to Animal Control Officer as called for by Ordinance # 88-057. Complaints concerning animals in violation of this ordinance can be filed by signing a formal complaint form at the City Hall during regular business hours.

Later in the week, the City received notification from the Texas Department of Health that the plans for improvements to the water storage facilities have been approved. This will clear the way for

work to begin soon to replace one of the City's ground storage tanks, installation of new booster pumps, and installation of a new chlorinator system. Funds for this project were received from a Texas Department of Commerce grant.

The City has also filed a joint application for a Texas Department of Commerce grant with the City of Silverton for the construction of a new solid waste disposal facility. Results of the regional and state competition for this grant should be available in January or February of 1989.

Billy Bob Brown, NGSPA president from Panhandle, Texas will moderate the meeting, assisted by NGSPA officers Jeff Casten, of Quenemo, Kansas, and Pat George, of Tulia, Texas, with the NGSPA staff. They will present the current sorghum situation in research, market development and legislative programs.

The National Grain Sorghum Producers Association has extended an invitation to all who would like to attend.

As I drove my daughter to school this morning, I wondered what I would write about. I put it on the back burner and let it simmer for a while.

After dropping her off, I noticed the other children stirring about, running here and there, like kids always do. I thought, this is nice, this is safe, this is home.

I caught myself studying their faces wondering what would become of these kids. Where would they end up, what roads would they take in life? How many will go to college? How many would want to, but couldn't? How many would stay in our area after high school and college? Then something really bogged me down, what would they do to earn a living if they stay here? There are a few good jobs, but not near enough to look inviting to a college graduate. And when you think of how it will be in say ten or fifteen years, it's kinda scary for those kids we see running around with the world at their feet.

I don't have any answers, but I hope something turns things around for our communities. Not something so big, that would change our safe place, but something to keep our young people here.

My reasons may be selfish. I don't want to think of my kids moving away, not for life anyway. Chances are, they will, but I don't have to like it. I want them both to do good, have good jobs, be respectable citizens, be supportive to their families, I just want them to do it living here, so their children can enjoy the safe, familiar lifestyle we have.

How do we keep them here? I don't know. Channel energy this direction, search for industries, advertise our resources, sell others on our communities. We know how great it is here, we've just got to get the word out to others.

If you ever need a pick-me-up, when you're down and out, just drive out by the school during the day. There is no way a person can keep from smiling when they watch all those kids having what they think is the time of their lives running and playing. But..... that's what kids are all about, isn't it?

Supercollider To Have Impact On State Economy

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said that the choice of Texas for the \$4.4 billion Superconducting Supercollider will have a significant impact on Texas jobs and economic diversification into the high tech industries, research and education.
 "I am pleased that our state has been selected for the project," Bullock said. "The Texas economic base has been expanding for some time and this is going to be a real boost."
 Texas will reap the most immediate benefit from the construction phase of the Supercollider project which is being considered one of the largest in history. Approximately 4,500 people will be employed directly in the construction of the plant with a potential spin-off of as many as 12,000 jobs.
 Bullock said the state's economy will continue to benefit when the Supercollider is operational. The estimated \$270 million annual operating budget is expected to support a staff of approximately 2,500 and as many as 5,600 other jobs could be created through related activities.
 Texans could see a \$650 million annual increase in payroll and business activity once the Supercollider is completed, according to Bullock.

"TEXAS" has gained international attention as a partial cast journeys to London, England, on November 26, 1988, to perform excerpts from the musical drama before 35,000 tour and travel agents.
 The group of 20 was selected to represent the state at the World Travel Market 1988 for two 15 minute shows daily from November 28-30.
 World Travel Market is regarded as the premier travel trade exhibition in the world.
 Only three states were chosen to provide the entertainment for this international travel-trade show.
 The twenty men and women were selected for their multi-faceted talents. Dancers and musicians sing and several singers dance.
 A glimpse of this performance is possible for area residents. Catch the show at "Taste of Arts" in Westgate Mall at 5 p.m. and on Sunday, November 20, at 8:15 p.m., at the Little Amarillo Theatre.
 An airport send-off is planned for Saturday, November 26, at 12:30 p.m.

Who Gets Diabetes?
 Anyone can get diabetes. You or someone you know may even have it and not know it. However, there are certain people more at risk than others. These include:
 1. People who are overweight
 2. People with a history of diabetes in their families
 3. People who are 40 and older
 4. Blacks and Hispanics.
 An annual check-up by your physician may help tell you if you have the disease before it can seriously affect your life and health. Most people have the form of diabetes that can be controlled with diet and exercise. About a million diabetics need to take insulin.
 A new kind of insulin, called Humulin, has been developed; it's a natural human insulin created through recombinant DNA instead of insulin made from pork or beef. It's less likely to cause an immune reaction.

Mrs. Paul Meacham as leader for the program introduced her granddaughter, Melody Miller, as the guest speaker. Miss Miller works as a coordinator in the Amarillo State Center, a facility of the Texas Department of Mental Health and Retardation.

This center serves pre-school children with development delays in Potter and Randall counties and adults with mental retardation in the Panhandle with an outreach program to Borger, Childress, Dumas, Hereford, Pampa, Perryton, Tulia and Wellington. Each has work shops which provide training and employment to adults with mental retardation living in those communities.

Slides showed members how this work is carried on by the different areas.

Children from birth to three years who are developing slowly may participate in the Infant Stimulation Program located at 202 Louisiana in Amarillo where classes and individual home visits are participated in by parents in order to help them with instructions on how to teach and instruct their children. The schools provide educational services to all handicapped persons from age three through 21.

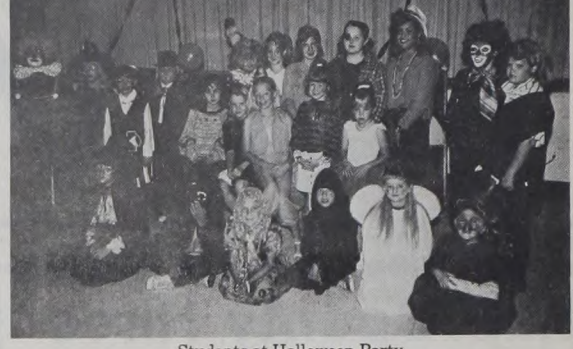

Shortage of TSTI Welders

Texas State Technical Institute (TSTI) has announced a shortage of Welders in the trade field.

"Welding is neither a dying trade nor art," states Frank Wilkins, program chairman of Welding Technology at TSTI in Waco.

Recently the welding program has found itself with more job openings for students than there are students enrolled.

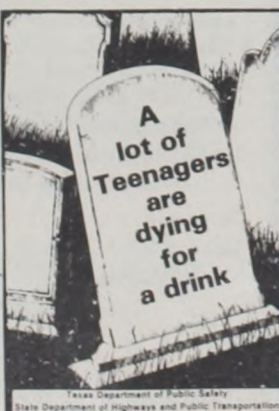
Wilkins believes the main reason for the decline in supply, and surplus, and surplus in demand, is that some Texas vocational administrators, directors and teachers have been describing welding as a "dying trade" to today's youth, thus directing them towards other vocations.

Currently there are 65 students enrolled in TSTI's three welding programs. These programs include a one-year Combination Welding program that stresses skill development in the different welding processes; an Associate of Science degree program that emphasizes the technical aspects of the trade; and the Dual or Certificate Track program.

How many jobs are there? "Last summer a company called me and requested 150 pipeline welders as soon as possible," Wilkins said. "I didn't have the workers to send." Last year's Welding Technology graduates had an average of three job offers each.

Wilkins feels that this abundance of jobs for too few students is a nationwide problem, and can be remedied if public schools will continue to encourage and fund vocational programs. "There are still many welding positions and much income to be made within this trade," he added.
